The plant is of upright growth, about 15 inches high, sometimes more, sometimes less, soil conditions governing. It resembles in appearance and growth a head of Cos Romaine or Celery Lettuce, but possesses the atractive curly feature of Silesian Lettuce, and a broad, wide rib. The heads are very firm, almost like Cabbage. The flavor is delightful, not at all like Cabbage, but rather on the order of Witloof Chicory or French Endive. It may be served like lettuce, tasting better with salad dressing. or it makes excellent Cold Slaw when it is prepared exactly as one would prepare Cold Slaw from Cabbage. It may also be cooked as one would Cabbage, the flavor somewhat resembling Cauliflower, It can be planted as a spring or autumal crop; for latter the seed is sown in July. The head does not become as high then as when sown in spring. and is adapted in that season rather as a Lettuce than as Cabbage. May be forced readily in cold frame. We are convinced that this vegetable will become popular very shortly. The small plants are handled much like Lettuce, except that they should be set out from 15 to 18 inches apart, the rows 2 to $21 / 2$ feet apart. They prefer naturally low or moist garden soil, although they will thrive in almost any soil conditions. They should be well cultivated during the growing period, and when the seed heads appear the plant should be bent over to derelop the bulb. It may be eut any time after 5 inches' growth, or before the heads begin to expand. Roots should be set in the soil six inelies below the surface. A cold frame also makes an ideal place for forcing them in the late winter or early spring months.

## OKRA OR GUMBO

## COW PEAS

Note-Occasionally some people order Cow Peas, thinking they are the same as Canadian Field Peas and sow them rally. and in consequence they rlo not germinate, as they do not stand cold, and the innocent seedsman is blamed for what is not lis fanlt. There is a wide difference between Cow I'eas and Canadian I'as. The latter are offered on page 44.

Cow Peas are one or the best, largest yiclding and most nut ritions of the farm crops they povide the most inexpensive methods of bringing soil back to a stage of fertility. In the south it is the staple forage crop for wintre feeling. (On ordinary ground they will yield from 10.000 to 20.000 lb : of green fodree to the acre. They grow in the poorest kind of soil. taking the free nitrogen from the air, which is deposited in the ground through the roots, leaving it very rich in ammonia. The short-growing variotirs are best for turning under as green manure, while the trailing sorts are desirable for hay. Cattle, sheep or hogs can be turned into a firdrd of them and they will eat them greerdily, and the stubble can be plowerl under. In the latitudr. of Ihaladelphia sow timm Nay $1 \times t$ to Jnly 1st, two bushels per acre broadcast, or one buslof per acre in drills. For a linge crop sow the seed as late as possible, and not too thick.

Onr flower seeds have a reputation for their snperior quality and for the excellent results obtained by sowing them. It is our constant endeavor to supply only such varieties and strains that will give the best of satisfaction.

Throughout the following bages of Flower Seeds the different varieties are designated as Annuals, Biennials, Perennials. etc., and for the benefit of those who are not familiar with these terms, we wish to make the following brief explanation:

Annuals. These grow and bloom, matnre their seed and then lie in the same year, such as Asters, Balsams. Poppies, Sweet Peas, Morning Glories, etc., some of which may be sown in the house from March to May, or outdoors atter danger from frost is over.

Biennials. These grow from seed sown during mid-summer, flowering the second year, after which they die; many of the varieties bloom the first season if sown early. In this class we have Pansies. English Daisies. Campannla Medinm, Dianthus, etc.

Perennials. Those which live from year to year. such as Aqnilegia, Delphininm, Foxglove, etc. Seed may be sown outdoors from June to September and transplanted late in fall iuto their permanent quarters and protected dnring winter with a light litter of straw or leares. The hardy perennials not usually needing any protection after the first winter; the half-hardr perennials require protection during the winter, and the tender perennials during the winter require greenhouse protection.

The flowers are fully double to the last, are a most loyely shade of bright carmine rose, almost identical with the World-Famous American Beauty Rose. Each plant forms a perfect bush. ## CANNAS IN MIXTURE

This mixture is made up of named sorts, but not separate; acquired while cannas are heing divided for resale, it contains a splendid assortment. 10c. each; doz., $\$ 1.00 ; \$ 6.00$ per 100.

