MANAGER'S PERSONAL WORD

Dear Friends and Customers:

Madison, Wis., Jan. 1, 1925.

In presenting this our 38th Annual Catalog I wish to thank you heartily for your continued patronage. I began this business way back in 1888 on the old farm at Clinton, Wisconsin, handling for the first few years nothing but seed potatoes. I little thought then that the business would grow to its present proportions. The past year was the largest in our history except one, the year 1920.

Confidence. I am more and more impressed with the fact that our success in the seed business is dependent on the confidence that our customers have in us. It is not enough that we are financially responsible and that Dun and Bradstreet give us high ratings with first grades of credit. Good seed is not an expense but an investment.

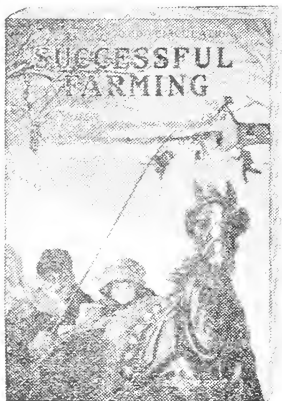

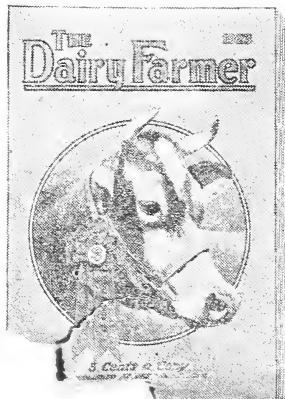

PLEASE USE ORDER SHEET found in the catalog in making out your order and retain a copy of the order. If you have occasion later on to write us about the order give postoffice address under which it was mailed. Orders are filed by post offices, so if you give a different post-office address in writing it is difficult for us to find the order.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS when received unless the order, in some part or it, is to be sent at once or within a day or so. If any part is mailed right out that answers as an acknowledgment or if goods can be sent at once or very soon by freight or express we send acknowledgment and notice of shipment at the same time, enclosing Bill of Lading.

WE SEND LARGE SHIPMENTS BY FREIGHT unless otherwise instructed. See table of freight rates below. We have three railroads here at Madison, Chicago and Northwestern, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Illinois Central.

CUSTOMERS PAY TRANSPORTATION CHARGES on all goods unless offered postpaid. Small shipments will be sent by express unless ordered by mail or unless the price includes postage. Our garden seed prices in small quantities are postpaid prices, but prices on field seeds and side lines do not include postage unless so stated. There are special express rates on seeds, in the main, 25 per cent less than the merchandise rates.

NO CHARGE FOR PACKING OR CARTAGE. Everything will be securely packed and labeled and delivered free at the freight, express or post office.

ORDER EARLY. Do this for two reasons. We can give your orders more careful and prompt attention if received before we get into the rush, and then we will not have to write for permission to substitute for varieties sold out.

OUR THREEFOLD GUARANTEE.

1. QUALITY. We guarantee the quality of the seeds, plants, bulbs and potatoes we send out to the extent that should they not prove as represented we will refill the order or return the money; but we give no further warranty, or express or implied, as to description, purity, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, potatoes, bulbs or plants. We send out and will not be responsible for the crop. Goods may be returned if not satisfactory.

2. SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee everything we send out to arrive in good order. If potatoes freeze on the road we will refill the order if the time of shipping is left to our discretion. If any goods arrive in bad order, however, bags torn or anything else wrong, have this noted on the freight expense bill which must be sent us so that we can make proper claim. The bill of lading must be returned also. Therefore do not lose the bill of lading.

3. RECEIPT OF MONEY. We will be responsible for all money sent us through the mails, if remittance is made by P. O. or Express Order, Draft or Registered Letter. We will accept personal checks at face value. They look good to us. Small amounts, less than \$1.00, may usually be sent safely in postage stamps or coin.

PRICE CHANGES.

It is impossible to anticipate in advance all our requirements in some staple items or to foresee market changes. Accordingly we reserve the right to change the prices of Field Seeds if necessary after Feb. 1st. Beginning with that date we issue weekly price lists of Field Seeds giving the prices in effect each week. These price lists are furnished on application and inserted in catalogs mailed after Feb. 1st. The prices on Garden Seeds and on most of the side lines will remain throughout the season as given in the catalog and we do not expect there will be many changes in the Field Seed prices but there are sure to be some.

THE CLOVER SEED SITUATION.

Total Clover Seed Crop for the United States Only Half the Usual Amount.

This page is one of the last pages of the catalog to be written. As we go to press the clover seed situation is certainly a serious one. The latest crop reports show a total production of clover seed in the United States the past season of 817,000 bushels as compared with 1,100,000 in 1923 and a five-year average of 1,610,000 bushels. We have therefore just about half a crop the country over. Last year we were short also, but 400,000 bushels were imported from Europe. This year Europe has a shortage and will probably have very little seed for the United States. The best farmers do not want European seed anyway but somebody used it last year and it helped out.

Red Clover seed prices are already high but will be higher. We know we are giving our customers good advice when we urge them to buy early. You will pay more if you wait until spring and will not get as good seed if you succeed in getting seed at all. Fortunately at this writing we have a good large stock of clover seed on hand, more in fact than usual at this time of year as we have bought heavily. Our best seed this year comes from Idaho and this seed is beautiful indeed. Bright, clean and pure, dodder free and buckhorn free, testing 99 per cent or over in purity. We have quite a number of cars of this beautiful Idaho seed and from this stock we get our Superb Brand. Our Old Gold Brand is mostly Wisconsin and Minnesota grown. This is really very nice seed, testing usually 98 per cent or better and is entirely free of all noxious weeds, but it does not look as nice and is not as bright and fancy as the Idaho seed.

All our clover seed is thoroughly re-cleaned and is high grade seed in every way. It is all tested, is free from bad weeds and is all American grown. We never handle European seed at all. Do not buy foreign seed and do not buy cheap untested seed. It is the worst kind of folly. Buy Olds' tested re-cleaned northern grown seed.

SWEET CLOVER. (The Great Fertilizer and Hay Crop.)

