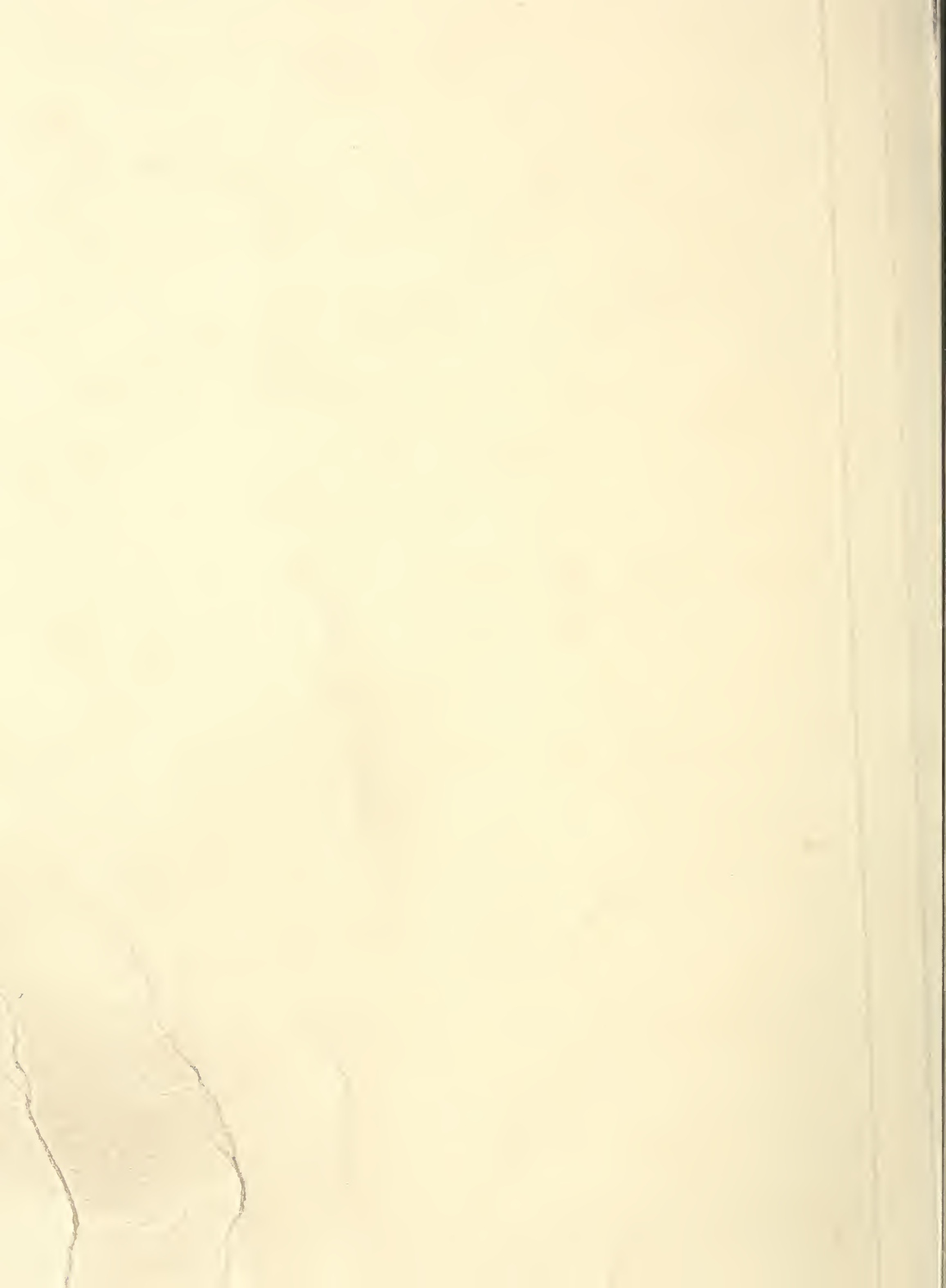

PURCHASER PAYS TRANSPORTATION on Trees, Plants, Shrubs, Potatoes, Farm Seeds, Grass Seeds, Implements, Sundries and Poultry Supplies; also Seed by lb., gallon, peck and bushel, Bulbs except where specified.

