

All prices are subject to change without notice, and all quotations are subject to prior sale. Orders are accepted contingent upon strikes, accidents and shortages arising from weather conditions and other unavoidable causes.

TERMS

\$2.00 deposit on orders of \$20.00 and under; 10% deposit on orders over \$20.00; balance cash on delivery.

DISCOUNT FOR ALL CASH WITH ORDER

Orders amounting to less than \$50.00 and paid in full at time of giving or within ten days thereafter will be entitled to additional nursery stock equivalent to 10% of the order. This discount, however, applies only to orders for Fall delivery placed before September 15th and on orders for Spring delivery placed before February 1st. Orders of \$50.00 or more, cash with order will be allowed a Cash Dis-count of 1% per month covering the time involved between date of pay-ment and October 1st on Fall orders, and March 1st on Spring orders. No period less than one-half a month will be recognized. No discount is allowed where only 10% denosit is made


REPLACEMENT

Our trees are sold on the basis of delivery in good condition to the point of destination named in the order, and are thereafter at the planter's risk. If trees are not in good condition when received notify the company immediately, giving full particulars.

The Company will exercise great care and precaution to only supply stock in good condition and true to name and specification. Should any defective stock be furnished, the Company will, upon proof of same, replace all trees or other stock without charges to the purchaser, or may at its election refund cost of same; but, unless otherwise specifically stated in writing, no guarantee of genuineness or warranty of any character shall be construed to hold the Company responsible for any sum greater than the cost to the purchaser of the trees or other stock proven to be defective; nor for the consequential damage of any nature. Any claim for shortage or damage for which this Company might be held liable must be made within fifteen (15) days after the customer's receipt of the stock.

This is a comparatively new apple and is therefore not known or appreciated like some of the older and better known sorts. It is a large apple of golden yellow color, firm texture, crisp, sub-acid, good cooking and table apple during its season of July and August. As it becomes better known we believe it will displace the popular Yellow Transparent.

*Waldron Beauty-\$1.25 each; \$12.50 per dozen

This splendid variety originated near Oregon City, Oregon, and was introduced by us a number of years ago, and we take pleasure in recommending it to you as a specially fine Autumn apple. It is of medium size, almost full red underlaid with a greenish yellow on the under side; meat is white similar to the Snow or McIntosh Red. The tree is a very heavy producer and the apple has attracted attention at several Fairs.

Vanderpool Red-\$1.00 each; \$10.00 per dozen

This is probably one of the most promising varieties we have listed. It is from medium to large size, depending upon the altitude and conditions under which it is grown. Color, full bright red; very heavy producer and an exceptionally long keeper considering that it is also an apple of high quality, which combination is rarely found to such a marked degree. No home orchard is complete without it and as it becomes better known it will take its place in the commercial ranks with the very best red apples.

A new variety of the Royal Ann type, originated in Lane County, Oregon, but maturing from four to six weeks later than this standard variety. Is very similar to the Royal Ann in general appearance, is fully as large as the average fruit of this well known variety but is a little sweeter and more pleasant to eat out of hand. Is a good variety for home canning and ripening at the season it does, escapes damage from rains which frequently are experienced when the Royal Ann is ripening. We recommend the Royal Stewart, as a choice family orchard variety. It is also promising as a commercial fruit since it is firmer and a better shipper than the Black Republican.

This is unquestionably the greatest prune ever introduced and promises to revolutionize the prune industry of the country. Possessing all the good qualities of the French or Petite prune it also has the advantage of size. The Date Prune grades on an average of 30 to the pound as compared with 70 as an average for the Petite, and 55 as an average for the Italian. In addition it carries an average of 50 per cent sugar in its evaporated form. It also has the added advantage of shrinking less when evaporated. To illustrate: It requires 300 pounds of Italian prunes to make 100 pounds dried prunes; 250 pounds of Petite to make 100 pounds dried and only 200 pounds of the Date Prune to make 100 pounds of the dried product.

On account of less shrinkage, large grades and the heavy bearing features of the Date Prune it will yield upwards of \$3.00 against \$1.00 derived from either the Petite or Italian. As a fruit for shipping in its ripe state, or for home use, it is par excellence.

This variety is thought to be a cross between the Italian and Petite, inasmuch as it shows characteristics of both these varieties. It, however, is larger and differs in form from both. It is large, oblong and slightly flattened on either side. It has a bloom on the fruit similar to the Italian

but the skin is more like the Petite. It blossoms a little later than the Italian and matures a little earlier. Mr. Vercler, of Salem, the originator, has fruited the New Oregon for several years and each year he has had a full crop, when his Italian trees right alongside of the New Oregon did not produce over five per cent of a crop. Mr. Vercler's orchard has also demonstrated that the New Oregon suffers practically nothing from Autumn rains while the Italian frequently suffers very heavily. This variety from its past record promises to become prominent as a commercial variety. We have displayed this new prune at the Oregon State Fair, Salem, where it has always attracted unusual attention and elicited favorable comment.