Sweet Clover is no longer an experiment. It has become a staple crop and is grown now in nearly all sections.

It grows readily on most all soils and locations.

It has the same sort of bacteria laden nodules as alfalfa and inoculates for that crop.

Sweet Clover brings land up rapidly and fits it not only for alfalfa but all crops.

It can be pastured while alfalfa cannot.

All stock relish it when once taught to eat it.

It makes a profitable hay crop, while the second crop may be harvested for seed.

Sow 10 to 15 pounds of seed per acre. The white blossomed variety is usually considered the most valuable. Hulled seed is preferable to unhulled and in fact is the only seed to sow. Scarifying the seed also makes it germinate better. All our sweet clover seed is scarified. The seed should always be inoculated for best results. See page 5.

The crop of White Blossom Sweet Clover was very good the past season, especially in North Dakota, where most of our seed was grown and where the best seed is produced. This is the year to sow sweet clover as the price is low. In many cases it will indeed prove a very good substitute for red clover.

GRUNDY COUNTY SWEET CLOVER.

It seems that Grundy County, Illinois, is a great sweet clover center. In fact the last census report shows that this county had the largest per cent acreage of sweet clover as a forage crop of any county in the United States. They grow there common white blossom, yellow blossom, Grundy County and Hubam but by far the greatest acreage now is Grundy County as the farmers all prefer it.



Grundy County Sweet Clover has several outstanding advantages. First, it is three weeks earlier than the common sweet clover. Thus the seed ripens ahead of most weeds. Second, while it grows to a good height and makes a good hay crop it is not as tall as the common and is much more easily handled. Third, it is finer and more leafy than the common and branches thickly about a foot above the ground. Fourth, it yields more seed than the common, several farms in Grundy County producing as high as 8 to 15 bushels per acre.

Grundy County Sweet Clover is perhaps more like Alfalfa than Sweet Clover. It grows like alfalfa only faster and the hay is like alfalfa hay so that it is in fact almost a "White Blossom Alfalfa."

We have a fine lot of this Grundy County Sweet Clover seed, all first grade beautiful seed, hulled and scarified.

Culture. Sow with or without a nurse crop 10 to 15 pounds per acre. Spring is the best time for sowing but Hubam can be sown in the fall the same as other sweet clover. The seed we offer is genuine pure Hubam, scarified and all northern grown. Crop was very short the past season and seed is extremely scarce.

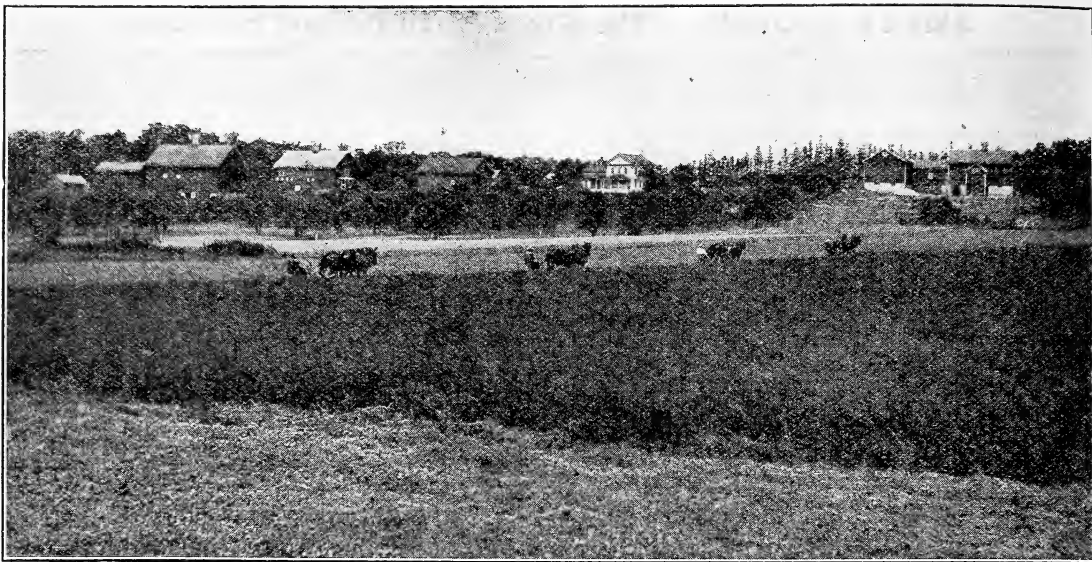

Fourth, Red Clover seed is so high this year that many farmers will use alfalfa as a substitute for clover.



For all the above reasons and others that might be mentioned we believe that the coming spring we will witness largely increased alfalfa sowing and so we say on our front cover "Alfalfa, the Farmer's Best Bet for 1925." Anticipating therefore a very great demand for alfalfa seed we have loaded up heavily. GRIMM ALFALFA (The Extra Hardy Strain of Alfalfa.)



History. The seed of this variety was brought to Minnesota from Germany in 1857, by a German farmer named Grimm. Prof. W. M. Hayes, while at the Minnesota Experiment Station about 1890 found Mr. Grimm growing this alfalfa and at once began calling attention to its hardiness and adaptability to Minnesota conditions.

This was the beginning of Grimm Alfalfa in the United States.

Characteristics. Grimm Alfalfa may usually be distinguished from common alfalfa.

First, by the fact that the blossoms are usually, not always, variegated in color, yellow, green, blue, brown, etc., instead of all purple.

Second, by its branching root system instead of the long, straight tap root of the common alfalfa. This enables it to withstand the hard winters, the tap root of the common alfalfa often being broken by heavy freezing.

