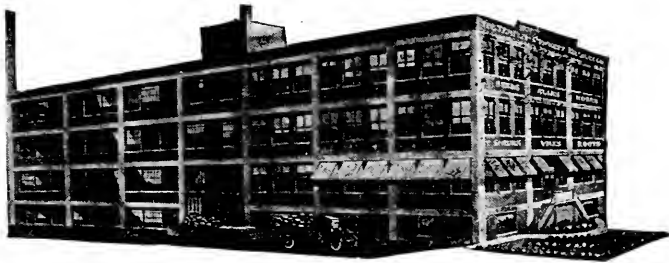

To Teachers:-

Due to the general slowing down of business, many of the families represented in your school face a reduction of income this year. You can render a real service to your community by encouraging gardening among your pupils. This can be done either with school or home gardens. In the country, the small town, the big city, more than one hundred thousand teachers gave their pupils this opportunity last year.

Whatever your program demands of you, you will find pleasure in the happiness you will bring into the lives of your pupils if you get back of this work. The growing of vegetables is healthful and profitable. The growing of flowers builds up a love of the beautiful. Children will respond more readily to your leadership and parents will take a more kindly interest in your work because the pupils will not be idle outside of school hours.

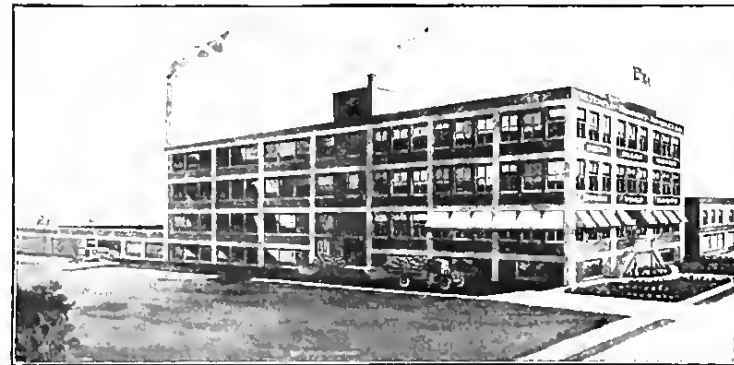
HAVE YOU EVER ASKED YOURSELF THESE QUESTIONS?

In 1905 Mr. Templin began this work of supplying seeds in Penny Packets to schools. From a small beginning the business has grown until 13,000,000 packets of seeds are sold annually.

In the early days one machine had more than enough capacity to packet all the seeds sold. At that time Mr. Templin with two or three assistants handled all of the work.

In this mailing room, the Post Office Department keeps clerks who cancel the stamps on Parcel Post Packages, and route your goods direct to train. By this plan a great deal of time is saved on every order, and our customers appreciate the promptness in delivery.

A FEW RESULTS

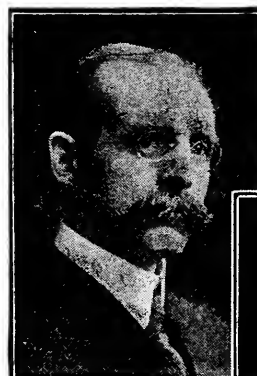
Where there is room on or adjoining the school property, a great many schools have benefited by conducting gardens in which each pupil has a small plot.