The native home of the Dahlia is Central America and Southern Mexico. Its earliest known history dates back to 1657, and at this date was called Acocti by the Aztec Indians. Later its name was changed to Gcorgina, after Prof. Georgi, of St. Petersburg, which name is still used in some of the German catalogs. Again the name was changed to Dahlia, after Dr. Dahl, a Swedish botanist. The Dahlia in its native state is single. The first double forms appeared in 1814 and are credited to Mr. Doukelaar. The first double forms were of the types now known as SHOW and FANCY. The POMPON form appeared about 1858 to 1860 . Next came the DECORATIVE form, but its origin is not clearly defined, but probably dates back some forty years. The first CACTUS Dahlia originated in 1872 , but was not placed on the market until 1880 . It was named Juarezi after President Juarez, of Mexico. This is the popular type of the present day and there are some 2000 named varieties of Cactus Dahlia today that have descended from the original Juarezi. The PEONY FLOWERED type is of quite recent ongin, dating back but a few years, and is becoming very popular.

Our list this season has again been thoroughly revised. Many of the older varietics of Dahlias have been omitted and superseded by others that are much superior. Where plants are offered, these will be ready early in May, during which month they may be set out, although they are planted with great success all during Juue and July. The natural season for the Dahlia to be at its best is during September and October; in fact, effort to get superior blooms before that time should not be attempted. To get large flowers, the plants should be disbudded.

Spade or plow the ground to a depth of about 10 inches. As a fertilizer, use either well-rotted stable manure, or, better still, sheep manure, which should be well mixed with the soil. When the soil is properly prepared, dig a hole, 6 inches deep, in which to plant the Dahlias. The bulbs should be laid down flat and covered to a depth of 4 inches. Every Dahlia should have from $21 / 2$ to 3 feet space and at least 4 feet between the rows.

As soon as the plants are a foot above the ground they should be tied to a stake.

Keep the ground well cultivated and free from weeds. An application of sheep manure about every two weeks will be of great benefit.

Never leave more than one shoot to a plant. You will have better plants and larger flowers if you will allow only one main shoot to a plant.

ABOUT DAHLIA PLANTS. It happens sometimes that there is an unusually large demand for certain varieties, and our stock of roots becomes exhausted. In such instances we will send out strong plants after May 1st, after which time most all Dahlia orders are filled with plants.

This is especially true in the case of mixed gladioli, either in colors or shades of color. The smaller bulbs are frequently the finest varieties.

## SPECIAL DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING AND CARING FOR ROSES

Open a good space in the soil and spread out roots; never cramp them into a small hole. Do not let manure come in contact with roots, but place it underneath and a layer of soil on the top. If the rose is a bush plant, set it so deep that only branches are visible above the ground and never the main stem, but too deep is as bad as too shallow; 2 to 4 inches of the lower branches may be under the surface, but no more. If the plant is a budded or grafted rose, be sure that the bud or graft is fully 3 inches below the surface. Prune in spring only, when life is just apparent, and remove what might appear to be surplus wood. The strongest growth should be cut back to within six inches above the ground; the weaker growth to 4 inches. All soil above the roots shonld be well pressed down. Feed your roses with "Ground Bone" and "Pulverized Sheep Manure." Mulch the ground during summer with cow manure or with Peat Moss. As winter approaches draw soil 6 to 8 inches high around the stem; this avoids winter killing, especially the HT and T varieties; then cover with long manure or similar litter.

## MICHELL'S HYDRANGEA HORTENSIS

> NOTE.-Except on southern orders or in cases wher customers have greenhouses, we do not ship this class of plants out until May unless especially requested to do so. Where customers desire then shipped prior to our usual shipping date, we can forward at their risk of loss.

This class of Hydrangeas is seen planted extensively at the North Atlantic seashore and inland resorts. They seem to do especially well in these localities. It has been the general opinion that the plant is not hardy, but in many places it is not afforded even the slightest protection, although we recommend that care be taken, especially for the first few years after planting, and especially so with the French sorts, to protect them over winter with a covering of manure or other suitable litter, and also to wrap the plants in burlap, straw or even paper will do, as this will protect the flower buds, which are often injured in severe winters, although the plants otherwise do not suffer. If winter protection is used, same should not be removed until all danger of frost is over, otherwise the tender shoots are nipped in the cold nights of early spring, and few flowers are the result. These varieties of Hydrangeas often change their colors; for instance, pink varieties will sometimes turn blue. This, however, is infrequent, but when the type is fixed it usually remains so. If, however, it is desired to change pink Hydrangea blue and the latter pink, this can be usually accomplished by incorporating into the soil a few handfuls of soot or iron filings. If this is not obtainable, lump alum broken into small pieces and incorporated into the soil, about $1 / 4 \mathrm{lb}$. to each plant, will usually produce the same results.

## FRENCH HYDRANGEAS (Popular Varieties)