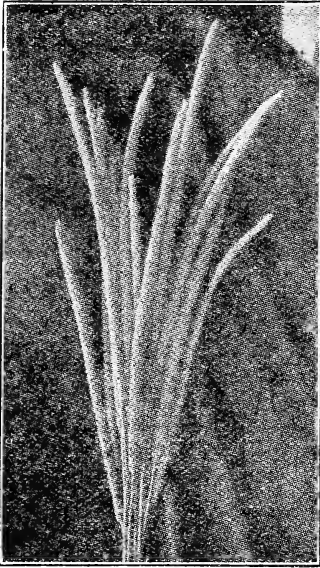

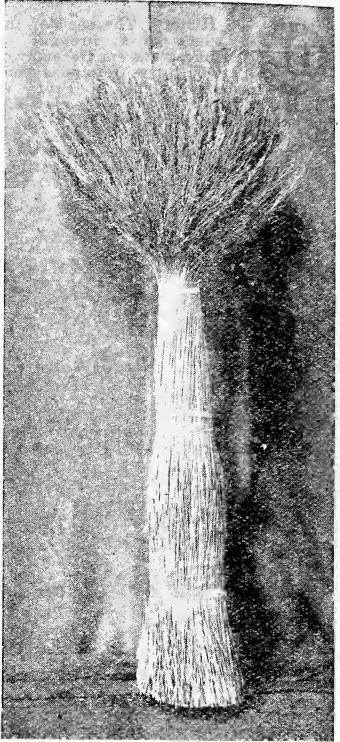

The 1924 corn crop as everyone knows was very late in maturing the country over and it was thought for a time that there would be very little if any corn that would make good seed. Later in the season, however, the weather was more favorable for the development of the corn and while many parts of the country are still without seed corn, here in Wisconsin we succeeded in saving and drying an unusually large quantity of very fine seed.

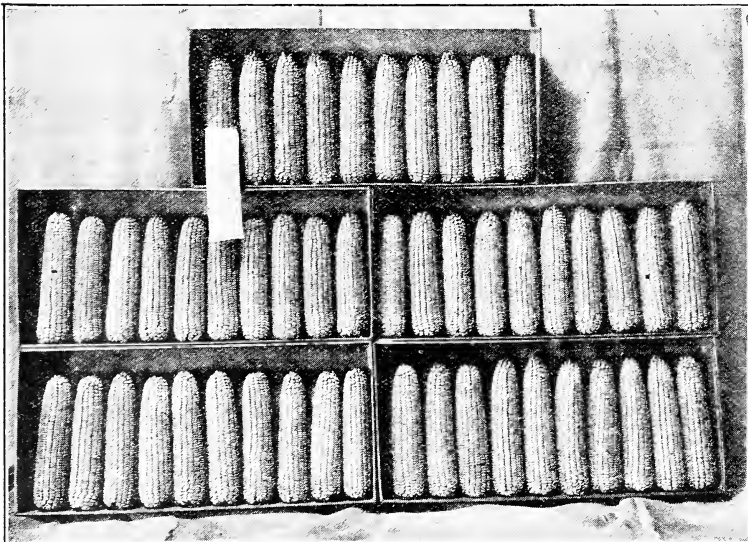

Mr. H. C. Brueckner of Jefferson County, Wisconsin, was the exhibitor of this corn. He took more than 35 premiums on it in 12 years.

Murdock Yellow Dent is of a deep yellow color, ears 8 to 9 inches in length, hard and solid, just slightly rough and very uniform in type. It makes a large heavy growth of stalk and leaf and so is a good silage variety. As to season, it is decidedly early and perfectly safe to plant as far north as the geographical center of Wisconsin. It is a fine extra early also for Illinois, Iowa and other cornbelt states. Earlier than Silver King and will yield as much.

