\section*{"FOR VARIETY IN MAKE-UP"}

\section*{Hardy Perennials for Small-town Florists.}

I started in business as a small-town florist; I was outside of the city, doing a purely local business, and I tried to use my own resources 100 per cent. Today I am in Kansas City, and, although I am but a few blocks from the actual center of the city, and while we now have five up-to-date wholesale florists, I am still using, to a large extent, what I learned then to "get by" with.

I want to make my talk to the small-town florist who cannot slip down town in a few minutes and get what he wants. My appeal is to the man who has an acre or two and a few days or weeks at this time of the year without taking in a dollar and then without a minute's notice is up against a funeral calling for flowers that may run up to a few hundred dollars, and he is expected to be ready to meet such an emergency. If he is a resourceful man he has been working with his customers on the idea of "leave it to him to make the selection," just getting at the price they want to pay and the card. Then, if he is a man of taste with a good idea of combining flowers and colors, and has a good, well stocked garden plot, he can "ride high."

Perennial gypsophila is so much used now, fresh or dry, that I don't need to describe it, but with a bunch of gypsophila, that can be grown in his garden, some gladioli of different colors, some buddleia, or Summer lilac; lathyrus, or hardy sweet peas; helianthus, or double hardy sunflowers; some dahlias, some lavender or white stokesias, tamarix, tuberoses and some rubrum lilies, he is fixed to meet anything.

\section*{THEIR POSSIBILITIES}

What can be done with perennial and garden flowers? You can make anything that can be made with any other flowers. I can remember many pretty things made entirely of garden flowers; for instance, a large wreath, about three-fourths of it of dark purple delphinium, finished with a large cluster of candidum lilies, another of English ivy leaves with a garland of asters. Only recently we made a neighborhood piece about six feet high of gladioli on an easel; for appearance it would have been hard to equal with greenhouse-grown flowers, right today and every day, we are putting up beautiful and artistic spray bouquets, panels and wreaths, that I am sure would please the most critical; and we do not use a single rose or carnation.

I could give more plants that could be grown for this purpose, but I have cut down the list to those more common, most useful, easily grown and best adapted to the florist's use. Here they are:

\section*{GIVE CONTINUOUS SUPPLY}

No doubt I have left out some other good things, but I have tried to give you something that you could cut from all the time or in succession of crops. Some of them bloom only for a few weeks, but one or more of the others takes its place. Some by themselves do not cut much figure, but if you want a dozen sprays and have only gladioli on hand, say, with perennial flowers with your gladioli you can make change upon change. For instance, buddleia; you can use it by itself, but you surely can use it better in combination with other flowers, with white gladioli, or the tuberoses; or try gladioli and buddleia. Everyone ought to grow buddleia. It is in the rose class with me.

If you will grow a good, strong row of Tamarix hispida (shrub), you can snap your fingers at the cut ferns during the Summer, when it is so hard to get ferns and to keep them; its bluish green foliage is a wonderful help to your flowers in sprays or otherwise. I prefer it to asparagus for the foliage, and the flowers do help.

I have used it with lilies, late gladioli and early mums, and it is a jewel.

I have not said anything about growing plants such as gladioli, asters, dahlias and so on, as I suppose everyone is growing and knows about them. Some of the things I have mentioned work wonderfully well with those and help to make different combinations, so that you do not get tired of the sameness. One thing I should like to call your attention to is ismene calathina, sometimes called Peruvian daffodil. It is also called the white amaryllis, which we call them. This is a bulb that you plant in the Spring in about three plantings, commencing as soon as the soil is warm, and ending about June 15 to 20 . We are just cutting the last, and they work up as well as Easter lilies and are no trouble whatever to grow, and your bulbs increase in size and number.
Always remember that it pays every evening to go out and cut a lot of these flowers and put them deep in fresh, cold water; a cave or cool cellar is almost all they need, and if you do not use them one day, throw out those that do not look good and get more. If you do this, you will always have the stock ready to use and in the right condition to use. Your customers will not be kicking because they get a lot of wilted flowers, and gradually will get to like and use more and more of these, and you will pile up more and more dollars for your Uncle Sam to collect income tax from. But, incidentally, you get away from that awful thought, "Where are the flowers coming from to fill that order?"

\section*{PERENNIAL}

\section*{Delphiniums or Hardy Larkspur}

Almost indispensable both for forcing and outdoor planting. Belladonna and Bellamosa are the desirable sorts for forcing.

Delphinium are being forced in larger numbers each season. The plants should have a good freezing before being forced, so should not be lifted until there has been considerable frost.

About the middle of January or the first part of February, start the plants in the greanhouse at a low temperature. If you start them earlier than the middle of January, some may be lost by damping off. After the middle of February, give the plants enough heat to make a night temperature of 40 to 42 degrees; increase this to 50 degrees as the plants grow.

