One should try a few new varieties eaçh season, if only for the neighborly visits they entail to see the new plants bloom.

ANTIRRHINUMS A new variety of Giant Flowered Antirrhinums or Snapdragons. In good soil will grow three or more feet tall; blooms twice the size of any giant flowered strain hitherto known, and the colors are purer and richer. Aiixed colors only. 10 cents per packet.
HARDY PERENNAL ASTERS These are the wonveloped from the wild Aster that grows everywhere in the late fall. These hybrids grow from four to six feet tall; flowers several times larger than the largest wild ones; stocky, branched, a mass of bloom from base to tip. ## ROSE PESTS

For aphis or green fly use Rose Nicotine as a spray. For mildew and black spot on the leaves use Bordeaux Mixture. The dry powder properly blended can be bought at drug stores. It is ready to use by adding the amount of water called for.

For the small white fly that infests the under side of rose leaves use the nicotine. The hard dashing spray from the hose when applied to the under side of the leaves in the evening helps to keep them down.

## Culture of Roses

A sandy clay loam is the best soil for roses. Plant hybrid tea roses fifteen inches apart each way. With your trowel make a hole large enough to permit the roots to spread naturally. Place the plant and then pour in at least a pint cf water; with one hand hold the plant in position and with the other draw in the earth: firming the top soil with the hands.

Then water well, and immediately mulch with at least two inches of coarse straws manure. This prevents the sol from drring out, and successive waterings carries fertilizer as needed, insuring vigorous growth and consequent blooms.

Cut the old blooms off as soon as they are done. Do not fear to take a bit of the old wood with it. It is the nesy wooct that blooms.

## Choice Flower Seeds

The letter A, B or P following the name of the variety signifies whether the seed is an Annual, Biennial or Perennial. Annuals bloom the first year from seed and die. Biennials bloom the second year from seed and die; although many B:ennials, such as Aquilegias, Foxglove, Canterbury Bells, and others, from their habit of seeding themselves, are practically Perennials. Perennials do not all bloom the first year from seed. In vigor and bloom they increase for several years until their full beauty is reached. Nearly all seeds of Perennials are slow of germination, and should be planted in some quiet spot, where they may be kept moist and undisturbed for several months, before transplanting to the permanent bed.

## Daisy Collection

No flowers are so graceful for cut-flower work as those of the Daisy form. In the group named below are my own superb Alaska, or Shasta Daisy, and two from South Africa-Arctotis Grandis, and the Dimorpotheca hybrids; the iatter two, so splendid and so little known, are as magnificent as the well-known Shasta Daisy.

As you are perhaps aware, all the plants we know as Daisies belong to the Chrysanthemum family, a widely scattered but tolerably distinct family. I hare added others, that do not belong to the Daisy tribe, adding them for their color and flat-petaled form, their long stems and grace; these are the Cosmos, Gaillardia, and Coreopsis.

I grow all these flowers in my own garden, and because I can always gather a vase of graceful, clear-toned flowers for my table, it occurred to me that others might like to know of these for their own gardens, so it is with pleasure $I$ offer this list for your consideration.

## Agathea Coelestis

Exquisite skv-blue; requires a sheltered position, tender, but will bloom all winter if lifted and potted in the fall; not so long-stemmed as the other Daisies, but chosen for its delightful the other Daisies, but.

## Anthemis Kelwayi

Golden Marguerite. Deep golden; blooms from midsummer until frost; perfectly hardy. Pht., 5 cents.

## Arctotis Grandis
