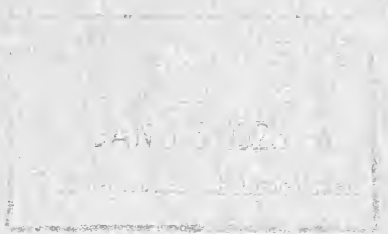

ASCLEPIAS tuberosa. (Butterfly Silk Weed) Bright orange red flowers borne in clusters on strong stems. 2½ ft. July-September. 1.50 10.00

ASTER. (Michaelmas Daisy. Starwort) As a plant of general usefulness the aster stands unrivaled. The great variety in color, size of flower, time of flowering and height, combined with simple cultural requirements make it one of the most desirable of hardy plants. Many of the varieties are excellent for cutting. The finest flowers and strongest spikes are obtained if the plants are divided annually.

Climax. A universal favorite. If given good treatment the flowers attain to three inches in diameter, they are pale mauve with yellow centers, and are borne on long slender stems. 5 to 6 ft. September-October. 1.50 10.00
