HOW TO PLANT IT

HOW TO PLANT IT
The plotting of the garden will depend somewhat upon the shape of the piece of ground available, but we suggest you plant the rows to run north and south and make them long as possible. With long rows cultivation is easier than if divided in small beds, especially if a wheel hoe is used. The first items to be planted are early cabbage and tomatoes, in a hotbed if possible; if not, sow in boxes and keep in a warm place. Sow about the when the crops are removed the same plots can be used for navy beans, which you plant as late as June 15. Next plant peas in such manner that they may be succeeded by tomato plants and late cabbage. Beets, carrots, early turnips, parsnips and onions should go in early and in such manner that they may occupy the ground all summer. In this way you can use the roots as soon as large enough and in thinning out leave enough to grow to maturity for winter use. Dwarf beans and early corn are to be planted about the first of May, while late corn should go in the ground about May 10 with the Pie Pumpkins among them. Use turnips for fill in and occupy any vacant ground after July 15, while herbs may be sown any time the ground can be worked. These directions apply to latitude of Des Moines and should vary about a week for each hundred miles north or south.



SUGGESTIONS TO CUSTOMERS

Our constant aim is to make the highest quality the first consideration, and next to put our prices as low as good seed can be sold

Our constant aim is to make the highest quality the first consider Order Early: The best time to order is just as soon as you receive this catalogue, as we can always give your orders more of our personal attention if they come in before the rush of the spring trade. Please use the order sheet, as it makes it more convenient for us in filling orders. You will note there are two order sheets enclosed; one for seeds, tools and miscellaneous goods, and the other for plants, bulbs and nursery stock. If you will use them as intended, it will greatly facilitate the execution of your orders. Terms are invariably cash with order, as we keep no book accounts in our mail order department, and the expense of seending goods C. O. D. is quite large. Postage stamps received the same as cash.

Shipping: There are five express companies and fifteen railroad lines at bes Moines, so that quick shipments can be made to any town in the United States.

Charges Prepaid: All Vegetable and Flower Seeds, Bulbs and Plants, except those noted, are sent prepaid by mail or express by the quickest and most direct routes, unless ordered otherwise, and we guarantee the safe arrival. Seeds sold by the peck or bushel, Field Seeds, Potatoes, Implements and other heavy goods are sent by freight or express, customers paying charges. Remember seeds go at special rates by express.

Seeds by Mail: Seeds plants and bulbs may be sent by Parcel Post. The table of rates ware? Gives amount of rostage.

Seeds by Mail: Seeds, plants and bulbs may be sent by Parcel Post. The table of rates, page 2. gives amount of postage required on quantities over 1 pound. Miscellaneous merchandise may go by Parcel Post, and mailing weight is given on items of this kind.

Delivery: The point of delivery of all goods is on cars at Des Moines. When we quote a delivery price it means simply that we prepay the freight, express charges or postage.

Many of our farmer customers live at railroad stations where there are no agents. In such cases we must request them to send sufficient money to prepay freight charges on heavy shipments: also in cases where perishable or other goods are ordered to be sentby freight or express to such great distances that cost of transportation will nearly or quite equal the value of the goods.

Discounts: We have this year made the prices in this catalogue as low as our high grade seeds can be sold, and we can give no discounts. In ordering seeds in bulk you may deduct ten cents per pound on vegetable seeds, such as are listed prepaid, if you are willing to have them sent by express or freight at your expense.

Premiums: Each year we put up thousands of packets of new or particularly desirable varieties of seeds for free distribution to our customers. We will send these out with the seeds ordered by you and will treat you liberally in this respect. We shall also try to please our plant customers by adding something to their order when shipping it.

Our Responsibility: As this book will probably go into the hands of some who are unacquainted with us, this permission, to the People's Savings Bank of this city, to the postmaster, or to any express company.

What We Guarantee: That all money sent to us for seed shall reach us if sent us by registered letter, postoffice or express money order, or bank draft, made payable to our order. That your order will be filled promptly and well. That goods ordered will reach you safely. Keep a copy of your order. Sometimes persons think they have ordered articles which they have omitted, and blame us for not sending them.

