





Late Cabbage seed should be sown in drills in open ground during April and May, and transplanted in June or July.



Cultural Hints on Flower Seeds

The following abbreviations are used throughout the Flower Seed Department.

HA., Hardy Annuals HHA., Half-Hardy Annuals TA., Tender Annuals HP., Hardy Perennials HHP., Half-Hardy Perennials HB., Hardy Biennials HHB., Half-Hardy Biennials HC., Hardy Climbers GP., Greenhouse Plants GS., Greenhouse Shrubs GB., Greenhouse Bulbs GC., Greenhouse Climbers

flower-beds. This second transplanting should not be done, however, before the middle of May.

Hardy Perennials, HP. Follow the same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals, using the same soil, but the Perennials may be sown in the open border from July to September. The seeds of many perennials are slow to germinate, some requiring several months and some as long as two years. It is a good idea to cover the plants lightly with straw, leaves, or any dry litter, as soon as the frosts commence, so that they may be protected from the extremely severe winter weather. Remove this covering just as soon as the frost is out of the ground, in the spring, and loosen the soil about the plants. When the plants are large enough, transplant

to the flower-garden where they are to remain. **Half-Hardy Perennials, HHP.** Use same soil and cultural directions as for Hardy Annuals. Nearly all kinds of Half-Hardy Perennials may be sown in the open border in a warm and sunny spot as soon as the soil has become dry and warm, so that those who do not have coldframes or greenhouses need not be deprived of this class of flowers, though they may have to wait a little later for their blooms.

Hardy Biennials, HB. These require the same soil and treatment as the Hardy Perennials, which see.

Half-Hardy Biennials, HHB. Use same cultural directions as given for Half-Hardy Perennials.

Hardy Climbers, HC. Follow same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals or Hardy Perennials, depending on which class they belong to.

Greenhouse Bulbs, GB. Suitable soil is one of the first requisites for successful bulb-growing, and it should be made up of two parts fibrous loam, two parts leaf-mold, one part of prepared fertilizer of a reliable brand, and one part sharp sand. Drainage should be provided by placing pieces of broken pots or stones in the bottom of the pots. Bulbs should be potted early for it is impossible to obtain flowers until abundant root-growth has been established, and this takes eight to ten weeks. If a succession of flowers is desired throughout the winter, potting must be done at intervals of two to three weeks, but none later than Novem-Set bulbs in pots so that tops protrude slightly ber 15. above the soil when potting is finished. Do not press down into the soil, for the roots will lift the bulbs quite out of the pots if the earth beneath is packed hard. After potting, water thoroughly and place outdoors on a bed of coal-ashes, to prevent worms from entering, and cover with 4 to 6 inches of litter. By November set pots on a similar layer of ashes in a trench 18 inches deep, provided with drainage. Cover 6 to 8 inches deep with litter. Potted bulbs may also be placed in a dark cool cellar if kept constantly moist. Bring pots into the house as desired, as soon as plenty of roots show through the bottom of the pot, which is an indication of their readiness for the heat, and keep shaded until the top growth has turned a healthy green. To force Tulips for Christmas, keep them in even heat in a darkened part of the greenhouse or forcing-room, to induce the stalks to lengthen out, or the flowers are likely to open out within the dwarf and unfolded leaves. Give plenty of water as soon as active growth commences and avoid draughts and very high temperatures. Grow Crocuses and Narcissi cool and slowly if fine blooms are desired, for they dislike bottom heat. Pot Crocuses early but do not bring into heat before lanuary. bring into heat before January.

Greenhouse Plants, Shrubs, and Climbers. Owing to the diversity of their requirements, no set cultural directions can be given for these. We will be glad to supply particular directions for the culture of special varieties at any time upon request.

Hardy Annuals, HA. A rich, sandy loam, made very fine, is the most suitable soil for the smaller Hardy Annuals. There is nothing better than soil taken from old hotbeds, or sods from an old pasture that have been piled up and allowed to rot for two to three years, and then mixed with a little old stable manure and sand. The soil should be placed in shallow boxes or pots and set in a warm window, hotbed, or, if possible, in a greenhouse. Use shallow boxes or seed pans from 2 to 3 inches deep, and of convenient size. Sow the seed in April or May, according to your

Sow the seed in April or May, according to your latitude. It is well to make a second sowing two to four weeks later for succession, or to provide against failure of the first sowing. Do not make the mistake of sowing the seed too deeply—covering only to the depth of the thickness of the seeds is generally sufficient, except in the case of Sweet Peas, which should be planted 2 inches deep, or in the case of medium-sized seeds, like Balsams and Zinnias, which should be planted at least a half inch or more. Fine seeds, such as Portulacas, need only to be pressed into the soil with a piece of board or the palm of the hand. The earth should always be pressed down firmly after sowing flower seeds, or there is danger of their drying up before the roots get firm hold of the soil.

After the seeds are up, plenty of air and moisture should be given them, but water should be judicially applied or they will "damp off." The hardier Annuals may be planted where they are to grow, but, as a rule, it is best to transplant them, as the plants are generally stronger and stand the drought better. Transplanting to other boxes may be done when the young plants are well out of the seed-leaf. It is a great convenience to use 2-inch pots, setting from 3 to 12 seedlings along the edges of the pot, for when the ground has become warm enough outdoors they may easily be turned out and planted singly, as by that time they will have made good roots. When pots are not available, boxes, tin cans, and the like may be used. When the seedlings are first set out, they should be watered frequently, particularly if the weather is very dry. Great care should be taken, too, to keep the ground loosened frequently and free from weeds, so that the plants will receive the full benefit of the rains and dews, which they will not if the soil becomes hard and baked.

July and August is the proper time for sowing seeds of some Hardy Annuals outdoors, and September for sowing in boxes and placing in coldframes. So treated, they will make strong plants by spring and flower early. Sashes should not be put on until heavy rains and frosts begin, and should be removed during the day whenever the temperature is above freezing.


Half-Hardy Annuals, HHA. Follow same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals. Seed may be sown any time after April 15, as the hotbed will be sufficient protection, but it is advisable to cover the glass with a mat or straw until danger of frost is past. Give plenty of ventilation during the day. After May 30 sow in the border, like Hardy Annuals.

Tender Annuals, TA. Use very light sandy compost and provide drainage in the pots by placing pieces of broken pots or bits of sod in the bottom. Cover the finer seeds no more than $\frac{1}{5}$ inch deep and press the soil firmly over them. In order to have early bloom and strong plants, sow the seed in boxes in March, placing them in a warm greenhouse or plunging in a moderate hotbed, being careful to protect them from the cold, shade them from the midday sun, and water with a fine rose. Water should be supplied frequently, especially if the house or hotbed is very warm. Transplant into shallow boxes or small pots as soon as the plants are out of the seed-leaf, and when they have become strong enough, transplant into the
