Our many years of experience growing trees especially for the large Commercial Orchard Planters have proven that, without a doubt, the most sturdy trees, shrubs and vines in the world are produced in our mountainous section of Tennessee. The Tennessee grown nursery stock is tough, hardy and has a root system absolutely unequalled, that adapt themselves to any soil—clayey, sandy, stoney or muck. Just a word to the small home orchard planter,—If the large Commercial Orchard Planter can make a better orchard by planting a small sized tree; make it produce a better crop of fruit in less years than when a large sized tree is planted in the orchard, and this is an actual fact, then is not it reasonable that you, too, will have better success by planting the small sized trees? Of course, if you want the large trees it is more money to us and we will be glad to furnish that tree. However, our business has been builded on honest service and high quality trees furnished our customers: We say, you will have best success by using small sized trees in your orchard planting. The shock of transplanting is not so great, they grow off more rapidly, while a large tree the transplanting "shock" is serious and the tree is greatly stunted. Planting peach and plum tree use the 1 to 2 foot and 2 to 3 foot size, either size should bear you a fruit crop the third summer. Planting apple, pear and cherry, use the 2 to 3 or 3 to 4 foot sizes, one is as good as the other.

REMEMBER: Everything we send you, the transportation charges are prepaid by us to your town or mail box. That all trees, plants and shrubs are fresh dug from the field for all orders and that every item is strictly first class in every respect.

You can safely plant any time the ground is not frozen, we do not recommend fall planting earlier than November 1st, but from that date until frozen ground prevents in the north, and all winter in the south, you can plant. In spring you can usually plant until the forest trees are nearly in full leaf. FALL PLANTING has been so very successful with our customers that we have decided, this year, to agree to replace free of charge any tree bought of us and planted in the fall and which die from winter-killing or causes other than neglect by the planter. APPLES

FILLERS. Most commercial orchards are now planted with standard varieties, 40 feet apart each way. Quick upright growing, early maturing varieties are used as fillers, planting between standards to make 20 feet apart; fillers to be removed when the standard trees require the room (12 to 18 years). This requires 28 standard and 82 fillers to the acre. We recommend for Fillers:—Yellow Transparent, Duchesse of Oldenburg, Wealthy, Grimes Golden, McIntosh and Wagner.

Raspberries are one of the most delicious and popular fruits grown, are easily cultivated and require little care. Cut out old and weak roots each year. Plant in good soil in hills about 4 feet apart. With a little care and attention they will produce large crops of berries. In large plantings it is advisable to plant them thickly the same as hedge row.

CUMBERLAND—Ripens about mid-season. Fruit jet black, unusually large and handsome in appearance. Plants healthy, vigorous, hardy, and productive.

GRAPES

Even under unfavorable conditions the grape-vine will bear fruit, but good culture, pruning and spraying should be applied if the best quality of fruit is desired. Along almost any garden fence or walk there is room for vines enough to furnish luscious grapes from July to November. In vineyard rows, set the vines 6 feet apart, with 8 feet of space between the rows. Make the soil mellow, and plant the vines somewhat deeper than they stood in the nursery.

BLACK GRAPES

CONCORD. The well known standard variety, succeeds wherever grapes will grow.

MOORE. Bunch large, berry large round, with heavy bloom, vine exceedingly hardy. Its earliness makes it desirable everywhere.

WORDEN. A splendid grape of the Concord type; larger, better quality and earlier. Vine vigorous; hardy and productive.

RED AND AMBER GRAPES

AGAWAM. Berries very large, with thick skin; pulp soft sweet and sprightly; very vigorous, ripens early.

BRIGHTON. Bunch large, well formed; berries above medium to large; round; excellent flavor and quality; one of the earliest.

CACO. A new variety originating in Delaware, and its name is a combination of Catawba and Concord from which two standard sorts it was derived. The vines are strong and vigorous, as yet untouched by disease of any kind. The fruit is very large and handsome, complete bunches; in color a rich wine red over amber. Exceptionally early bearing, usually showing several good-sized bunches the second year. Its flavor is luscious, sweet, delightful and distinct.

CATAWBA. Berries large, round; when fully ripe of a dark copper color, with sweet, rich musky flavor; late.

