





Many of my customers have asked me what kind of a knife I use in separating my clumps of dahlias, so thinking it will make it convenient for my customers, I am offering the knives we use to separate the dahlia clumps. The above illustration shows their general appearance. This knife has a two inch blade made of finest tool steel, with nickel-plated closed-end ferrules, and every blade securely riveted in the handle. The blades are ground sharp and hand honed. This knife has an oval taper rubberoid handle. In addition to being used in cutting dahlias, it is made for Grape picking and Pruning purposes. A good pruning knife is always handy.
