CARE OF TREES UPON ARRIVAL.

If unable to plant immediately, they should be taken from the bale and heeled out in a well drained, moist piece of ground in order that the roots may not become exposed to air and sun.

Water well. The ground should be well plowed, disked and harrowed before planting in orchard. Only take a few trees out at a time

when planting so as to protect the roots from drying. Cut back at least one-third of the growth. Do not use unrotted stable manure in

holes or around the trees. You can greatly stimulate growth by using well rotted manure, mixing well with the soil. Bone meal is a fine

fertilizer for young trees; apply in March or April by digging trench around tree and apply, mixing with soil 12 inches from trunk of tree. Give your trees a chance—it will pay.
