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

### Terms and Conditions Governing Quotations in the Price List of the Huntsville Wholesale Nurseries.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniformly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy trees to sell again. You can depend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit directions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward the second of t But in according to the best of our judgment. no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and required, we will Kelease and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the contrary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.—Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS.—We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substitution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order.

As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the condition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

TERMS.—Cash. When desired, we will allow 30 to 60 days from date of shipment to responsible.

we have had no business transactions, will save prompt-paying customers. Parties with whom wish the expressly understood that payment is expected from the first collections made, and the time named is only intended as so nany days of grace in which to make returns. To days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish to lay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to complaint each or prompt returns. In order command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

Forms of Payment.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, however, accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no banking, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with exchange", or add ½ of one cent. to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection.

Grades.—We grade very carefully, in some cases by caliper, in others by height. When graded by both caliper and height, the caliper must govern, as the height then named is only to be considered approximately. When graded by height or caliper, we include the lower number and exclude the higher. Instance: in a grade of 4 to 5 feet trees, the 4 feet trees are included, but not the 5 feet trees. If 5 feet trees are wanted, the 5 to 6 feet grade must be ordered. Guarantee or Genuineness.—While we exercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees etc. True to label and hold curselves.

ercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees, etc., true to label, and hold ourselves in readiness, on proper proof, to replace all trees. etc., that may prove untrue to label, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, it is mutu-ally understood and agreed to, between the pur-chaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of gen-

chaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of gennineness shall in no case make us liable for any
sum greater than that originally received for
said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue.
ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by telegraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of
complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating
reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever
cause, will rejeive consideration only when made cause, will reserve consider augustus when make premptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival thay should not be in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or prothe box should be placed in the cellar or pro-tected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes in which they are packed, without notice of complaint to us and without our orders for their disposition.

# PEACH TREES--On Peach. Leading Varieties.

Our peach trees are budded on seedlings grown from Tennessee and Alabama natural pits. They are free from Aphis, Root-knot and Crown-Gall. We can supply beautiful large, medium and small-sized trees. The land upon which our peach trees are grown produce a well-matured tree, with fine fibrous roots. Our peach trees have been grown with especial reference to the Southern trade, where medium or small sizes are mostly wanted. The San Jose Scale, Yellows and Rosette are unknown in this section, and we have been careful not to bring in any buds from affected localities.

## Inspector's Certificate.

This is the nurserymen's paradise. There are no injurious insects on Inis is the intretymen's paradise. There are no injurious fisects on nursery stock,—no slugs on pears, no aphis on cherrries, plums nor peaches, no San Jose Scale nor Root-Knot on anything. There are some borers in peach roots, but everybody knows how to get them.

Our card with Inspector's Certificate is placed on all boxes and packages. Any one ordering from a State where more than this is required should inform

us in ample time to comply with the law. Should any one desire this card removed, it should be so stated in the order.

## Some Figures.

It is estimated that there are imported into the United States annually 5,000,000 pear seedlings and 10,000,000 Mahaleb seedlings. Of these we plant one-fifteenth of the Mahalebs and one-tenth of the pears.

# PECANS.

The pecan is destined to become the leading nut for amateur and orchard planting in this country. The area of adaptation for its culture is very great, comprising nearly all of the territory south of Central Illinois. It is likely to succeed wherever the hickories thrive. The demand for grafted and budded trees of selected named varieties has greatly increased within the last few years. Experience has proven that it is better to plant nursery-grown trees. If the nuts are planted in the field where the trees are expected to grow permanently they are exposed to many risks of destruction while small and tender. All pecan trees are very prone to revert to the small inferior wild forms. The pecan can no more be relied upon to reproduce itself true from seed than the apple, pear, plum or peach. Budded and grafted pecans have always been scarce, as the growth from buds and grafts is very uncertain and the price correspondingly high. It is better, however, to pay a high price for a tree that is known to be prolific and sure to produce a nut of fine form, thin 'shell and good quality than to plant cheap seedlings, the fruit of which have such uncertain values.

#### VARIETIES.

Taylor. We are the introducers of this nut, and we believe it will prove a prime favorite. It originated near the Gulf Coast in Southern Mississippi. It has a clear record for all the desirable qualities in a pecan, including good size, handsome shape, well filled, paper shell, excellent quality, lack of corkiness, prolific bearing and annual crops. The average annual value of the nuts from the original tree for the past three years at 60 cents per pound has been \$99.00. The tree is about 25 years old.

Stuart. One of the largest pecans; handsome shape; shell very thin; kernel plump; about 35 or 45 to the pound.

Russell. Medium to large; paper shell; ovoid form; quality good. Prolific, and the nuts sell at a high price; 45 or 50 to the pound.

Pride of the Coast. (Rome, Columbian, Mammoth, 20th Century). This is the largest pecan under propagation. One of the most popular nuts because of its large size and handsome form. Not as thin shelled nor equal to Stuart in quality; 35 or 40 to the pound.

Frotchers. (Egg Shell.) One of the largest pecans, averaging from 45 to 50 to the pound; shell very thin, and like many others of the thin shell varieties can be cracked by placing two nuts in the palm of the hand; meat very fine quality an can be removed from the shell entirely. Shape oblong, kernel plump and of good quality.

Van Deman. A large nut averaging 45 or 50 per pound; oblong in form; shell quite thin. The shape and quality of its nuts meet the commercia standard.

Moneymaker. Introduced by Mr. S, H. James, Mound, La., who has large trees of it in bearing. The good points he claims for it are large size, thin shell, well filled and very prolific.

James. Another variety from Mr. James. A medium sized, thin-shelled nut, of good shape and excellent quality.

Seedlings. We can supply seedlings from large, thin shell varieties to those who are unable to get budded or grafted sorts, owing to their great scarcity, or who may from choice wish to plant at less cost.
