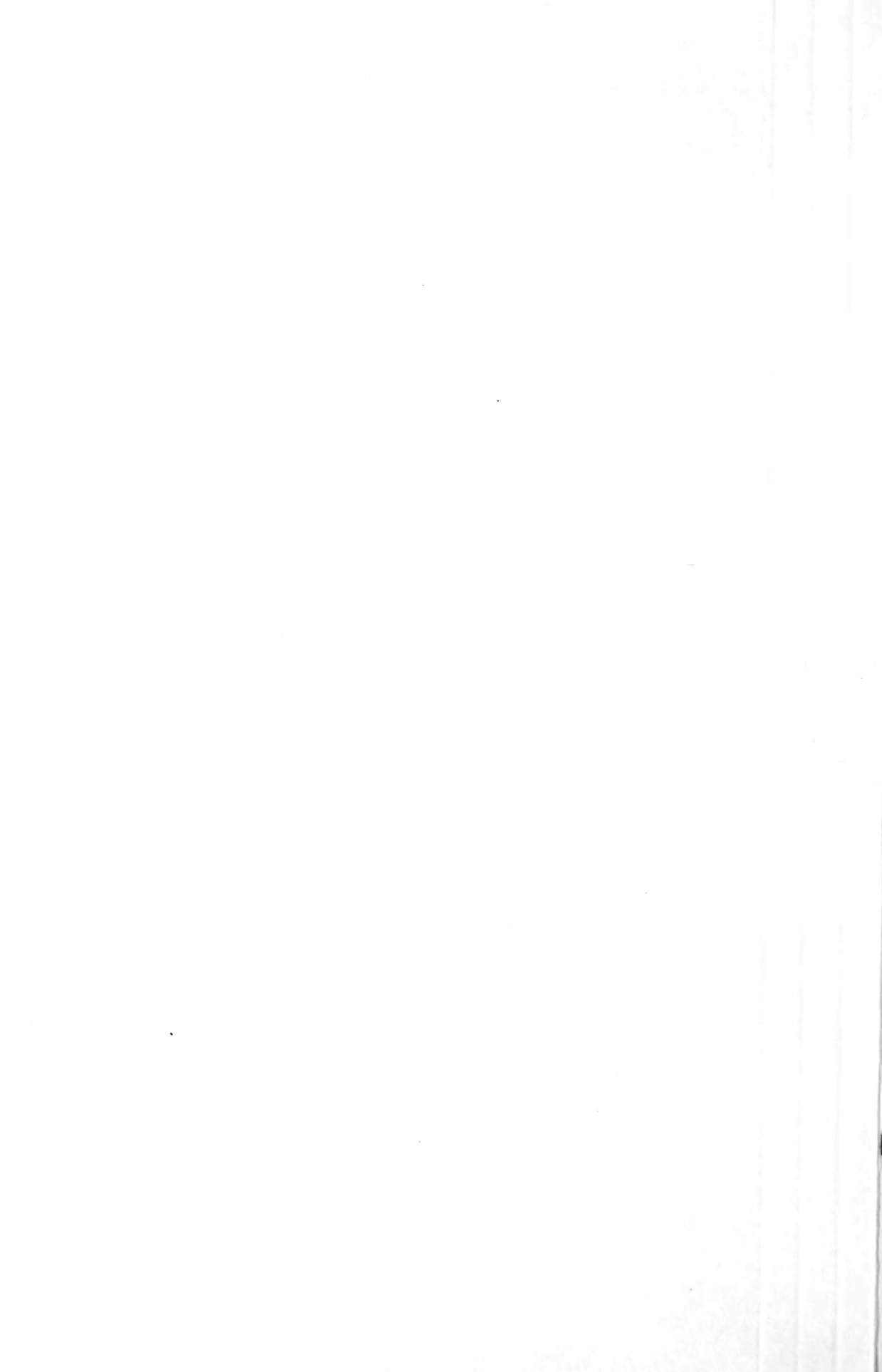

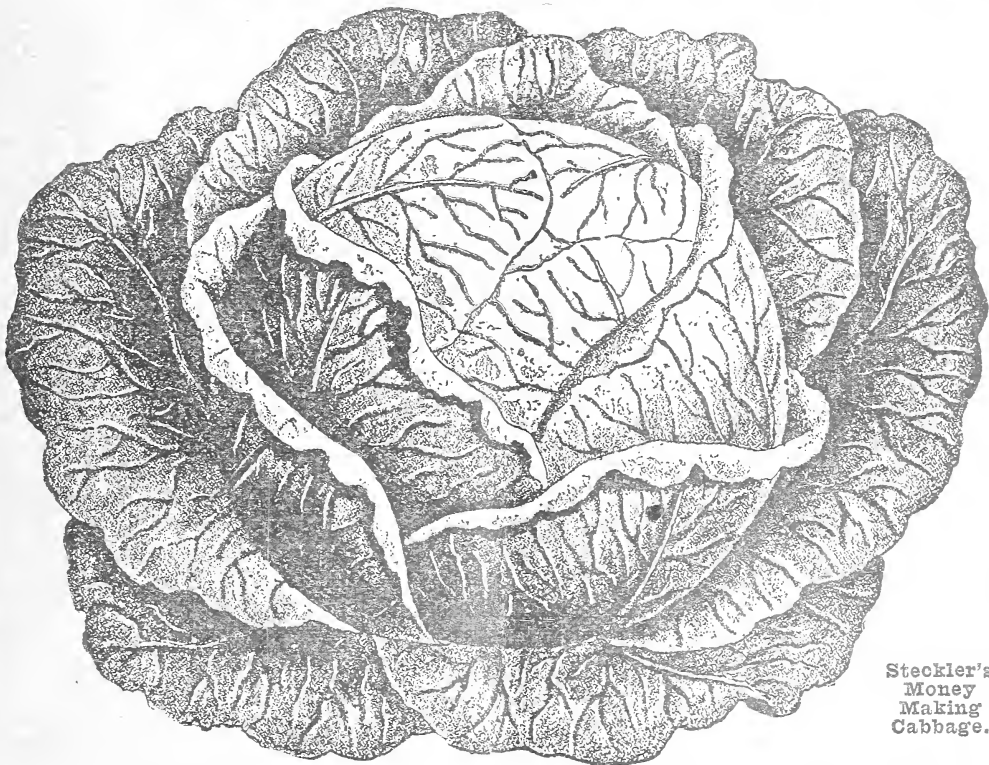

GENERAL DIRECTIONS TO BE FOLLOWED WHEN ORDERING SEEDS.

IN ORDERING remember that prices quoted here are always subject to change. They include prepayment of postage on all seeds ordered by packet, ounce, quarter-pound, one pound and five-pound lots. If the order is to be sent by express or freight, deduct five cents per pound from prices given.

OUR TERMS.—Cash must accompany all orders, remittance can be made in the following manner: By Post Office Money Orders, Express Money Orders, Checks or drafts on New Orleans or New York, where it is not possible to secure these Currency or U. S. Postage Stamps in good order will be accepted, all letters containing currency or stamps should be registered to insure safe delivery. When goods are ordered C. O. D. half of the amount must accompany the order. Live stock and plants will not be sent C. O. D.

WHEN ORDERING write your name plainly, give correct P. O., if by express give your express office or nearest express office, to avoid any delay; also if by rail or boat give station or landing, and if possible the name of the railroad or name of boat. Where no in-

structions are given as to how shipment should be made, we will use our own discretion; but we urge all customers to state plainly whether they want goods mailed, expressed or shipped by boat or by rail. As all shipments by boat must be prepaid, customers not known to us must remit enough to cover freight.

NON-WARRANTY. Note.—There are so many contingencies to be encountered in growing plants from seed and in setting out plants that are dependent on the weather and other conditions over which we have no control, that success in planting is not altogether dependent on the seed or plant. We will send out only seed which we believe will grow and produce the kind of plant and variety represented, but

THIS COMPANY GIVES NO WARRANTY, expressed or implied, as to description, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, bulbs, plants or trees, we send out, and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the goods on these terms, they are at once to be returned.