Do not attempt hard forcing of Delphiniums, and when they are flowering air them freely. Do not have too much manure in your soil; it would be better to have the soil a little poor and later add a top-dressing of old manure. In forcing Delphiniums, temperature, watering, ventilation and time of starting are of great importance. In the early stages it will be safer to run the plants a little dry than the reverse.

By FRITZ BAHR, the Noted Horticultural Writer.
If you conduct a retail grower's establishment in a suburban or country town, could you fill an order calling for six sorts of Peony roots, named varieties, field grown stock from your own grounds? If you can do this you are an exception to the rule. the great majority of florists couldn't do it; they do not realize as yet that they are missing a good chance. They don't appreciate the fact that many hundreds of thousands of Peony roots are disposed of at retail during the year at prices ranging, even for ordinary sorts, from 75 c up to \(\$ 2.00\) or \(\$ 3.00\) each, according to size. As many more could easily be sold, and that number again doubled in time, if every country florist would just push a little. Don't depend upon the flowers you cut from your plants to bring returns; make money by selling the roots. Everybodv likes Pconies; everybody with a little space for a flower border can plant them. The fact that they hardly ever die out when once planted makes them attractive, but there are greater chances than ever to sell Peonies. I am not a Peony specialist; we grow only a few thousand plants and wouldn't know how to go about it to make them pay as does the specialist who sells three to five eye roots so reaa few named sorts on hand and make them pay well.

\section*{Narcissus Bulbs In America}

When the Department of Agriculture gave out information that the importation of Narcissus Bulbs from Europe would be prohibited, we immediately made extensive experiments in various parts of America with the object of producing bulbs that would compare favorably with those imported from Europe.

After several years of experimenting in the growing of the bulbs in various sections, we found that bulbs produced in the northeastern part of Texas brought about as good results as those imported from Europe. latter part of August to cure sufficiently to plant early in September, to bring in bloom the latter part of De cember and early January, this making them two to three weeks earlier than the bulbs imported from Holland, which is a decided advantage over Holland bulbs. These are facts brought out from careful experiments made for us by large bulb growers.

It might be of interest to our customers to learn that the Narcissus Von Sion and many of the Poeticus types, are still imported by Hollanders, from the wild fields, and brought to Holland for one or two years culture, and then exported to America. Many of the finest varieties of Narcissus were originated in England and not in Holland. The variety King Alfred is one of them, and the reason this has not been done in America, is because we have had no occasion and necessary reaso: to try. We have demonstrated on our plantation of ino acres devoted exclusively to Narcissus, that from a large side shoot similar to the size planted in Holland, we are able in one year's growth to make a double nose bulb, and a larger percentage than the Holland growers were able to do.

After experimenting for three years, we invited several Holland growers who have a wide reputation in Holland for the production of Narcissus Bulbs and who know the culture thoroughly, to inspect our experiments. Their interest was aroused to the extent that they immediately wanted to invest with us, to enable them to get their supply for their American customers. Feeling that a proposition of this nature can be broadened out to a large extent, we accepted the Holland growers' assistance and investment of \(\$ 50,000.00\), in the growing of Narcissus here in America. Samples of our bulbs were shipped to Holland for comparison with the same size bulbs which were planted in Holland at the same time the bulbs were planted in America. Our American bulbs equalled in quality and size the Holland grown.

We might add that before the Holland growers invested with us, they toured all America, from Maine to California, and came back more enthusiastic, saying that our selection of locality was the best suited for the culture of Narcissus, and they further said that they feel it will equal or surpass the Holland grown bulbs.

\section*{Dangers Removed}

The biggest danger in shipping Narcissus from Europe is the heating in transit. This is removed by securing a supply of American grown bulbs. No boats are necessary to transport our bulbs to our customers. Our deliveries will be made from Chicago and New York, and we shall secure iced refrigerator cars, which will keep the bulbs in perfectly good condition, ready for immediate planting if so desired on arrival.

The varieties we have planted extensively are Golden Spur, Emperor, Victoria, Von Sion, Sir Watkin, King Alfred and Laurens Koster. To give you an idea as to the volume of our plantings, we beg to advise that in the variety Golden Spur alone, we can supply to the number of \(2,000,000\) bulbs, and in Emperor and Victoria, about \(1,000,000\) in each.

It might be of interest to you to know that the reason of our selection of this locality is due to the fact that we have discovered many years ago that Narcissus naturalized can be found there in quantity, un-
cultivated on lawns and in fields, and they thrived well from year to year. In the early Springtime you can see them there by the millions. We are not able to say how they originated, but we do know that the Narcissus are very happy in this locality.

Our experience as herewith outlined is evidence that we have sufficient quantity of Narcissus bulbs in the commercial leading varieties, to take care of our customers' needs.
We recommend ordering your supply immediately as we expect heavy calls for the limited bulbs that we will have to offer, inasmuch as we shall reserve a large portion of them for further propagation.