EARLY ORDERING—It will be helpful to our customers, as well as ourselves, to have orders placed early. Our policy is to make prompt shipments, but this is impossible as the busy season reaches its height. If your order is received late we may be sold out, as in case of shortage of crops this season, with no more stock obtainable. Send your order early, we will do the rest.

ACCOUNTS—Parties who have no account with us must furnish satisfactory references, St. Louis preferred, on account of a saving of time. Charge orders from unknown parties not accompanied with references will be delayed, pending the usual investigation.

REMITTANCES should be made in the form of Express Money Order, P. O. Money Order, Bank Draft, or Registered Letter. Plants will not be shipped C. O. D.

WE MAKE NO CHARGE FOR PACKING CASES, baskets or barrels. We charge for cloth bags only and these at cost. Price: Pk. bags, 10c; 1/2 Bu., 15c; Bu., 20c; Seamless, 65c.

(c) Parcels weighing more than 8 ounces containing seeds, bulbs and plants, etc., according to distance or zone, at the pound rates shown in the following table, a fraction of a pound being considered a full pound.

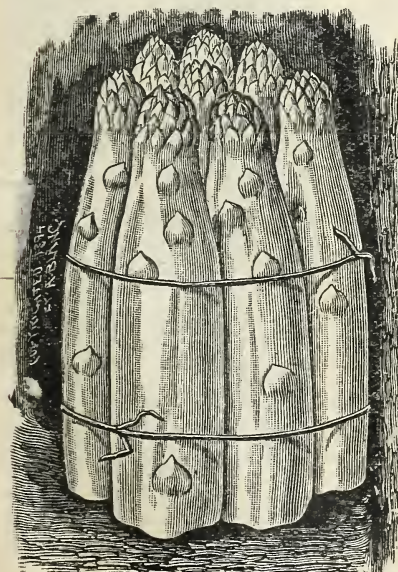

CULTURE—In February or March sow in hotbed, transplant to the open in May in rows three or four feet apart, and two feet apart in the rows. Should give globes the same year. Seed sown in May and transplanted in June has to be wintered. Tie up leaves, then bank with dirt; will mature the second year.

Giant Green Globe—Produces large globular heads, thick, succulent scales, the bottom of which is the edible part. Boiled till tender, it makes a delicious dish.....

Jerusalem Artichoke—Sometimes used as a table vegetable when pickled, but their greatest value is for feeding stock. Tubers by express.....

CULTURE.—Plant about the first of May in rows, placing the seeds 2 to 3 inches apart in drills and about 2½ inches deep. The rows should be about 2½ feet apart, and the soil slightly hilled, to insure good drainage and keep the Beans from touching the ground.

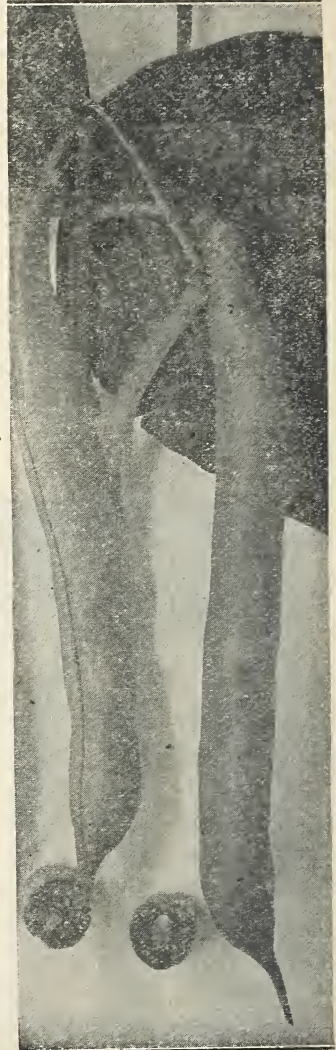

CULTURE—Seed should be sown the first part of April, placing rows about 18 inches apart, and the drills 1 inch deep. When seedlings appear about 3 inches above ground, thin out to about 4 inches between the plants.

