We grade liberally by Caliper and height. When both are specified, Caliper measure governs, but we are careful to see that stock is UNIFORM throughout. Our rule is "WHEN IN DOUBT PUT IT IN THE LOWER GRADE."

All stock is graded and bunched in our frost proof storage house where we have water in abundance supplied by gravity from spring nearby. Stock is handled from field to this building under large taupaulins and roots kept moist until boxed. We guarantee stock to reach you in good condition.
