

PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING DIRECTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE ORDERING

- ORDER EARLY if possible and avoid the rush that comes in March and April. Early orders are filled from a complete stock, and it frequently happens that important items are sold out late in the season and cannot be supplied.
- USE THE ORDER SHEET AND ENVEOLPE which accompany this catalog. It helps us to fill your order promptly. We gladly supply additional orders sheets and envelopes on request. If, however, these are not at hand, any sheet of paper will do. Be sure your envelope is addressed to J. J. Bell Seed Co. Orders addressed to J. J. Bell or to members of the firm might be delayed in delivery. We suggest that you keep a copy of your order.
- SEND CASH WITH THE ORDER by money order, draft, check, or registered letter. Small amounts may be sent conveniently in U. S. postage stamps. Coin or bills should never be sent in ordinary letter; unless registered they will be sent at your risk.
- YOUR NAME AND FULL ADDRESS must be plainly and carefully written on every order sheet which you send us. Every season we receive many unsigned orders which must be held until the customer writes again.
- WARRANTY. We warrant our seeds to be true to name, to be of first class quality, and to reach you in good condition, but limit our warranty in all cases to the purchase price of the seeds. We gladly replace free of charge any of our seeds which fail in the above respects.
- POSTAGE PAID. We prepay the postage on seeds quoted in quantities of 1 pound or less to all points in the United States, U. S. Dependencies and Canada. Where the words "By Express" are used in quoting larger quantities it always means that you are to pay the transportation charges. We will ship such items by express, freight, or parcel post as you prefer, but if shipped by parcel post you must send sufficient money to prepay the postage. The table below gives the parcel post rates by zones and your postmaster will tell you in which zone you live with respect to our post office. In computing postage by this table, remember that fractions of a pound count as pounds. As all our seeds are put up full weight you will need to allow at least 1 pound for the weight of the packages or bags. Thus 5 pounds of seed will be counted as 6 pounds when packed to shop. If you send more than the amount of the postage we will return the balance with your order.

Shipments of 40 pounds or more to near by points and 10 pounds or more to distant points, usually cost less by express. Shipments of 80 pounds or more usually cost less by freight. In making up an order to be shipped by freight or express you may deduct 8 cents per pound from prices quoted on lots of 1 pound or less.

TESTED SEEDS

Just what do we mean by "Tested Seeds?" When a new lot of seed is received at our store we take a small sample from the center of each bag, and place this sample in a tester under conditions suitable for the germination of that particular kind of seed. When the sample germinates we note carefully the size and vigor of the little plants. By counting the number of strong plants and the number of weaklings and dead seeds we can determine accurately the germination per cent of that particular lot of seed. Before any lot is offered for sale we must be satisfied that it will give a good sturdy stand under ordinary conditions.

It pays! Dead seed and seed of low vitality will never make vigorous productive plants. Every year we find several lots of new seed which may be perfect as far as appearance goes, but which fail to come up to our high standards of germination.

Needless to say, we also test each year any seed which may be left over from the previous season.



BOUNTIFUL BUSH BEAN. This early green podded variety is one of the best for the home garden or market. The plants are vigorous and productive. The large flat pods are of good quality, stringless, attractive in appearance, and hold up well for shipping. Seed is yellowish brown. 
TRINGLESS KIDNEY WAX BUSH BEAN. This is a splendid snap bean for the home garden and a great favorite for home canning on account of its superb quality and attractive appearance when cooked. The plants bear heavily and carry the pods well up from the ground. The creamy yellow pods are of good length, nearly round, and entirely stringless. Seed is white with small dark marking. CHINESE PE-TSA1 or CELERY CABBAGE. This unique vegetable is rapidly becoming popular wherever is has been given a trial. The plant does not resemble ordinary cabbage in appearance, but forms a narrow, elongated head like that of a cos lettuce. The outside leaves are cabbage-like in texture while the inner leaves are tender, well blanched, almost like the heart of celery. The flavor is mild and very pleasant. Pe-tsai is used as a salad like lettuce, or cooked like asparagus, and the cooked vegetable has none of the objectionable odor of ordinary cabbage. 
EXTRA EARLY EGYPTIAN. Repeated trials have shown this beet to be the earliest of all table varieties, about three days earlier than Crosby's Egyptian. Roots are a little smaller, somewhat flat, smooth, with small tap root. Flesh is dark red, of good quality. An excellent variety for forcing or first crop outdoors. 
