GLADIOLUS

Mailing weight 1 lb. per doz.
 Gladiolus are general favorites among the summer flowering bulbs. They are easy to grow, blooming successfully under unfavorable conditions and need a minimum amount of care and attention but paying big dividends if given extra favor. Their stalks of lily-like blooms found in almost all shades and colors are the most satisfactory of cut flowers lasting a week or more if cut when the first buds are opening.

CANNAS

Cannas are most satisfactory bedding plants with their wide arching leaves and stiff stalks of flaming flowers growing like torches above the foliage. Exuberant of growth a bed becomes attractive soon after planting and each day thereafter adds to its beauty, blooming constantly until cut down by frost. Tubers may be started in moist sand indoors or planted out of doors when all danger of frost is over. Send for catalog.

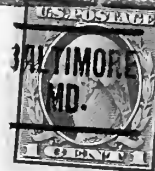

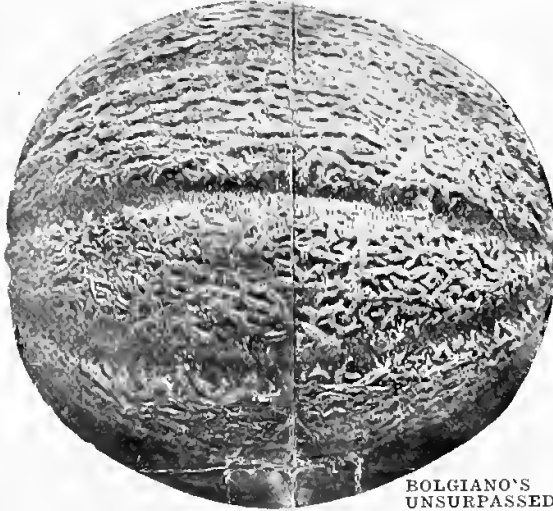

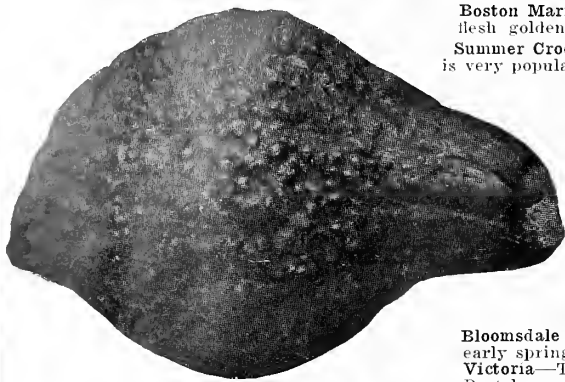