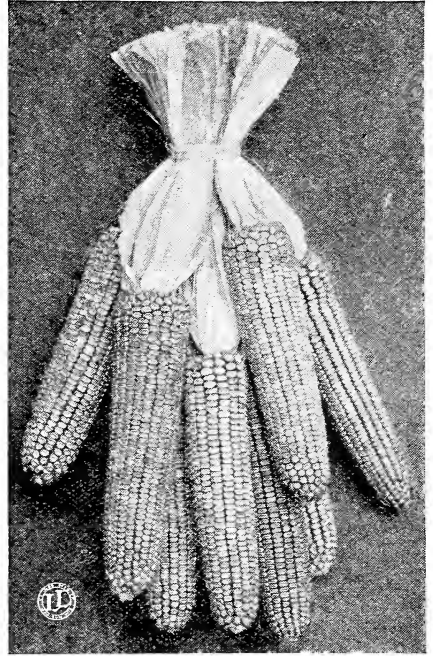

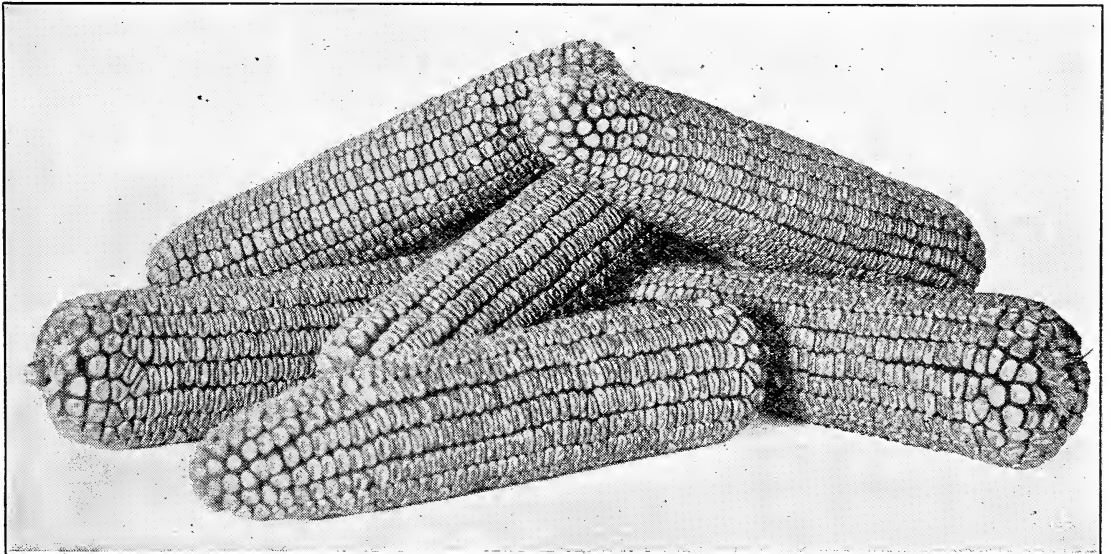

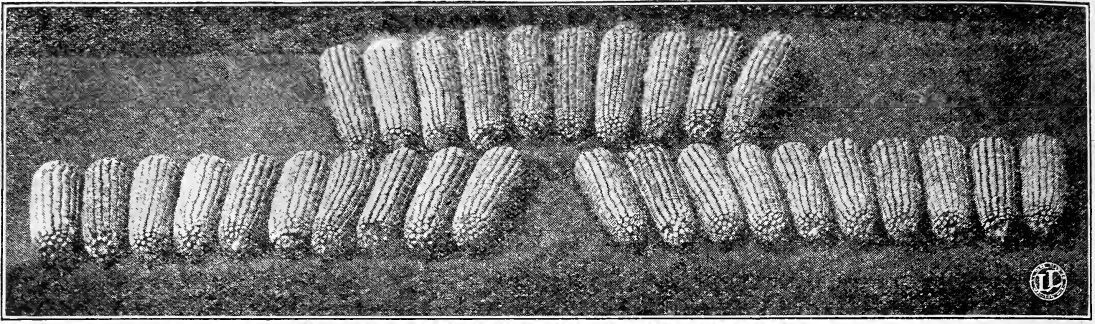

"This corn is selected from the high producing Golden Glow corn bred at the Wisconsin Experiment Station. Selection was made for hardiness so that the corn could be planted a week or 10 days earlier than the usual corn planting time and thus lengthen the corn growing season. This corn produces a large stalk averaging as large as the common Golden Glow. It matures a few days earlier and high yields are reported from growers. It is the best silage corn we know of for central and upper Wisconsin."

Prof. Moore says further: "In regard to the Cold Resistant corn I wish to state that I have great faith in it. Through several years of breeding work at the Wisconsin Experiment Station, cold resistance has been bred into the famous high yielding Golden Glow corn. This has enabled the Golden Glow area to be pushed further to the north, thereby enabling farmers to grow and mature a larger variety of corn where they were not able to succeed before."

Most of the Cold Resistant Golden Glow we have to offer this year was grown by Mr. W. W. Suttie, of Trempealeau County, who has furnished us such fine stock of this variety during the past three years. 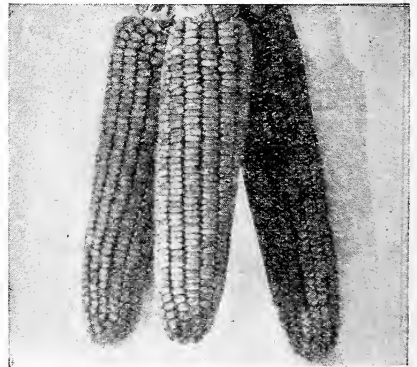

