AY be grown in a great variety of situations—a dark room, cellar, stable or elsewhere. Any place in which an even temperature of about 50 or 60 degrees can be kept, is suitable. For materials for the bed, use fresh horse manure, free from straw or chips and good loamy soil. Some growers use the manure unmixed with loam, after first having well fermented it by alternately piling up and mixing for a few weeks; but it is undoubtedly better not to allow the manure to heat much before forming the bed. Use one-fourth to one-third loam, the rest manure. Mix very thoroughly and upon a dry, firm bottom; make the bed of this mixture about four feet wide, and of any desired length. Build it up evenly, pressing it down very firmly, and leave it about a foot high. It will shortly begin to heat. \*Use a thermometer to thrust into bed, and note in the temperature. When the heat has partially subsided, leaving a temperature of 70 to 80 degrees, put in the spawn. Pieces from the size of walnuts to that of eggs are placed in the bed about a foot apart, deep enough to cover them well, and the manure pressed down. Let it remain thus ten or twelve days; then cover with two inches of fresh loam, and make this moderately firm.

CULTURE.—For early use sow seed in hotbed in March, or open ground in May, in rows one foot apart. Cover very lightly and thin out when large enough to six or eight inches in row. They should be cut on a dry day, before they come into full blossom. Tie in bunches and keep where they will dry quickly.

The varieties marked an asterisk (\*) are hardy perennials. To preserve herbs properly, cut the stems and leaves just as the plant is coming into bloom, dry them in the shade, and when perfectly dry wrap them up in a paper or store them away in a dry room, or rub the leaves to a powder, pack in bottles and cork tightly, and store them away, which will preserve them for any period.

An Asparagus bed intended for family use can be quickly established by the planting of roots, which should be set out in the Spring in rich soil. Dig a trench about 2 feet deep and 1½ feet wide, and fill in to about one foot from the surface with well-rotted manure. On this put about six inches of good garden soil and lay the roots 18 inches apart; then fill up, leaving the crown about 4 inches below the surface. ### INFORMATION OF SOWING LAWNS AND THEIR CARE.

ONE LB. WILL SOW 300 SQUARE FEET, 40 TO 50 LBS. TO THE ACRE.

HE ground should be thoroughly drained and well prepared, but the surface should be as much alike in quality as possible and thoroughly pulverized. After sowing, the ground should be rolled in order to press the seed firmly into the soil. The proper time to sow grass seed depends, of course, upon the latitude. In this vicinity from early Spring to hot weather. Seed may also be sown in the Fall, provided it is done early enough to secure a good, strong growth before Winter sets in. The sowing should be done when the ground is moist, or before an expected rain, and a subsequent rolling is always advisable. As to weeds in newly made lawns, it may not be generally known, but many weed seeds actually lie dormant on the ground for six or seven years and will germinate and make their appearance when the soil is turned up. It requires at least 1 lb. of seed to every 300 square feet of ground, not already seeded, to give best results.

ROLLING—As soon as the frost is out of the ground in the Spring, the land should be gone over with a heavy roller. Winter frosts loosen

the soil, and rolling is necessary to compress it again. If grass seed is to be sown, this should be done first and the rolling immediately afterward. Roll frequently.

MOWING—All turf-forming grasses are improved, both in vigor of root-growth and in fineness of texture by frequent mowings. It is impossible to say just how often the grass should be mown, as that depends upon the rate at which it grows. Too close cutting should be guarded against, however, especially during the hot Summer months, when the roots require some top growth to protect them from the burning sun. A good top growth is also necessary to protect the roots from severe winter frosts.

TO GRASS A BANK OR TERRACE—For each square rod, take a pound of lawn-grass seed, and mix it thoroughly with 6 cubic feet of good, dry garden loam; place in a tub, and add liquid manure, diluted with about two-thirds of water, so as to bring the whole to the consistency of mortar. The slope must be made perfectly smooth, and then well watered, after which the paste should be applied.

# **ASTERS**

ORMANT Canna roots may be started indoors during March or April, but should not be set out until the weather is settled and the ground warm, usually May or June in this latitude. When planting dormant roots, do not set too deep. The eye should show a little through the ground. Plant in good, rich garden soil mixed with one-half of old, rotted stable manure. Set them about 18 inches apart each way.

# HERBACEOUS PEONIES

Peonies can be delivered from early March until the end of April, and again from September on and until freezing time in the Fall.

THE old-fashioned Paeony officinalis of our grandmother's garden, while still popular because of their early flowering, have been eclipsed by the wonderful improvement sorts introduced in recent years. They are the "Queen of Spring Flowers," and are well adapted for massing in beds, and particularly valuable for planting in groups throughout the perennial or shrubbery border where their brilliant nues add attraction to all around. They are perfectly hardy, requiring no protection whatever, even in the most severe climate, are not troubled with insect pests or diseases of any kind, and once planted take care of themselves, increasing in beauty each year. An important point to observe in the planting of Herbaceous Peonies is not to plant too deep. The roots should be placed so that the crowns are covered with 2 inches of soil. Too deep planting is a frequent cause of shy flowering.
