

BEFORE SENDING YOUR ORDER READ PARCEL POST INSTRUCTIONS, and NOTE WHETHER PRICES QUOTED INCLUDE POSTAGE, if not add postage as may be required.

Parcel Post Instructions

Parcel Post rates are fixed by zones. The greater the distance the higher the rate.

PLEASE NOTE THAT OUR PRICES ON ALL GARDEN SEEDS INCLUDE POSTAGE UNLESS SPECIFIED OTHERWISE. In the first and second zones we lay down all garden seeds, including BEANS, PEAS and SWEET CORN, on which other houses charge postage. The first and second zones include all territory within 150 miles in a straight line from Twin Falls. Your zone is noted on inside cover of catalog.

The above applies ONLY to GARDEN SEEDS and NOT TO FIELD SEEDS or SUP-PLIES, UNLESS SO SPECIFIED IN CATALOG QUOTATIONS.

Outside the second zone our prices on all GARDEN SEEDS INCLUDE POSTAGE except on PEAS, BEANS and SWEET CORN.

If located outside the second zone and you wish your order to come by mail, add postage on Peas, Beans, Sweet Corn, Field Seeds and other goods as follows:

3RD ZONE (up to 300 miles from Twin Falls): 6c for the first pound, 1c for each additional pound.

4TH ZONE (up to 600 miles from Twin Falls): 7c for the first pound, 2c for each additional pound.

5TH ZONE (up to 1000 miles from Twin Falls): 8c for the first pound, 4c for each additional pound.

Up to 70 POUNDS can be mailed in the FIRST and SECOND and THIRD ZONES. Beyond the THIRD ZONE 50 pounds is the weight limit.

All prices quoted by freight or express are f. o. b. Twin Falls—You pay the freight or express.

ALSIKE OR SWEDISH CLOVER

ALSIAL OF SWEDISH CLOVER This is one of the hardiest varieties known. It is perennial and does not winter kill. It will do better on moist land than any other variety of clover and is suitable for either hay or pasture. When sown with other grasses it forms a thick undergrowth and greatly increas-es the yield. Perhaps its greatest value to this section is as a seed producer. It never fails to seed here and produces a very high yield of fine quality seed. A hard clover to keep pure and free from weeds, hence it is very impor-tant that you sow clean seed. Our stock of alsike is particularly free from weeds and of high quality. Sow 6 to 8 lbs. per acre. WHITE OR DUTCH CLOVER

A low, close growing clover, round, white heads, very fragrant. Very desirable for lawn mixtures. If cut young it makes fine hay, claimed

to be equal in feeding value to the best alfalfa hay. In this western country its groatest value is as a pasture plant, produces more feed than any other grass or forage plant with practically no danger of bloat. Sweet clover is particular-ly valuable as pasture for our stock men of this section and many of them are now sowing it extensively. It is the best clover to mix with tame pastures, we recommend it in all of our mixtures. Fine to sow on alkali soils, will grow on land so strong in alkali that few other plants will thrive and when started on such soils, it reduces the alkali, redeeming the land for other crops. to be equal in feeding value to the best alfalfa other crops.

Sow at the rate of 10 to 12 lbs. per acre, as you would sow alfalfa or other clovers. On ac-count of the hardiness of the seeds, Sweet Clo-ver is slow to germinate and often fails to make a good stand. SCARIFYING the seed over-comes the difficulty and practically insures a

CRIMSON CLOVER

This is an annual clover, used extensively in some sections as a fertilizer of worn out soils. In this section should be sown in the spring of the year, as it is apt to winter kill if sown in the fall. Will make a hay or seed crop the first season. This would be a good variety for sow-ing in orchards as a cover crop. A crop of hay or seed could be cut the first season from sow-ing and it could then be turned under, leaving the ground in fine condition. Should be sown 10 to 15 lbs. per acre in same manner as you would handle red clover. Write for prices.