About Warranting:

We thoroughly test all our seeds and nothing is sent out which we do not believe to be good in every respect. When it is considered how many are the contingencies on which the success of any crop depends, such as sowing too deep or too shallow, too wet or dry soil, unfavorable weather, insects, etc.. our customers will readily see that it would be sheer folly for anyone to warrant seeds to produce a perfect crop, and we want it plainly understood that while we exercise great care to have all seeds pure and reliable, and also true to name, we do not give any warranty express or implied as to description, quality, productiveness. or any other matter of any seeds, bulbs or plants we send out, and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these terms and conditions, they are to be returned at once, and the money that has and conditions, they are to be returned at once, and the money that has been paid for same will be refunded. No officer, agent or employe of this company is authorized to make any warranty whatsoever. However, we have so much confidence in our seeds that we hereby agree to refill any retail order for vegetable or flowerseeds free of charge should they prove otherwise than as we represent them. We know of no responsible seed firm in the world which guarantees seeds any further than this. Compare with other seed catalogues and you will see that we are right.

Market Gardeners and others who buy vegetable seeds in bulk to the amount of \$5.00 or more are requested to send their list of seeds wanted to us and let us make special quotations.

Plant Orders: Orders for plants will be filled as early in the spring as we consider itsafe to send them. If ordered for immediate shipment in severe weather they will be sent at purchaser's risk.

Small Orders: We take pains to fill orders promptly and correctly, no matter if only for but one packet of seeds, but we request that plant orders amount to at least 52 cents, and nursery stock to at least 50 cents, as otherwise they are filled at a loss to us.

SEEDS BY PARCELS POST

BE SURE AND ADD ONE POUND ADDITIONAL TO COVER WEIGHT OF PACKING

Many of our friends will prefer to have their seeds come by parcel post rather than by express. There is not much difference in the cost of transportation by these two methods, but if you want the seeds to come by mail you must send postage, because it must be prepaid. We submit herewith a table showing the postage per pound to each state. This is figured in the way to be most easily understood by our friends. The only thing to remember is to add one pound over the actual amount of seeds you order to cover the weight of packing. For example, you live in Alabama and you order three pounds of Gradus peas by parcel post. You will add 24 cents to the price quoted in the catalogue. If you live in Illinois and want 15 lbs. of peas by parcel post, add 64 cents to the price in the catalogue. If the postage you send is more than is necessary the sur-

If the postage you send is more than is necessary the surplus will be returned to you inclosed in a small envelope within the package. If you do not send postage we will take it for granted you want the goods forwarded by express or freight.

Remember that we pay the postage on garden seeds ordered by the packet, ounce, quarter pound or pound, no matter what the cost; but on larger quantities postage must be added if we are to send them by mail.



MARKET LETTER

The present indications are that seed values in nearly all lines will be higher in the coming season than for several years. There are some notable exceptions in the grass seed line, as some items will be comparatively cheap. On the other hand the Clovers are extremely high and scarce. We are expecting to urge our friends this year to make their purchases early because it looks as though there would be no trouble in disposing of all the stocks that are in the country. We believe that there is a real shortage and that late buyers may be disappointed in procuring some items which might be used to advantage.

The government's attitude on price values renders the market somewhat uncertain, but it is not the intention of the government to compel the marketing of high grade seed stocks at market values for ordinary products. It is impossible to produce pedigreed stocks of seed grain and offer them at anything like the market value of the ordinary grain. There is no comparison in value to the planter. The increased yield that may be expected from recleaned and graded stocks, grown by special care, is so great that it will repay many times the original cost of the seed used.

CLOVER SEED

Throughout the middle west the Common Red Clover killed out badly last winter with the natural result that there is but little, if any, seed in our state. The damage extended over a great part of the producing territory and the crop this year is shorter than usual, and in addition to this shortage, the amount of old seed carried over from last year is small, and none has been imported up to this date from across the water. It is simply a question of procuring supplies and not a question of price at the present time. The Alsike Clover is a little more plentiful than the Common Red variety and because it goes a great deal further in sowing than the Common Red, we believe it will prove popular with our farmers the coming spring. Alsike has all the good qualities of the Common Red, except size, and we can recommend to our friends that they use it freely. Alfalfa promises to be lower in price than the other Clovers and it would appear a very favorable time to make your purchase of this seed if you intend to use it the following spring.

Sweet Clover will be high in price to conform with the values of other Clovers. White Clover is almost impossible to procure. What little there is, will be needed for lawn and pasture mixtures and we do not think there is sufficient in the country to meet the demands of the trade, so those who contemplate using it should buy it early.