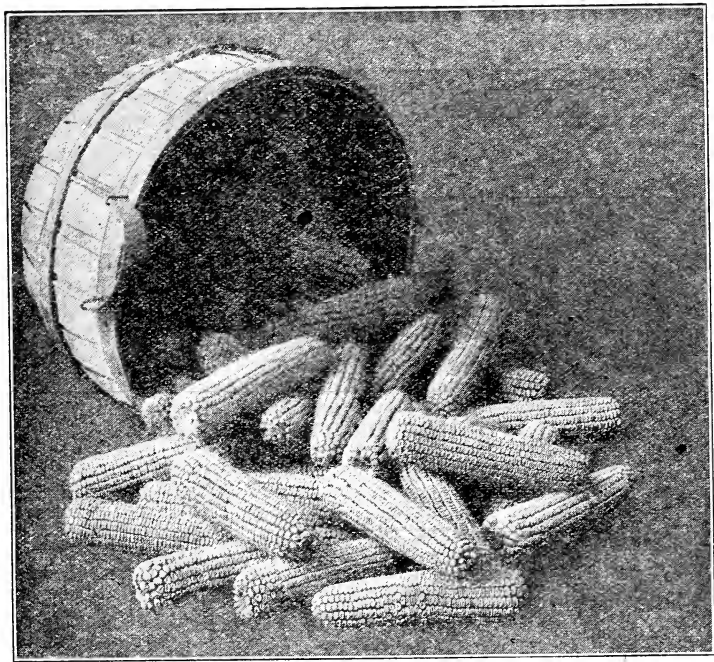

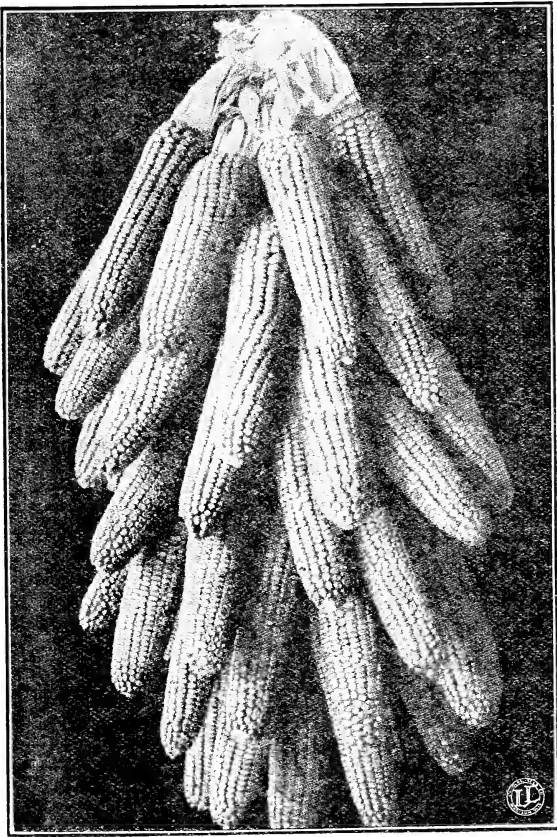

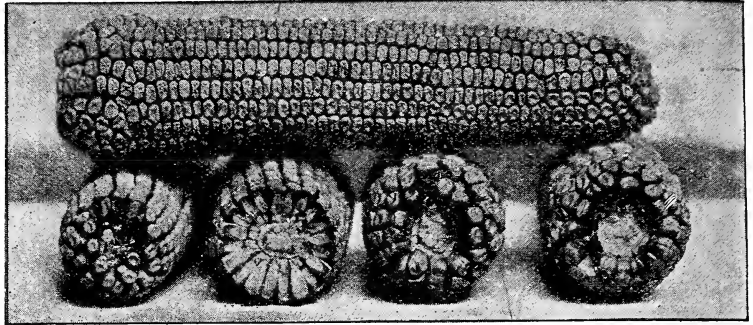

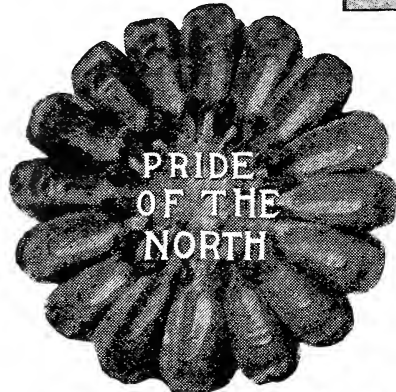

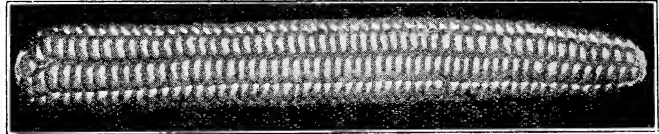

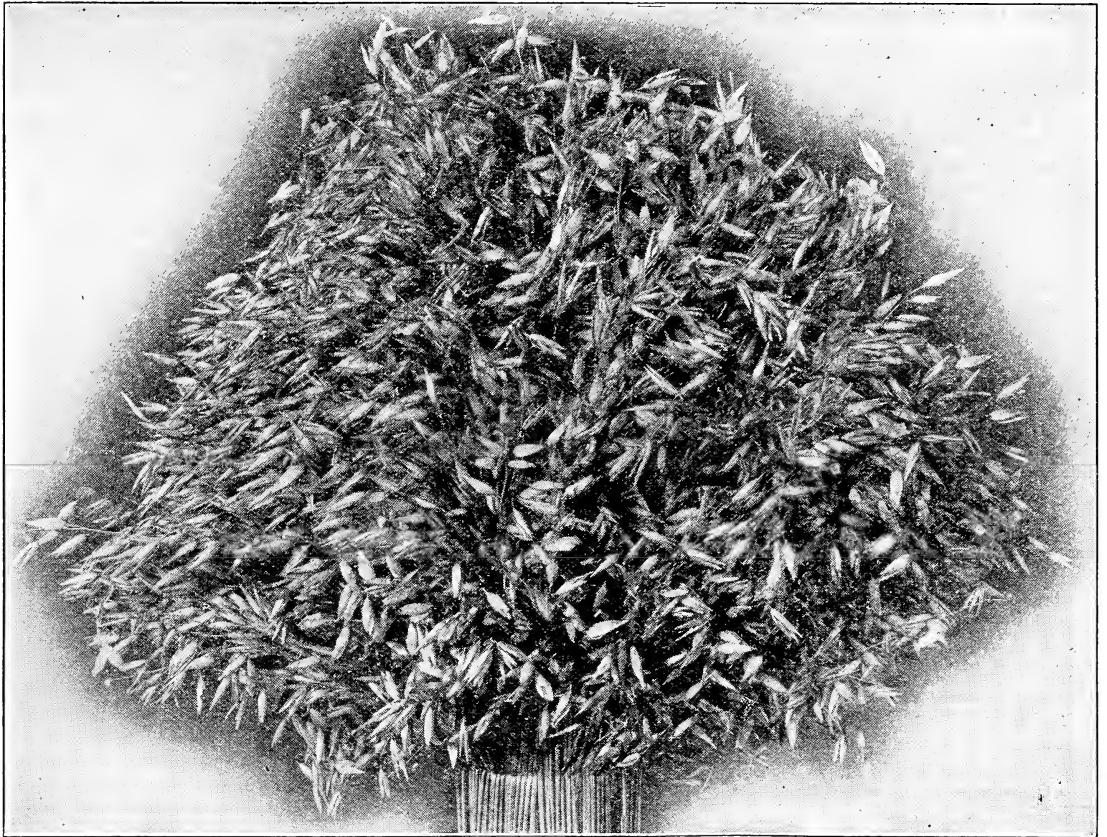

History. State's Pride is of Kherson origin. It came originally from the Kherson district of Russia to the Nebraska Experiment Station. In 1911, breeding work was begun on it at the Wisconsin Station. It was grown in the test plots for 5 years, and during that time showed some remarkable yields, several times over 100 bushels per acre and one year as high as 111 bushels per acre.

Description. State's Pride is a small yellow oat, bright and shiny, with a very thin hull. In fact it is about all meat, very heavy and a great oat for feeding. It is very early. Indeed the earliest of all varieties, some 25 or 30, grown at the Wisconsin Station. This is of great importance as it escapes the rust so apt to hit oats just before harvest. Owing to its earliness it is one of the best for a nurse crop.

It has a short stiff straw and has stood up the best of all oats at the Wisconsin Station Farm. This means a great deal. Even when it lodges some in unfavorable oat years it fills out the kernel well.

Another thing about this oat is its hardiness. Prof. Leith says it is the hardest of anything, resists heat and withstands unfavorable conditions. He recommends it for sandy land especially, as well as for rich black soils. At the same time it seems to be a very satisfactory oat for clay soils and all other soils and is really an all-around good variety.

In yield per acre at the Wis. Experiment Station, State's Pride stood first of all varieties in 1914, 1915, 1917, 1918, 1920 and 1921.

This oat has increased in popularity each year since its first introduction. We grow more each year than the preceding year but never have enough, always running out before the season is over.

Extra early, like State's Pride or Wisconsin No. 7, but a better yielder than State's Pride with a larger kernel and white instead of yellow.

