These were carefully dug by spades and hand to save all of the long tender fibres, merely to demonstrate the fertility of our soil and the vigorous root growth produced, which in turn means sturdy, healthy trees. It is self-evident that we cannot deliver, nor could our customers successfully plant full length roots like that. All our trees are dug with a large eight to ten-horse digger, consisting of a heavy broad blade in "U" shape form about 24 inches wide by 20 inches deep, which cuts completely under the tree from both sides without marring or mutilating the roots and leaving on the tree a root system unobtainable by the old spade dug method.

SPECIAL NOTICE-We have salesmen representing us in almost every locality in the west who are prepared to furnish proper credentials.
