

### SIMPLE RULES FOR ORDERING BE SURE TO READ THIS PAGE

OUR CONSTANT AIM IS TO MAKE THE HIGHEST QUALITY THE FIRST CONSIDERATION, AND NEXT, TO PUT OUR PRICES AS LOW AS GOOD SEED CAN BE SOLD

Next in importance to supplying the best seeds is the prompt and accurate filling of orders. To that end we ask the co-operation of our patrons. It will hasten forwarding materially, if they will kindly make up orders alphabetically, as the goods are offered in the catalogue. This method is easier and is a safeguard against neglecting to order some item of importance. Seeds are put in compartments in our stores alphabetically, hence an order can be filled more quickly if it is made out in that manner.

**CATALOGUE CHANGE.**—We have made one important change, which we believe you will like. We quote all seeds by pound instead of pint, quart, peck and bushel.

**TESTED SEEDS.** We employ an expert seed analyst especially to test all of our seeds for both purity and germination and have a large electric tester, built according to the plans approved by the Government Department of Agriculture. The value of tested seeds to the buyer cannot be over-estimated. It is an assurance to you that the seed is full of vigorous life and vitality, and that if you plant under proper conditions and follow our instructions you will not be disappointed.

**ERRORS.** We exercise the utmost care in filling orders, striving to do a little more than we offer; yet in the press of business errors sometimes occur, in which event we wish to be promptly notified of the fact and will make such corrections as will be satisfactory. Errors made in printing are subject to correction. Please keep copies of all your orders for comparison.

OUR TERMS are cash with order. We cannot ship C. O. D. unless you remit at least onefourth of the amount of the order. It always costs you extra for goods to come that way. We will take your personal check, but will hold order till banks report checks paid. Better send us Draft, Money Order, or Registered Letter. We always refund your money if we cannot fill order.

MARRIED WOMEN will save confusion in correspondence by always using husband's initials.

HOW WE SHIP. We ship all heavy goods by freight at your expense, unless otherwise instructed. We send you duplicate bill of lading, showing date, number of bags sent, and route. All plants and perishable goods are sent only by express at your expense, unless quoted "prepaid," in which case we send by mail or prepaid express, and notify you.

SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee all goods except sweet potatoes to arrive safely and will refund you for any loss, providing you have Agent make notation of such loss on expense bill and return it to us. This applies on Irish potatoes if time of shipment is left to our judgment.

We also guarantee all seeds that we send out at catalog prices to be carefully selected and tested. We are always pleased to make good any mistake, but all complaints must be made within 15 days from receipts of goods. On account of weather conditions, etc., we cannot guarantee the crop. You can have the Experiment Station test any of our seed and if not satisfactory will take it back and refund to you.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY. We have been in business here for 30 years. We would be pleased to have you write (enclosing stamp) any bank or business firm here in Lincoln as to our standing.


LARGE ORDERS. Any market gardener, association, or individual requiring large quantities of seeds, are invited to write for special prices. Although we have made our prices in this catalog very low, yet when a considerable quantity in pounds or bushels is wanted, we are in a position to supply at a lower price than by the single pound or bushel. We wish it to be distinctly understood, however, that we will not sacrifice quality in so doing. Mail us a list of your wants, and we will submit to you our lowest cash price for the lot.

FALL CATALOG. Our fall catalog will be ready about July 1. It is brimful of seasonable seeds, plants and bulbs to plant during the summer and autumn months. Don't fail to write for a copy if you do not receive one.

ORDERS WITHOUT MONEY OR ADDRESS. Every year we get hundreds of orders from our customers unsigned. We have at present on our files a number of orders for various amounts, which we are unable to send out as we don't know where to forward them. Every day or so we get a long letter of complaint from some customer, upbraiding us for not sending his seeds promptly. Then we get busy with this file and endeavor to locate the order. Often it is a hard proposition. So, if you do not hear from us within a reasonable length of time after you mail your order, send us a duplicate order, naming the date on which the former order was sent, the amount of money enclosed, and in what form. We want to satisfy you and don't want you to complain about our service—if we can help it.

NON-WARRANTY.—Most of the failures with seeds, plants and bulbs are due to causes entirely beyond our control, such as unfavorable weather or soil conditions, too deep or too shallow planting, etc., which renders it impossible for us to guarantee success, and although we take all possible care to supply only such goods as will, under proper conditions, produce satisfactory results, we still give no warranty as to description, quality or productiveness of any of the seeds, plants or bulbs we send out, and will not be in any way responsible for the crop, and every order for articles named in this catalogue will be executed on these conditions only. It must, however, be plain to everyone who gives the matter the slightest thought, that it is to our best interests to send out only such stock as will not only grow but prove true to name and description.





Sow in March or April, in good mellow soil, after soaking the seed 24 hours in warm water, in drills one foot apart, and one inch deep. During the summer keep the soil mellow and free from weeds, thin-ning the plants to 4 inches apart. The following spring transplant into permanent beds that have been deeply dug and highly manured. in drills

Earliest varieties, ready for table in 40 days: 1 pound to 10 feet of drill; 1 bushel per acre.

The soil best adapted to beans is a light, rich, well-drained loam, which was manured for the previous crop. Beans are ex-tremely sensitive to both cold and wet and it is useless to plant them before the ground has become dry and warm. The largest returns will result from planting in drills from two to three feet apart and leaving the plants two to six inches in the row. Up to the time of blossoming they should have frequent shallow cultivation. Never hoe when the vines are wet, as the pods will become discolored. For succession plant every two weeks.


### BUSH OR SNAP BEANS

Alfalfa is a perennial plant of upright growth, sometimes 3 feet high. The na-ture of the leaves is somewhat like clover, although not as large. The flowers are a purplish blue and appear in sprays The seeds are small, yellowish green, kidand ney shaped and of about the size of a pin head.

SUITABLE SOIL— Alfalfa makes a strong and rapid growth on well-growth on well--drained, rather heavy land, which is sup-plied with some lime, and where the sub-soil, while not necessarily sand or gravel, is porous. On sandy soil the growth is is

vigorous, when moisture is abundant, but during drought it will suffer unless the roots reach water at a depth of 8 to 10 feet. The land should slope some, as alfalfa will not stand surface water. **SEED BED**—The land must be free from weeds and the ground must be thoroughly pulverized and well packed. Alfalfa will frequently fail if seeded on freshly plowed ground. If it is necessary to plow the ground before seeding, do it early, harrowing thoroughly and sow after a good rain has settled it. SPRING SEEDING-Sow seed broadcast or with drill from March to June 15th, at the rate of 20 pounds

to the acre.

FALL SEEDING—Disk oat and wheat land as soon as the crop is cut, and then harrow or disk every 10 days until a suitable time for sowing before the 15th day of September, when you can sow as above. Cut for hay the next fall. This is the best time to sow for all except northern states, if you are sure of getting fall rains.

Do not grow the plants too thick. Keep the weeds down and the surface of the soil well stirred with a hoe or rake during the summer especially if the weather is dry. A great many varieties can be sown in the house, if desired, early, and afterwards transplanted.