History. Prof. B. D. Leith, Associate Agronomist at the Wisconsin College of Agriculture, tells how this wonderful new variety originated, writing as follows: "The original cross from which this oat was selected was made in 1911. The parents were Wisconsin Pedigree No. 2, which was a selection from Big Four, and a Sixty Day strain. The Big Four is a high yielding mid-season oat and the Sixty Day is an early, yellow, small-kerneled oat. The object of the cross was to produce a high yielding early white oat, with a taller straw and a larger kernel than is usually found in early oats. The larger kernel and white color make it more attractive than the ordinary early white oat, and the tall straw is particularly desirable in localities where the oat straw is short."

In yield per acre, field tests, White Cross headed the list of all varieties of oats at the Wisconsin Experiment Station in 1922 and 1923. Before that for 6 years straight State's Pride was at the top.

IOGREN (Iowa No. 840).

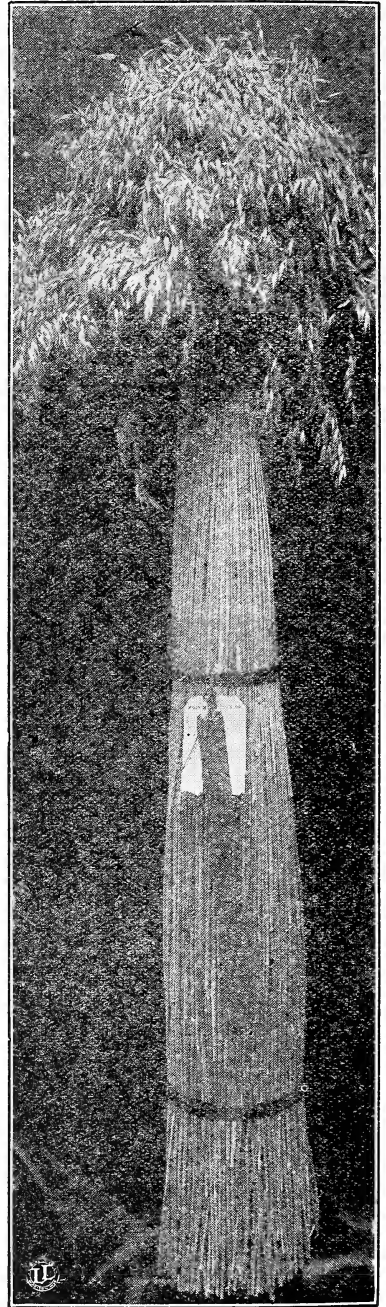

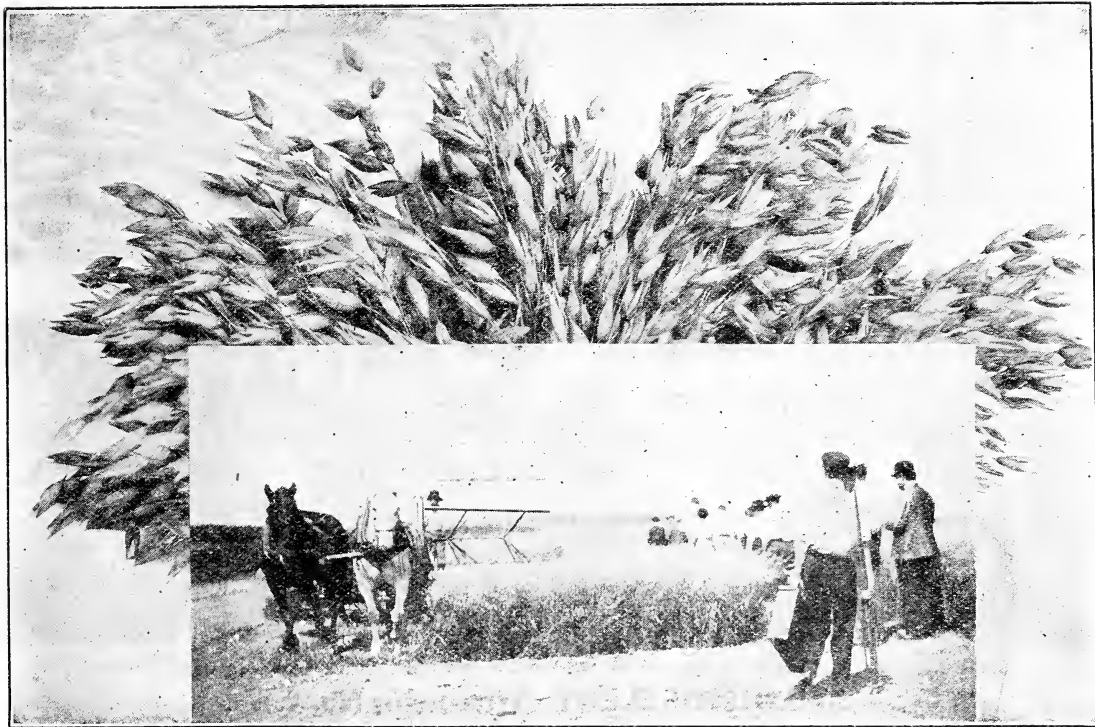

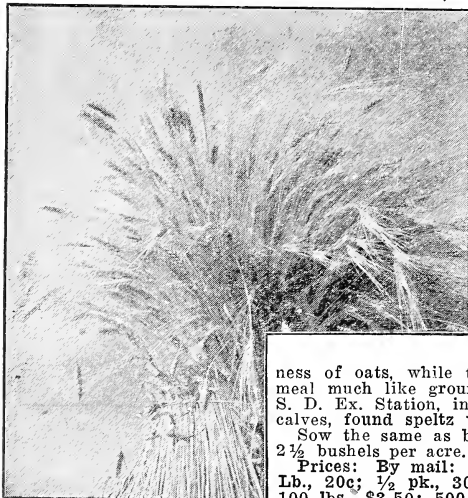

Soy Beans Grown in the North for Hay.

SOY BEANS. (Great For Feed and For Enriching the Soil.)

Soy Beans are being raised with increasing success now in all the northern states as well as in the central and southern states. Many northern farmers are planting with corn for silage. In Iowa they grow with corn for "hogging" down. In Illinois and Indiana they grow for hay and for the dry beans and in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota they grow somewhat for the dry beans and for hay, but mostly for silage planted with corn.

