

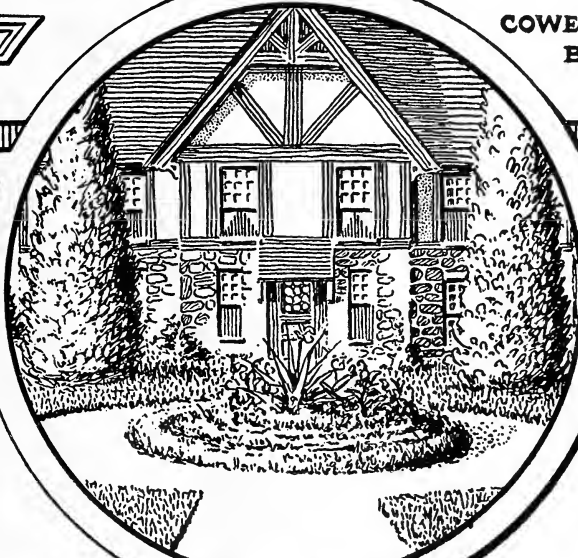

WE wish it to be distinctly understood, that while we take every precaution to have all plants and bulbs true to name, we give no warranty, express or implied, as to description, quality, productiveness, or any other matter, of any of the plants or bulbs we send out, and will not in any way be responsible for the crop. Every order we receive will be executed on these conditions only, and they must be accepted by the customers when ordering.

We aim to get new customers and keep old ones, and by honorable dealing to satisfy both customers and ourselves.

CONDITIONS OF SALE

SHIPPING. By our careful and thorough system of packing it is customary for our customers to receive their goods from us in perfect condition and in the past we have guaranteed the safe arrival of all express shipments, but the present congested state of transportation compels us to withdraw, for the time being, this guarantee and until further notice *All Shipments are at Purchaser's Risk.*

COMPLAINTS. No complaint will be entertained for any loss or damage, unless made immediately on receipt of goods. All claims for damage occurring in transit should be made to the express company delivering the goods. If boxes are broken or any other visible damage done, it should be noted on the receipt to be used in filing claim.

This list cancels all previous quotations; all offers are made subject to goods being unsold. These prices are for a strictly wholesale trade.

The plants named are offered at the price quoted, provided not less than five plants at dozen rates, or 10 at 100 rates of any one variety are taken, and not less than 100 plants sold at 100 rates. Where less than this number is ordered we reserve the right to charge retail prices. Special prices are made for large lots.

No charges are made for boxes or packing, or delivery to express or freight office, on orders amounting to \$1.00 or more. No order amounting to less than \$1.00 will be filled and packed at wholesale prices. Orders amounting to less than \$1.00 will be charged for at retail prices.

As heretofore all sales and quotations are made on a strictly cash basis, regardless of the responsibility of the customers. We make low prices, guarantee full count, and render the best possible service in every way. C.O.D. orders must be accompanied by one-half of the amount of the order.

We cannot hold plants on an inquiry without a guarantee of acceptance.

Orders for growing crops accepted subject to crop failure, shortage or other causes beyond control.

We prefer to ship orders by express, then they travel at a special plant rate, which is considerably lower than regular merchandise. It is not necessary that charges should be prepaid to secure this rate.

Pamela. This is a variety that is universally admired; immense rounds of flowers with a pure white center shading through a maculated effect to a broad, distinct, outer margin of crimson lake; an exceptionally strong, vigorous grower for an English round flower sort.

Paul Crampel. Attractive shade of vermilion scarlet; deep rich green, distinctly zoned foliage; strong, compact, vigorous and branching habit; one of the brightest bedding varieties we have.

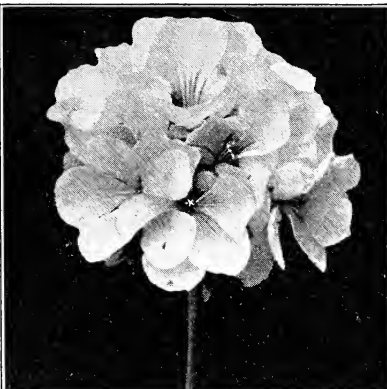
Princess Alex. Large and perfect flowers of a most pleasing shade of bright carmine lake, produced freely in grand trusses and exceptionally fine pot variety.

Splendid as a pot plant and under favorable conditions is an excellent bedder. Color a unique soft shade of salmon-red, upper petals beautifully blotched.

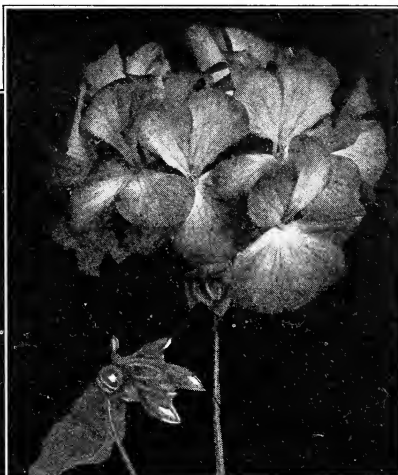
Rosalda. Extremely handsome flower of a rich crimson pink, upper petals heavily blotched; white and pencilled crimson; a true representative of a Bruant race.