This grass is a fav-orite in Southern Idaho; we recommend it in all pasture mixtures. Some of our customers are talking of raising Meadow Fescue as a seed crop, and we are in-clined to encourage them in this, as it appears like a profitable crop, looks best of all grasses as a seed proposition for this section. In buy-ing our stock we use great care to have it pure and of high quality in order that any seed pro-duced from it may be of the same quality. ITALIAN RYE GRASS

This resembles the English Rye Grass. Makes a great growth the first season from sowing. Valuable for pasture and hay, grows very quick-ly and will stand close pasturing. A very fine grass.

TALL MEADOW OAT GRASS

A strong growing very vigorous grass of ex-ceedingly fine quality either for pasture or hay. As a hay grass a better quality than Timothy; also a better yielder; a very rapid grower; will make a crop of hay quickly the first season from sowing. As a pasture grass it can not be beat-en; grows very fast, comes early in spring and remains green in the fall later than any other grass we know of. A good grass for irrigated lands; also good where water is deficient, as it seems to stand drouth remarkably well.

RED TOP

A valuable grass for moist rich soils, where it thrives to best advantage. It should be fed close; if allowed to grow up to seed cattle dis-like it. On good soils grows about two feet tall. A good grass to grow in connection with other grasses. If your land is low and moist try Red Top. Sow about 10 lbs. per acre of hulled seed. We strongly recommend a mix-ture of Red Top and Alsike Clover for water-logged lands or low places. See price list following.

BROMUS INERMIS-BROME GRASS

A very hardy drouth resisting grass. Yields heavy crops and makes abundant pasture. We particularly recommend brome grass to be sown on high dry lands. It will withstand drouth better than any other grass we know of. We do not recommend brome to be sown on irri-gated lands. Sow 20 to 24 lbs. per acre broad-cast. Can be sown any time of year, but per-haps the best time is early spring. See price list following. See price list following.

TIMOTHY

As a hay crop timothy is probably unsur-passed by any other grass. Especially good for horse feed. We do not recommend timothy for pastures as there are so many more valuable grasses for that purpose. Fine for mixing with red or alsike clover for hay. Sow 12 lbs. per acre when sown alone with grain. See price list below.

Pasture Mixtures

We do not offer a prepared mixture for pas-tures, preferring to let our customers buy the grasses separately and do their own mixing. In this way the customer knows exactly what he is buying and sowing, which he does not know when sowing a prepared mixture. We recommend the following as the mixture best adapted to our soil and weather condi-tions, and claim it will carry more stock per acre and produce better feed than any other mixture you could sow. Use not less than 20 lbs. per acre as follows: 5 lbs. Kentucky Blue Grass

5 lbs. Kentucky Blue Grass.
5 lbs. Meadow Fescue.
6 lbs. Orchard Grass.
4 lbs. Perennial Rye Grass.

In addition to above we recommend that you sow 2 to 5 lbs. of Sweet Clover (scarified seed); there is no better legume to use in a pasture mixture. It makes an abundance of fine feed with practically no danger from bloat and great-ly fertilizes the soil, causing the grass to grow more vigorously.

If you do not use the Sweet Clover then you should use 2 lbs. either Red or Alsike Clover;

to get best results you must use a legume in grass pasture.



Some may object to putting clover in the mixture for fear of bloating stock, but it is absolutely necessary to have a legume in grass mixtures in this country in order to fertilize the grass and produce a good, strong, vigorous growth. It is only where the clover predomin-ates in a mixture that there is danger from bloat. We have recommended and sold the above mixture for many years and find no com-plaint of bloat. plaint of bloat.

plaint of bloat. If you want a mixture without clover, we suggest that you increase the amount of Peren-nial Rye Grass to six pounds per acre and the Kentucky Blue Grass and Meadow Fescue to six pounds each. You will need more grass if you do not use the clover. Grass should be sown by itself and never with grain. Sow either early in spring or in August. We recommend the spring sowing as best. Sow broadcast on well prepared ground and harrow lightly. Keep well watered and do not pas-ture the first season. If you will follow our instructions you will have a pasture that will carry the maximum number of stock the second season from sowing.

Field Beans

The bean growing industry is one of great importance to Southern Idaho, and growing more important from year to year. It has been found that this section can successfully com-pete with Michigan and California on beans. Where properly grown beans yield very heavy in this section and are proving a profitable and inexpensive crop to handle. In sections where there is danger of water shortage we strongly recommend the growing of beans as they require very little irrigation. We have known good crops of beans to be raised in this section with no irrigation. It is very important that a good quality of seed be planted as poor or mixed stock is not marketable or if they can be sold must sell at a discount.