As a dry bean Soy Beans are immensely productive and are equal to oil meal in feeding value.

CULTURE. If planted with corn 3 beans in each hill of corn is about right and this requires 3 to 5 pounds per acre. If planted alone, for hay or seed in rows with cornplanter or drill a half bushel or a bushel of seed per acre may be profitably used, distributing the beans about one inch apart in the row. 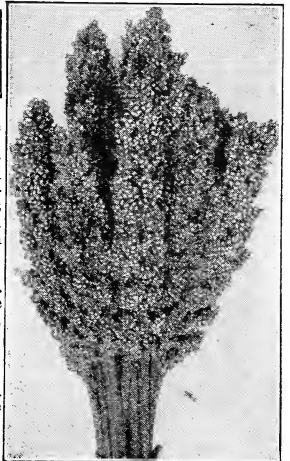

MINNESOTA GROWN SEED.

The most important thing in raising sorghum is to have the right kind of seed. We have an improved strain of Early Amber to offer this year, grown in Minnesota. This strain has been developed by selective breeding through a term of years for hardiness and early maturity. With this seed it is not necessary to plant as early and the most of the work, so far as handling weeds is concerned, can be done before planting time by thorough disking and harrowing.

Culture. Plant about the middle or last of May, after the ground becomes warm, preferably on fall plowed land, in rows 3 to 4 feet wide, hills 2 to 3 feet apart, putting 10 to 15 seeds in a hill and later thinning to 6 or 8 stalks. This is for syrup making purposes and requires about 4 to 6 pounds of seed per acre. For fodder purposes drill thicker in the

row, 15 to 18 pounds per acre. An ordinary corn planter will handle the seed in either case but do not plant more than an inch in depth. Some farmers of late years are planting corn and sorghum together for silage. Use the Minnesota grown cane for producing sorghum and while it is also fine for fodder the Southern grown is cheaper and larger growing.

The (f) diameter of potatoes of round varieties shall be not less than one and seven-eighths (1 7/8) inches and of potatoes of long varieties one and three quarters (1 3/4) inches."

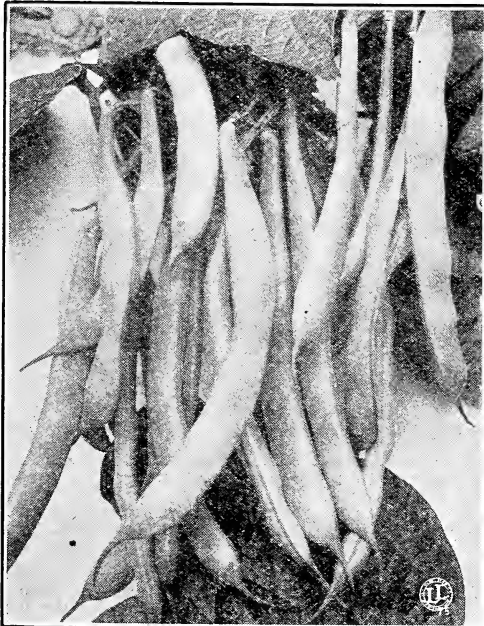

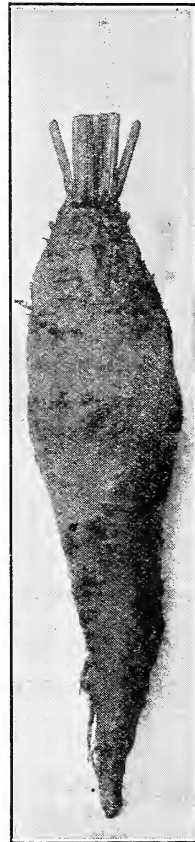

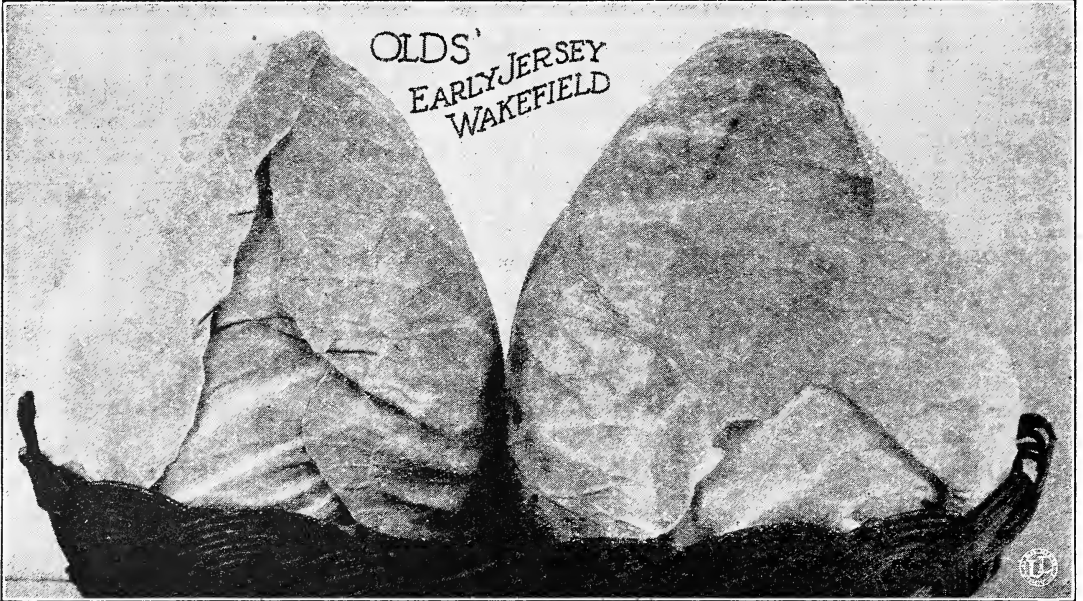
The accompanying photograph of a field at Racine, Wisconsin, shows a test row of cabbage from good commercial seed in the center of a field of disease-resistant cabbage. A very few plants out of hundreds set out, survived in this row. No clearer demonstration of the value of resistant seed in districts affected by yellows could be given. Racine and Kenosha are in the heart of the oldest cabbage section in Wisconsin, but a few years back, cabbage growing had been practically abandoned there because the soil had become so badly infected with this destructive fungus, that a satisfactory