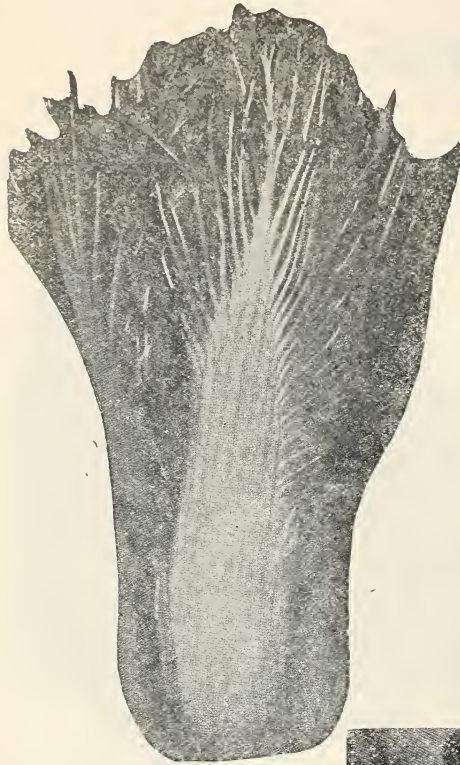

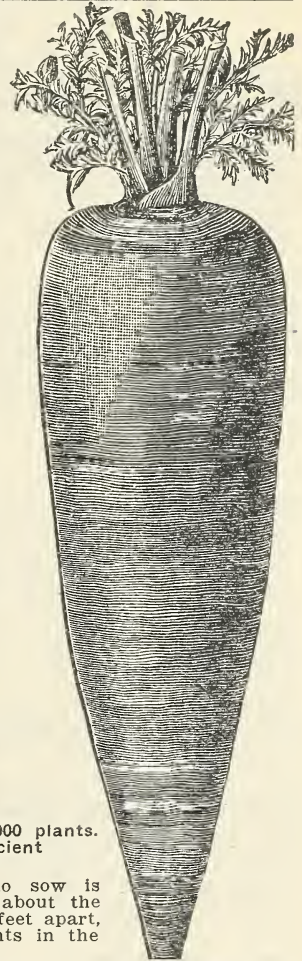

MAY be grown in a great variety of situations—a dark room, cellar, stable or elsewhere. Any place in which an even temperature of about 50 or 60 degrees can be kept, is suitable. For materials for the bed, use fresh horse manure, free from straw or chips and good loamy soil. Some growers use the manure unmixed with loam, after first having well fermented it by alternately piling up and mixing for a few weeks; but it is undoubtedly better not to allow the manure to heat much before forming the bed. Use one-fourth to one-third loam, the rest manure. Mix very thoroughly and upon a dry, firm bottom; make the bed of this mixture about four feet wide, and of any desired length. Build it up evenly, pressing it down very firmly, and leave it about a foot high. It will shortly begin to heat. Use a thermometer to thrust into bed, and note in the temperature. When the heat has partially subsided, leaving a temperature of 70 to 80 degrees, put in the spawn. Pieces from the size of walnuts to that of eggs are placed in the bed about a foot apart, deep enough to cover them well, and the manure pressed down. Let it remain thus ten or twelve days; then cover with two inches of fresh loam, and make this moderately firm.

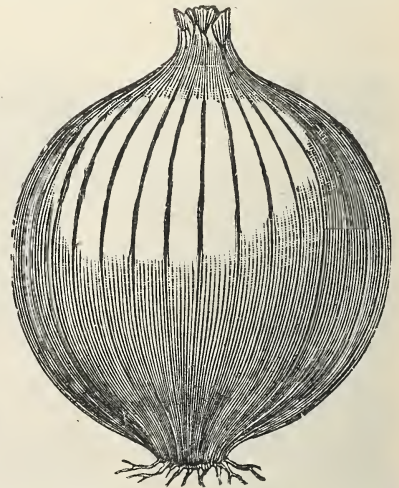

CULTURE.—For early use sow seed in hotbed in March, or open ground in May, in rows one foot apart. Cover very lightly and thin out when large enough to six or eight inches in row. They should be cut on a dry day, before they come into full blossom. Tie in bunches and keep where they will dry quickly.

The varieties marked an asterisk (*) are hardy perennials. To preserve herbs properly, cut the stems and leaves just as the plant is coming into bloom, dry them in the shade, and when perfectly dry wrap them up in a paper or store them away in a dry room, or rub the leaves to a powder, pack in bottles and cork tightly, and store them away, which will preserve them for any period.

