Away back in the year 1869, more than 55 years ago, Mr. Gold began in a very small way, on his farm in Bedford Township, Meigs County, Ohio, to grow trees and plants for his neighbors and the trade near him. By careful study of the business, prudent management and honest dealing, his trade increased from year to year, until his sons grew up. They took an active interest in the business, and soon the firm's name became "T. H. Gold \& Sons."

In 1899, the business having outgrown the Bedford township farm, a large tract of land was secured at Mason City, West Virginia, and the business transferred to that point. This tract has since been enlarged from t me to time as the business has been marked by a healthy growth from the beginning. This change gave greater convenience of shipment, enlarged the output, and the business, nourished in its infancy and given a successful start in life by Mr. Gold, was ready for its long, vigorous and useful existence.

About this time Mr. T. H. Gold retired from the firm and for sereral years the business was conducted by the firm "Gold Brothers." Hardy Flowering Shrubs develop very kuick$1 y$, and are therefore indespensible where it is desirable to make an inmmediate showing. A good shrub collection will present the greatest variety of color throughout the season, both in flower and foliage.
