ORDER EARLY—As orders are filled in rotation—with field-grown roots only—ordering early will insure the reservation of varieties that later may be soll out.

SUBSTITUTION—Orders are filled with varieties called for, and, unless substitution is asked, I never substitute.

TIME OF SHIPMENT—Unless otherwise ordered, tubers will be shipped between April 15th and May 15th by express or insured mail at my expense. Dadlias ordered shipped before April 15th will be sent only at purchaser's risk of drying out, freezing or rotting.

TERMS—(ash with order unless parties are known to me. No goods sent (, O, D, unless 50 per cent of purchase price accompanies order.

GUARANTEE—I guarantee safe arrival of all goods. I guarantee ad ballis to grow and to be true to name, and will cheerfully replace any that fail in either respect.

REMITTANCES should be made by bank draft, postoffice money order or registered letter. Postage stamps accepted up to \$2.00. Coin should not be sent by letter unless registered.

It is in a class by itself, and has more the effect of a rare tropical Orchid, than a Dahlia. The flower is large, and held well above the foliage on an eighteen inch stem.

The waxy petals, of great substance, are long and pointed, and curl and twist in such a manner, as to almost cover the center.

Color is a clear glistening ivory, deepening to cream at base of petals, and a faint glow of Buttercup yellow, gleams through the clustered petals at the center.

The Acme Studios tell me that it is impossible to illustrate this Dahlia either in half tone or colors, for owing to its peculiar formation and delicate coloring, neither of these processes would do the flower justice, or give any idea of its unusual beauty.





Cultural Directions

Dahlias are easily grown requiring no special soil treatment in skill to bring them to perfection.

They are really an Autumn flower and should not be planted too early

They are remarkably free from disease and have few special enemies

Plant in sunny situation, although they will do nicely in partial shade,

Prepare the soil by deep spading: if soil is saidy a shovel full of well rotted manufe may be incorporated with it: if otherwise use little if any fertilizer before plants begin to bud. Add said or coal askes to heavy sail

Drive a state in each hole to support the plant. Lay tuber down flat with eye upward and next to stake about six inches deep and cover two inches with pulverized soil anadually filling to level as plant progresses.

As soon as plants are large enough, planth out the top just above the second or third set of leaves: this causes the plant to branch

Cultivate well until buds appear than stop all cultivation except light taking after rain or watering just enough to break the crust of ground, only be sure and do this

When buds appear Spread manure or some fertilizer around plant and table lightly into the soil

Sometimes a perfectly good tuber with a good eye will refuse to specite in such cases, dig up the tuber and soak for 24 hours in Fresh water this usually will cause it to sprout in a reasonable time after replanting

Unless meather is very dry and hot, do not begin watering until buds appear them soak the ground thoroughly not sprinkle) about once a week twice days. Out off all reded flowers with as much of the stalk as you can

For Entra large blooms dished by pinching off all the buds in a cluster except the strongest one

If both ored by cut worms or slugs, cut a piece of taired paper 5 inches wide by 10 or 10 inches long form collar and place around glant one inch below and two inches above ground.

For cut flowers pick in the evening or early morning if possible, but the enfs of stems in any dame, or dip in boiling water for 10 seconds after eather treatment place in cold water and jut in cool place free from diaff with manted
