CULTURAL DIRECTIONS.


The gladiolus will do well in almost any good garden soil. Do not plant in the shade of trees or buildings. May be planted from middle of April to latter part of May. Plant in rows, five—six inches deep, four to six inches between each bulb in the row and about eighteen inches between the rows. Keep the top soil continually loose and free from weeds. In case of a long severe drought, soak the soil thoroughly once a week at least. In cutting the flower spike allow at least four leaves to remain on the plant. It weakens the bulb to cut stem too low. Dig bulbs in the fall, cut top one-half inch from bulb. After drying in open air for a week or two, clean them and store away in a dark, dry, cool but frost-proof place in the cellar.

GLADIOLUS AS CUT FLOWER.

On account of its good keeping qualities the gladiolus surpasses all other flowers for cutting purposes. A bouquet can be kept fresh in a vase for a week or more. Not only that but the blooms will prove even larger, brighter and more beautiful and perfect in every way when cut than when out in the sunny garden. Cut spike in the morning when the first bloom opens and give fresh water daily. Every bud will then open to the very too.

Beside in bouquets the gladiolus blooms can be arranged as "center pieces" in very dainty designs. Place some tips of spikes or single blooms in shallow dishes and put in a few branches of fern or asparagus as a veil over the whole design. You will be surprised at the result.

ADVICE TO BEGINNERS: Start with a few hundred bulbs of a good mixture. They are inexpensive. As they will bloom at different times, you can cut many-colored bouquets during the whole blooming season. Add to your collection some of the finer named varieties, from time to time.

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
