FOR the year 1926 I have made some changes in prices, and have added several varieties which I have thoroughly tested, and can recommend.

Among all of the thousands of varieties, I have yet to find a scarlet which can compare with "COWEE'S SCARLET WONDER," and to those who have not grown it, I would say, if you give me a trial order this year, and you are not perfectly satisfied that you have received full value, you may return the bulbs at harvest time, with their increase, and I will gladly refund the price you paid. I shall be grateful also, if I am advised of any error which might be made by us, so that the same may be rectified. The careful selection of seed is one of the principal causes for increased production as well as perfection in quality, size and general improvement. This principle I proved several years ago in the selection of Golden Bantam Sweet Corn, which many of my customers remember.

I have been making further tests, especially on the lines of earliness, and now offer a yellow corn fully as sweet as the best Golden Bantam, bearing larger ears, ten, twelve, fourteen and sixteen rows of kernels, instead of eight as is usually the case with the latter. This corn is ready for use from a week to ten days earlier than Golden Bantam. Every ear is examined, from which butts and tips are removed, ensuring a much higher percentage of germination.

My mailing-size bulbs are much larger than those sent out by most growers but still larger bulbs can be sent by express, and I advise having shipments made in this way wherever possible.