stand could no longer be secured. Then, after years of experiment and study, Professor L. R. Jones of the Department of Plant Pathology of the University of Wisconsin, selected three strong heads of the Danish Ballhead or Hollander variety, which were apparently immune to yellows. The seed from these were planted, and extensive field tests proved the plants from this seed to be as resistant as were the first three. 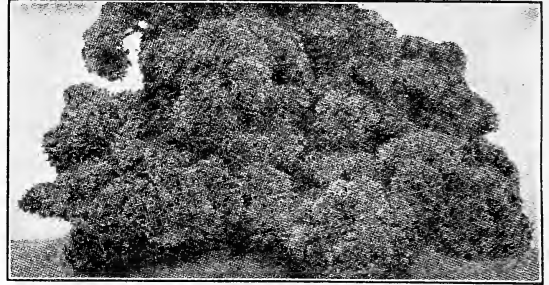

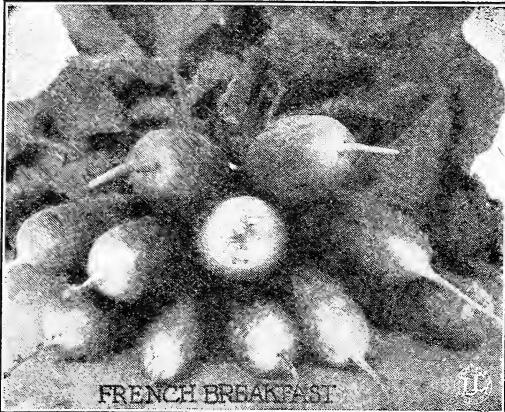

SPINACH.

CULTURE. This is a very important market-garden crop, and one of the most easily managed of all vegetables, requiring but little attention. May be had in condition for use during the entire season. The main crop for spring use is sown in August or September, about one inch deep in rows a foot apart. If the field is exposed cover with about 3 inches of straw to prevent it from being cut by frost; but if the field is sheltered, covering is unnecessary. For summer use, sow at intervals of two or three weeks from April to August. To be tender and succulent spinach must be grown in rich soil.

Most flowering plants will live in almost any soil, but to give them a fair chance to develop, some care must be taken to make the ground suited to their needs. The soil best adapted to flowering plants is generally a light friable loam, containing enough sand to make it porous, thoroughly pulverized and enriched with liberal amounts of bone meal or well rotted manure. Make the seed bed as fine, smooth and level as possible, except that a slight rounding of the bed is desirable that it may be well drained; do not plant when the ground is wet; cover each lot of seeds to a uniform depth which should not be more than four to six times the diameter of the seed; press the soil firmly over the seed; plant in rows so that the plantlets may be easily seen; thin to prevent crowding. If you will do this and will use Olds' seeds, you may confidently look forward to spring, summer, and autumn enriched by the beauty and fragrance of your own flowers.

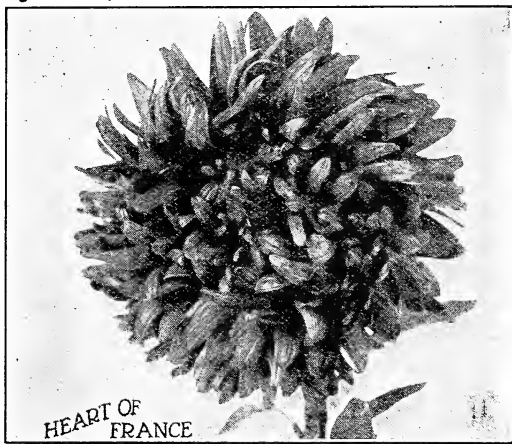

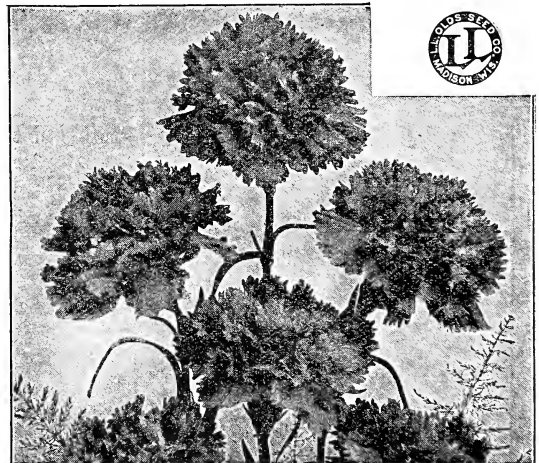

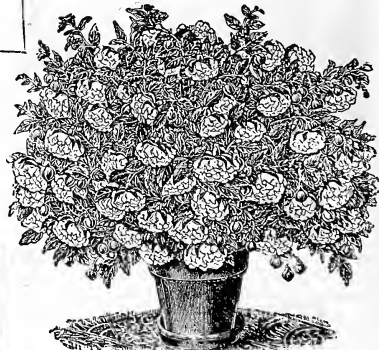

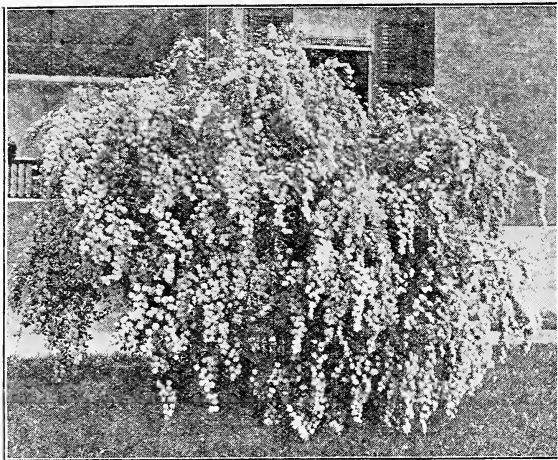