Commercial Beans are a good crop for Idaho—A good crop for the small and the large farm.

How to Handle the Bean Crop

Since beans have been attracting so much at-tention in this section, we are receiving many inquiries as to how the crop should be handled. Since we have grown large acreages of beans ourselves, also large acreages under contract in past years in this section, we feel qualified to advise our customers on this subject. To start with, it is well to remember that beans require a settled but well cultivated seed bed. The right kind of seed bed can best be obtained by plowing the ground thoroughly in the fall of the year, first water the ground be-fore plowing. If plowed in the fall the soil will settle naturally and sufficiently during the win-ter. As soon as spring opens and soil is dry enough to work, harrow thoroughly but not too deeply with a spike tooth harrow. Do not use a disc or spring tooth harrow for this work, as such tools will loosen the soil too deep and overcome the natural settling which has taken place during the winter. Repeat this harrow-ing every ten days or two weeks, to kill all young weeds that are starting and conserve the natural moisture. If it has been impossible to plow the ground in the fail plowing should he done first thing

If it has been impossible to plow the ground in the fall, plowing should be done first thing in the spring, following immediately with the harrow and handled as outlined above. Plant-ing should be done about the 15th to 20th of May. Before planting, ground should be thor-oughly irrigated unless you are sure that the soil and sub-soil are thoroughly moist and in good condition to carry the crop to the blos-soming period without further watering. Plant or sow about 60 lbs, of good clean beans

good condition to carry the crop to the blos-soming period without further watering. Plant or sow about 60 lbs. of good clean beans of straight variety (if seed stock shows any mixture whatever it should be hand picked) per acre, using a grain drill properly regulated to sow evenly. Do not plant too deep, just deep enough to get the seed in moist soil and following the seeding with a light harrowing. After the crop is well through the ground it should be harrowed lightly to kill all young weeds that may be starting in the rows. Beans should be planted in rows, by stopping up the hose of the drill to proper widths. 28 inches apart is a good distance for beans, but if you have a proper adjustable cultivator for handling the crop they will stand closer planting if de-sired. Cultivate the crop thoroughly to keep down the weeds and conserve moisture. Weeds must not be permitted to grow in the crop or they will greatly reduce the yield and may in-jure the quality of the crop.

It is impossible to lay down rures for the watering of beans, or any other crop. The soil should be kept in a moist growing condi-tion, but do not over-water at any time or you are apt to greatly injure the crop. It is well not to water after beans begin to set on the vines, but there should be suffi-cient moisture in the soil, applied before that time, to carry the crop to maturity. When the pods are nearly all ripe, cut the crop with a sled cutter beneath the ground or with a regu-lar bean cutter built for the purpose. As fast as the crop is cut it should be bunched up with forks in pretty good sized piles and threshed or stacked as soon as dry. Thresh-ing should be done with a regular bean thresher, not with a grain thresher, unless the latter has been geared down very low to prevent splitting. If these directions are followed you should get a profitable crop of beans running from 20 to 40 bushels per acre. Commercial or white field beans are proving one of the big money crops in the Twin Falls section and they are as stable as wheat in the markets. If we have overlooked any points on the grow-







When an asparagus bed is started from seed, when an asparagus bed is started from seed, the seed should be sown in the open ground in early spring and plants transplanted to the permanent bed when one year old. One ounce of seed will sow 50 feet of row. Asparagus grows to perfection in Idaho.



Culture—About May first or soon as danger of frost is past and ground is warm, plant in drills 18 inches to 2 feet apart and cover lightly. Cultivate well to keep down weeds. Tobacco

Culture—Plant in hot beds or in open ground in early spring and protect young plants carefully against frost, as they are very tender. Transplant about June 10th to rows about 30 inches apart and place plants about 40 inches apart in rows. Cultivate well and do not let plants blossom, but cut seed heads off soon as they appear. Cut plants off close to ground before frost and hang up in well ventilated place to cure. 