ASPARAGUS ROOTS

CULTURE—The demand for Asparagus as an early Spring vegetable is becoming quite popular. An Asparagus bed intended for family use can be quickly established by the planting of roots, which should be set out in the Spring in rich soil. Dig a trench about 2 feet deep and 1½ feet wide, and fill in to about one foot from the surface with well-rotted manure. On this put about six inches of good garden soil and lay the roots 18 inches apart; then fill up, leaving the crown about 4 inches below the surface. Asparagus should not be cut until the second year.

PERMANENT PASTURE MIXTURES

FOR every different kind and condition of soil there are a large number of grasses which are especially suitable. Some sorts do best on high ground and in dry weather; others prefer plenty of moisture. Some mature so early and others so late that from the beginning of Spring until Winter sets in there is no time when one species or another is not at its best.

Pasture Mixture "A"—Good moist soils. Sow 25 pounds per acre. This is intended for the average soil. Use more seed where land is drier. If stock does not keep down to six or ten inches, use the mower to do so. Do not pasture too closely. This is well suited for "patching" your present pasture by disking or harrowing in.....

Pasture Mixture "B"—Dry, hilly uplands. Sow fifteen to twenty pounds per acre. Recommended for rolling ground, or where stones or sand in soil demand drought-resisting varieties. Plow or disk in where possible, and on unplowed, stumpy or stony ground brush thoroughly.....

Pasture Mixture "C"—Shaded pastures. Sow 25 to 30 pounds per acre. This is especially planned to suit the woods, which is often waste except for its timber. Get the seed on and into the ground; do not leave on top of the leaves. The more open use the more seed.....

INFORMATION OF SOWING LAWNS AND THEIR CARE.

ONE LB. WILL SOW 300 SQUARE FEET, 40 TO 50 LBS. TO THE ACRE.

THE ground should be thoroughly drained and well prepared, but the surface should be as much alike in quality as possible and thoroughly pulverized. After sowing, the ground should be rolled in order to press the seed firmly into the soil. The proper time to sow grass seed depends, of course, upon the latitude. In this vicinity from early Spring to hot weather. Seed may also be sown in the Fall, provided it is done early enough to secure a good, strong growth before Winter sets in. The sowing should be done when the ground is moist, or before an expected rain, and a subsequent rolling is always advisable. As to weeds in newly made lawns, it may not be generally known, but many weed seeds actually lie dormant on the ground for six or seven years and will germinate and make their appearance when the soil is turned up. It requires at least 1 lb. of seed to every 300 square feet of ground, not already seeded, to give best results.

ROLLING—As soon as the frost is out of the ground in the Spring, the land should be gone over with a heavy roller. Winter frosts loosen

the soil, and rolling is necessary to compress it again. If grass seed is to be sown, this should be done first and the rolling immediately afterward. Roll frequently.

MOWING—All turf-forming grasses are improved, both in vigor of root-growth and in fineness of texture by frequent mowings. It is impossible to say just how often the grass should be mown, as that depends upon the rate at which it grows. Too close cutting should be guarded against, however, especially during the hot Summer months, when the roots require some top growth to protect them from the burning sun. A good top growth is also necessary to protect the roots from severe winter frosts.

TO GRASS A BANK OR TERRACE—For each square rod, take a pound of lawn-grass seed, and mix it thoroughly with 6 cubic feet of good, dry garden loam; place in a tub, and add liquid manure, diluted with about two-thirds of water, so as to bring the whole to the consistency of mortar. The slope must be made perfectly smooth, and then well watered, after which the paste should be applied.

Set them about 18 inches apart each way.

HERBACEOUS PEONIES

Peonies can be delivered from early March until the end of April, and again from September on and until freezing time in the Fall.

THE old-fashioned Paeony officinalis of our grandmother's garden, while still popular because of their early flowering, have been eclipsed by the wonderful improvement sorts introduced in recent years. They are the "Queen of Spring Flowers," and are well adapted for massing in beds, and particularly valuable for planting in groups throughout the perennial or shrubby border where their brilliant hues add attraction to all around. They are perfectly hardy, requiring no protection whatever, even in the most severe climate, are not troubled with insect pests or diseases of any kind, and once planted take care of themselves, increasing in beauty each year. An important point to observe in the planting of Herbaceous Peonies is not to plant too deep. The roots should be placed so that the crowns are covered with 2 inches of soil. Too deep planting is a frequent cause of shy flowering.