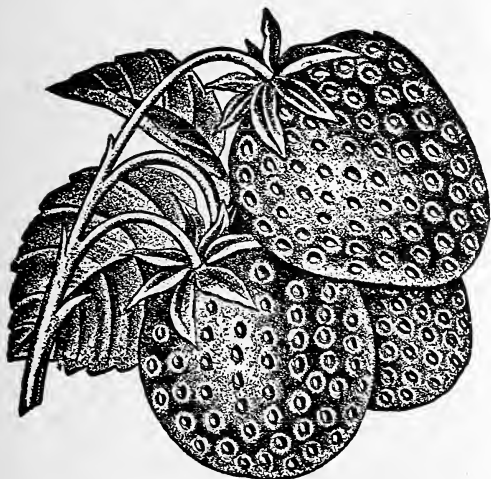

List of Cabbage plants for shipment by Parcel Post, postage paid, as follows: **100 to 300 plants at .50c. per 100; 500 plants for \$1.75; 1,000 or more at \$3.25 per 1,000.** Plants are packed for Parcel Post shipment in even quantities of 100, 200, 300, 400, 500 and 1,000 plants of a variety to a package, as we do not ship two varieties in the same package.

Price by Express where purchaser pays the Express charges: **In lots of 1,000 to 4,000 plants at \$2.25 per 1,000; in lots of 5,000 or more at \$2.00 per 1,000.** We do not ship less than 1,000 plants of a variety by Express. After your order is received by us it must be forwarded to our growing farm for shipment, this takes several days.

Plants cannot be pulled or packed during wet or freezing weather, this sometimes causes a delay in the shipment, but we always make shipment as soon as weather conditions permit. A delay of 10 days is not unusual.

We begin making fall shipments about **December 15th**, but sometimes, if growing conditions are favorable, we can ship as early as **November 20th** and up to **May 1st**. We will positively fill no orders for less than 100 plants.

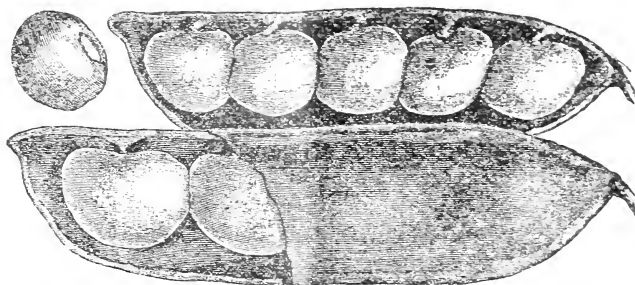

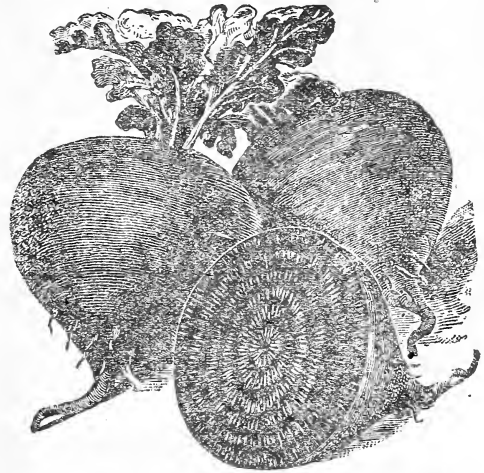

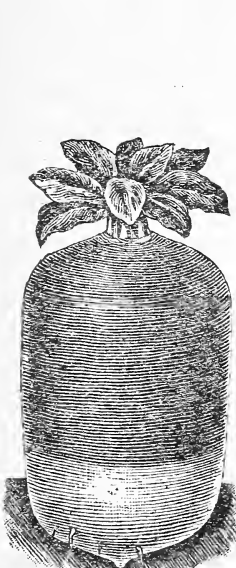


Crosby's Egyptian Beet.

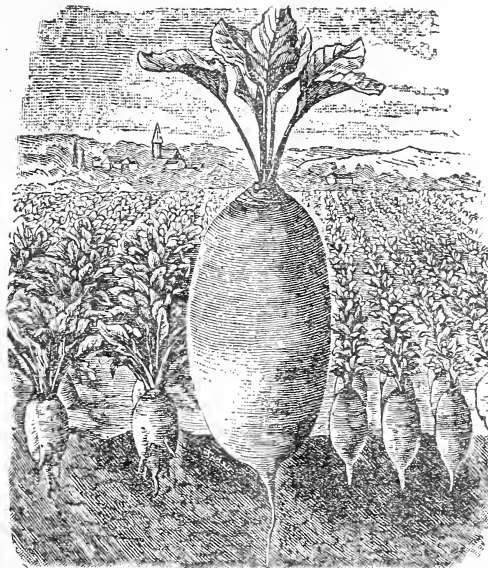

CABBAGE.