TIMOTHY SEED

Timothy is rather plentiful but the quality is not as good this year as last. The seed of the current season shows good vitality and is clean, but it has been badly hulled in the threshing and does not look so well as it has in other years. The price is not excessive. We are of the opinion, that when the active demand begins in spring, price will advance on this item. But little seed was sown last fall because of dry weather, so that most of the acreage will have to be planted the coming spring. The light grasses, such as Blue Grass, Orchard Grass, and Red Top, are much higher than a year ago and the increase in prices is caused by a short crop in Missouri, Illinois, Iowa and Kentucky, where the larger portion of these seeds are produced. We are fortunate to have secured a good supply of these grasses and will be able to care for our friends at current values with good new crop seed of high quality. There will be no inducement to withhold your orders on these items because the price will not decrease, and if any change occurs, it will be toward higher values. values.

SEED FORAGE

FORAGE SEED

It is too early yet to tell about the crops of Cane, Millet, Kaffir Corn and other forage crops; for while there is apparently a good yield of all of the items mentioned yet much of the seed has been injured by frosts and the germination will determine largely the future of these items. After the seed is harvested if it will show good germination, prices are likely to be fair. If, on the other hand, a part of the crop will not germinate, good stocks will command much higher price than at present.

SUDAN GRASS is becoming a great favorite for quick hay crop. Price of seed will not be so high as last year and per acre cost is in line with other forage crops. We made two cuttings from a part of the field this year. Got no seed from this plot but did get two crops of fine hay. We recommend it to our friends.

We have contracted in England for some Dwarf Essex Rape. We do not know yet whether we can get it delivered, but you can order it from this list subject to arrival and if it fails to come will fill your order from the ordinary grade, of which we have a good supply of the best we could procure. The English grown is better for sowing with small grain but the common stock will answer very well for summer sowing in open fields or among the corn.


Peas and Beans of all kinds will be very high in price. The government has undertaken to control the values of these in a measure and they may succeed in keeping values down to normal, but there is a great shortage everywhere and our friends should buy early such of these items as they will need. There is not enough in the country to supply the demand and late buyers may not be able to procure what they require at any price.

SEED CORN

new plant and had not been grown in Iowa. It was
widely advertised, and we offered it in deference to inquiry
from our friends. We purchased seed from growers in
Texas and planted a small plot of a few acres at our Altoona farm. It grew so splendidly and made such a magnificent crop of hay that we are urging our friends who
need an annual hay crop to plant Sudan Grass, believing it
will produce more tonnage per acre than any other grass
now grown. We know that it thrives in Iowa and from the

short time required for maturity we believe it can be grown anywhere in the United States with satisfactory results. We recommend Sudan Grass to take the place of the millets as a summer hay crop. This in our judgment is its most valued place in the agriculture of Iowa. It will do as a substitute for sorghum for fodder or Kaffir, Milo and Feterita as a forage plant, but we do not consider it as valuable in any other form as it is for hay. In quality it is far superior to the millets. It does not get "dusty," nor is it so "seedy" as millet hay, while it will yield much larger quantities per acre than any variety of millet generally grown. The seed is not expensive, and when the small quantity required per acre is considered, you will see that you can grow a crop of it at less cost than any of the milets. It costs more to produce Sudan Grass seed in Iowa than in the South, hence we are asking a higher price for home grown stocks. We will send whichever you prefer.

Prof. Jas. Atkinson, Editor of the Iowa Homestead,
Sudan Grass belongs to the same family as the sorghums,
and the Kaffir corn, and like plants, but does not grow so
coarse, while producing fully as much leaf growth in proportion to the crop. It grows to a height of seven or eight
feet, and the stalks vary in size from that of a lead pencil
to a half inch in diameter. It is not difficult to cure, and it
is claimed by those who have fed it to live stock to contain
a great amount of food value.

Owing to the great similarity of Sudan Grass and Johnson Grass, care has to be taken in the selection of the seed.
Johnson Grass is a perennial—that is to say, when once established it is hard to get rid of, as the winters do not destroy it. We have not offered Johnson Grass for a number
of years because of this fact, and because it was unpopular
with our farmers. The Sudan Grass, however, being annual
in its nature, does not survive the winter and is not obnoxious nor difficult to get rid of.
Sudan Grass may be planted in cultivated rows, in close
drills, or broadcast. If in cultivated rows, we recommend
they be made 36 inches apart, using about 3 lbs. of seed
per acre. It stools wonderfully if given room; this planting
will produce a tremendous crop. Sometimes as much as
fifteen or twenty tons per acre is produced. In the dry
regions this is the best planting process. Usually the crop
can be cut twice during the summer, making a second
growth from the roots when the first cutting is removed.