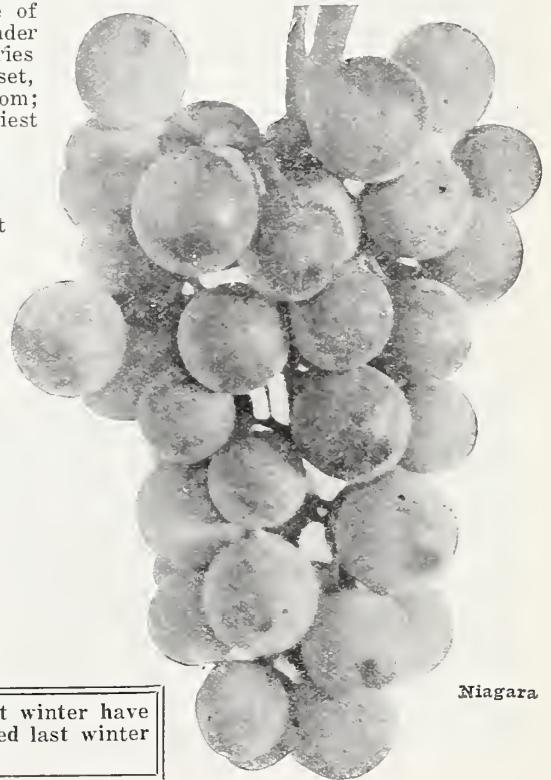

California Privet is able to stand a temperature of zero without any damage. Ten or fifteen degrees below zero do not damage it much, but 20 to 30 below will kill the wood to the ground. This is not so serious as it might be, because the roots throw up a strong growth by the next June or July.

Privet produces wood faster than any other shrub or tree. For a hedge that is thick right down to the ground, you must set the plants close together, anywhere from 6 to 18 inches apart. It is sometimes best to set in a double row, the plants "staggered," a foot apart in each line. Some people use even a tripple row. The lines should be about 8 inches apart. This is the way to make the finest hedges, especially when you want them a couple of feet wide and over 3 feet high. A single row of plants will make a beautiful hedge.

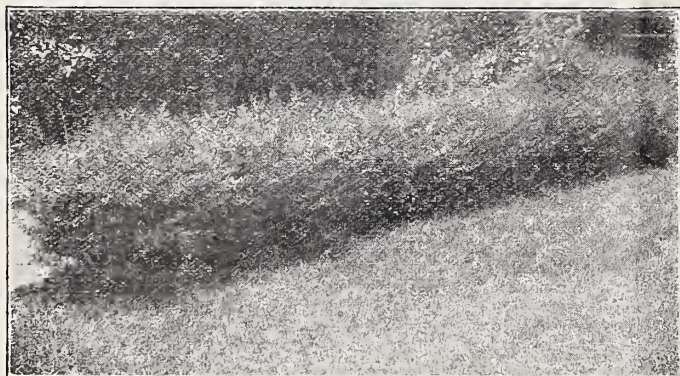

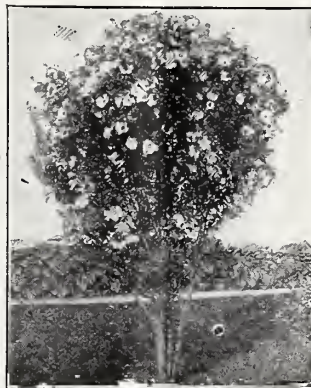

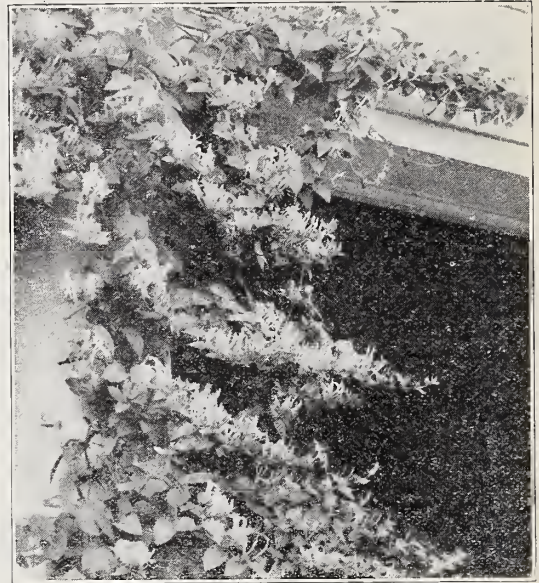
