than the others, trim off all but 5 or 6 for your main top. 2-vr Apple same as for Peach. Cut 1-vear apple whips back to 30 to 36 inches or to suit your own taste, keep low side sprouts off at all times. About July 1st trim up bodies to form the desired Don't Top Back Young Trees During the Growing Season of their first year. Encourage all the growth possible, as you would in a young pig. Don't stunt them. The following Spring head back about one-half the previous season's growth cutting just above an outside bud, but keep your knife away from the heads of young Cherry trees. Don't plant Cherry on wet or flat ground, they can't stand wet feet. Ridge up and plant on the ridge, leave the "Bud" 2 inches above the ground.

Cultivate. Top dress your ground with manure once a year and work it in. Keep manure out of the holes when planting, put it on top but not against trees Watch for Borers at the base of your trees, keep them out. Use soft soap on the bodies of young peach trees, keep the ground loose and free from weeds. Cultivate. Thousands of young trees die of starvation and lack of care after leaving the nursery. Feed them, cultivate them, and watch them grow.

If ground is very dry when planting trees fill hole half full of fine dirt, throw in two or three buckets of water and let soak away before filling up the hole.

PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS

The place for the roots of trees is in the ground. As soon as you get home with your trees cut the bundle open, shake out the packing and heel in not more than 5 trees tied together, bury them up well with good loose dirt, dip the roots in a tub of water before putting them in the trench. If ground is dry empty the tub of water into trench when half filled with dirt, let soak away fill up and pack well upon the bodies. Don't expose roots to sun, air or wind for 5 minutes if possible. Let trees stay in trench until you get the holes dug. Take out only a few at a time while planting. Plow your ground deep with a back furrow where each row is to be planted. Dig holes wide and deep enough so that the "offset" where tree is budded will not be more than one inch below the top of ground. The "offset" is your guide. A lath across the hole will show you how deep to plant. Trim off all bruised or broken roots from the underside with a Sharp knife. Fill in with good top soil and pack solid around the roots if ground is not wet. Don't plant in muddy or wet ground or where water will stand. Wait until ground is in condition, trees will keep if you heeled them in properly. Don't make the mistake of planting too deep, you will smother the roots. Mound up fall planted trees 6 to 8 inches with mound 3 feet across. Wrap with hay, straw or paper against cold weather and rabbits. Don't cut back fall planted trees until spring. Don't cut back Cherry trees at all, trim up the sides in Spring to make the desired head. Cut back Peach tops about one-half if branched, leaving center shoot 6 to 10 inches longer

Always give second choice if possible as we do not substitute unless allowed to do so, then we use the proper label so you will know what variety has been sent in place of that we are out of.

We do not ship by parcel post only when small trees or plants are ordered. We do not prepay transportation charges but put in enough extras to help pay these. Order by freight or express. Most of our trees are too large for parcel post shipment.