Plant during June, July and August.

Serious loss is frequently suffered by our gardeners in the South because their Cabbage plants, which have been planted in the Fall, with the expectation of harvesting a crop of heads in the early Spring, run to seed instead of producing the heads which the gardener feels that he has a right to expect. Under such conditions, it is quite natural for the gardener to feel that the seed purchased is at fault, and that he has suffered loss because his seed was not what he had a right to expect, but a little better understanding of the subject will show that this trouble is due to conditions quite beyond the power of seedsmen to control.

Cabbage is biennial, requiring two periods of growth to produce seed. The conditions required are: First, a period of growth in the plant; second, a dormant period or resting stage.

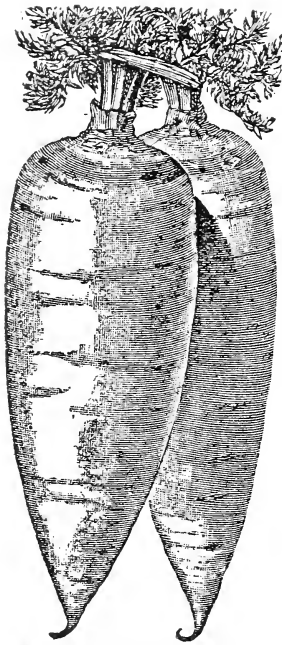
To prevent this, we have found it necessary to keep the young plants growing steadily from the start, as a check in the growth is injurious. Soil cannot be too rich. 5 ounces of seed per acre.

It is pretty hard to say which is the best Cabbage among the varieties that we handle as we consider all of the Early Flat and Late Flat Heads leaders; however, Frottscher's Large Late Flat Dutch, Steckler's New Money Making and Stein's have the lead.

Young plants should be sprayed with Corona Arsenate of Lead when ten days old. Use 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water.

We want to advise our many customers of the superiority of our Cabbage seed. They are all Long Island Grown with exception of a few varieties, such as Copenhagen, which is imported seed. All of our Cabbage seed is the very best strain to be had. 5 ounces per acre.

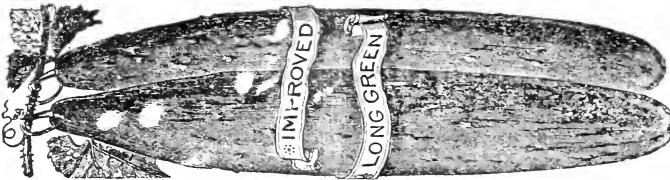

The Danish Snowball, Early Dwarf Erfurt and Algiers lead, however, Early and Late Italian do very well. 5 ounces per acre. Use Corona Arsenate of Lead for insecticide.

CELERY.

Culture.—The seed is usually sown from June to August and again in the fall. Sow the seed in a bed, cover with canvas to prevent the heat from injuring the young plants. As soon as the plants are about 3 inches high transplant and firm well. Keep the seed bed moist to insure germination and vigorous growth. The plants should be set out in October, set the plants 10 inches apart in rows 3 feet apart. Work up between rows and draw soil around plants from time to time. To bleach cover to their very tips when they will be ready for use soon after. Requires 5 to 6 months to produce the crop. Ounce for 3,000 plants; ½ pound will plant an acre.

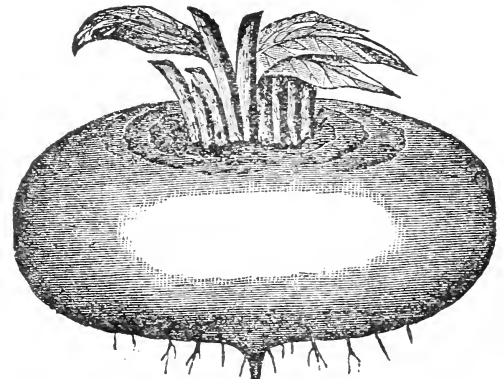
Turnips do best in new ground. When the soil has been worked long, it should receive a top dressing of nitrate. If stable manure is used the ground should be manured the Spring previous to sowing, so it may be well incorporated with the soil. When fresh manure is used the Turnips are apt to become speckled.