WE URGE EVERY FARMER CUSTOMER TO TRY A FEW ACRES

Where there is plenty of rainfall, it may be sown in drills 18 inches apart, using 6 lbs. per acre, or it may be sown broadcast, using 15 to 20 lbs. per acre. Either method makes a solid mass of hay, but in our judgment the broadcast method produces finer quality hay, although not so much tonnage.



By the broadcast method recommended we mean either seeding and harrowing, or using the grain drill as in sowing rye or other small grained cereals.

As with millet and cane and other plants of similar nature, we believe in heavy seeding for Sudan Grass, because what is lacking in quantity is more than made up in quality, and if sown thickly as suggested in the last paragraph, live stock can consume the entire crop.

Because it belongs to the millet and sorghum family, it is not to be planted until the ground is thoroughly warm. Our recommendation is early June. In some seasons it might be started at corn planting time in May, but we believe as good results can be obtained by sowing after the corn has been planted, and is out of the way.







It is now being used in spring sowing exactly as common red clover. Some farmers seed it with small grain for nurse crop, while others are sowing it alone in early spring and securing both pasturage and hay the first year. The handling of this crop has passed the experimental stage. We have ceased to handle seed in the hull, as we now have machines to hull and clean it, so that we offer it in as high quality and purity as any clover. This is a great step forward, and our customers will appreciate the difference if they compare crops from our stock with that grown from ordinary seed.

SCARIFYING THE SEED.—One great difficulty with sweet clover in the past was slow germination. In the natural condition the seed has a very hard hull and the germ does not start quickly. Sometimes spring sown seed would not sprout until fall, and at best only about 70 per cent germination might be expected. Prof. H. D. Hughes, of the lowa Agricultural College, at Ames, Iowa, has perfected a machine to scarify the seed, and kindly permitted us to install one in our warehouse so that we can now supply our customers with seed that will show a high percentage of germination. The process of scarifying results in rubbing the seed against sandpaper, so that the hull is very thin, while in other respects the seed retains its normal condition, except the microscopic scratches in the seed-coat show where the sandpaper has chipped it. Of course it costs a little more to add the extra cost of labor, and the loss by shrinkage is considerable, but you get value received. A bushel of scarified seed will give you 25 per cent greater germination than untreated seed, and is really worth that much more to the planter. Use 12 to 15 lbs. of scarified seed per acre. This gives a heavy stand resulting in hay of fine texture and quality.

Sweet Clover belongs to the fertility of the soil on which

on land where there is no plant food apparently. It will be found growing wild in railroad cuts, about the mouths of abandoned coal mines, or steep hillsides where stone crops out—in fact it will grow under more adverse conditions than any of the coarser grasses, and every place it grows it enriches the soil and prepares it to produce the more economic grains and grasses. Many times a farmer wants to start a field of sweet clover in the fall. This is readily done, and by this method you get it out of the way of spring work. Sow in late October on thoroughly prepared ground. The seed will lay in the ground all winter and sprout in early spring. We believe you get quicker growth and larger crops with fall sown seed, although since the scarifying process has been perfected much quicker growth is now secured with spring sown seed.

If you sow scarified seed with small grain in early spring you can reasonably expect to cut a crop of hay in October. If preferred the crop can be turned under in fall plowing and by this method you can build up the soil without using the clover rotation if you so desire. Sweet clover can be sown among the corn at last cultivation and turned under the following spring, or it may be used for pasturage or hay during the summer. It has a permanent place in agriculture and we expect to see it increase in popularity. This year there is a splendid crop of seed throughout the country. 

DIRECTIONS FOR SOWING, ETC.—The conditions and requirements of the several species as to soil, moisture, heat, etc., should be studied and observed in culture. We give a few general instructions though more complete directions are printed on seed packets. The soil best adapted to most flowers is light, rich loam, containing enough sand to make it porous. If there is some clay with it the colors will be brighter. Make surface smooth and fine as possible; sow seeds in rows, covering each sort of seed in proportion to its size and you should possible; sow seeds in rows, covering each sort of seed in proportion to its size and you should press the soil down firmly over the seeds. Do not plant any seeds when the ground is wet. Many varieties, such as pansy, verbena, daisy, hollyhock and the fine greenhouse plant seeds, should be sown early in shallow boxes in the house, in soil consisting of equal parts of fine sand and rich mellow lear well mixed together. nouse, in soil consisting of equal parts of fine sand and rich, mellow loam well mixed together and sifted to remove all gravel and lumps. Sow as before directed. Covering the box with glass helps to retain the moisture and keeps the temperature even. Be careful not to keep too wet, and when large enough to handle, transplant to boxes from one to two inches apart to remain until put in permanent beds.












