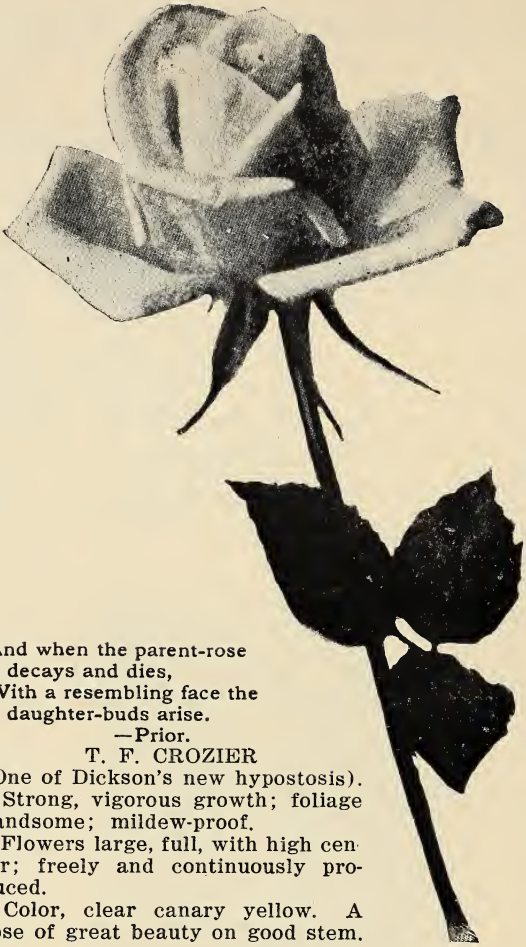

BUDED ROSES

Budded Roses grow far more vigorously than those on their own root and are longer lived; so that the slight additional expense incurred to begin with is more than compensated in having superior plants. The only possible objection—claimed by some—is that the plants are apt to sucker. We avoid this by dis-budding the stock, making this possibility nil. As a further preventative we recommend that our customers plant the junction of the bud with the stock two or three inches under ground.

- RED RADIANCE**—A bright, cheerful, even shade of pure red; size, foliage and growth same as its parent.
- ROSALIND**—Sport from Ophelia of much the same habits, color pink shaded coral.
- THERESA**—Semi-double flower, deep orange-apricot, passing to ecru, flushed pink.
- SUNBURST**—Orange copper or golden yellow. A giant rose; long stems, long pointed buds; vigorous, free and healthy.
- TIPPERARY**—A seedling from Mrs. A. Ward; clear yellow, on stiff stems; free flowering; has good foliage.
- WHITE OPHELIA**—Pure white shading to yellow in center.

TEA ROSES

The Tea Roses are our very best bloomers, and while they are not so hardy as H. T., we have very little trouble growing them in our Puget Sound climate. We do not recommend them for cold climates.

- CHARLES DINGEE**—The best rose for outdoor culture. Color rose tint shading off into a creamy white.....75c
- LADY GREENALL**—Intense saffron orange, heavily zoned and overspread on deep creamy white.
- LADY HILLINGDON**—Deep apricot yellow, long and pointed bud, a fine forcing or garden rose, excellent for cutting. Flowers are of a good substance, very lasting and foliage handsome and luxuriant.
- LADY PLYMOUTH**—A distinct rose; pearly cream; free

flowering; beautiful buds and flowers carried on erect stems; has bronze foliage.

- LADY ROBERTS**—A fine rich apricot base, coppery red; free blooming75c
- MOLLY SHERMAN CRAWFORD**—Creamy white, changing to pure white; fragrant.....75c
- MRS. FOLLY HOBBS**—Delicate ivory white, faintly tinged clear, pink on edge of petals; exceptionally fine for exhibition.
- MRS. HERBERT STEVENS**—Long, beautifully pointed buds, large, full flowers, ivory white, shadings of peach and fawn on edge of petals.
- NILES COCHET (or Red Cochet)**—A counterpart of the well known Cochet roses except the color which is cherry red on outside of petals and lighter on inside; also has stronger stems.....75c
- WILLIAM R. SMITH**—The soft blending of the salmon-pinks and the rose-pinks and the beautiful flesh tints in this rose give it a singular resemblance to the entrancing flush on a maiden's cheek.....75c

PERNETIANA ROSES

- LYON ROSE**—Shrimp pink or coral center, salmon shaded chrome yellow.

- GEORGE ARENDS**—Strong growing, free blooming, well-shaped buds of a delicate pink.....75c
- GLOIRIE de CHEDANE GUINOISSEAU**—Bright vermilion red, shaded velvety crimson; considered by many good judges superior to the Ulrich Brunner.
- HEINRICH MUNICH (H. T.) (Pink Druschki)**—Soft pink; large, full and double; vigorous.....75c
