To Our Friends and Patrons:

With the advent of another planting season we present for your perusal our Annual Catalog for 1926, it being the thirty-fourth edition of same. It offers the very best the world affords in flowering and ornamental plants for your home and garden. Only the most meritorious of each family of plants are grown.

THANK YOU—We take this means to thank the many patrons who favored us with their orders during the past season, and trust that the plants we supplied came fully up to expectations.

OREGON GROWN PLANTS—We have prepared for this season's trade the usual large and fine stock of Oregon-grown plants, such as we have been sending our customers for years. The fact that we send out such fine, large healthy plants, which always reach their destination in a perfectly fresh condition, no doubt accounts for their popularity with flower-loving people in every nook and corner of the Pacific Northwest. As it is scarcely a day's journey to any point on a railway line, it is obviously certain that it is a great advantage to buy from us in preference to sending to an Eastern florist and having to wait ten days or more before receiving the plants, and then only in a wilted and spoiled condition.

OUR PRICES—While it is true that we are not seeking a reputation for cheapness, we know that our prices are as low as good plants can be sold for and that no firm in our line of business is supplying stock equal to ours for less money.

METHOD OF SHIPMENT—As a rule small orders can be sent more economically by parcel post while orders for amounts over four dollars will go by express to better advantage. Two-year-old roses, shrubs and vines being quite heavy and bulky are usually sent by express at expense of purchaser.

PARCEL POST SHIPMENTS—Orders for small plants of all kinds will be sent by parcel post when requested by purchaser. Also small orders of larger plants when such is possible. It is quite obvious that our proximity to all points in Oregon, Washington and Idaho is a distinct advantage to us and our customers under the parcel post zone rates.

Many of the larger and higher priced plants are too bulky to send by parcel post. We reserve the right to send orders containing such by express at the expense of purchaser.

EXPRESS SHIPMENTS—We prefer this method of shipment in the case of orders for field-grown roses, shrubs, and roots, when such orders amount to \$4.00 and over. By this means we are also able to leave more earth on pot grown plants resulting in less disturbance of roots and therefore more satisfactory growth when replanted. When shipped by express the customer pays the transportation charges but because of the short distances to all points in the Pacific Northwest and a recent reduction in express rates the cost is very reasonable.

CANADIAN ORDERS—Only seeds, bulbs and greenhouse grown plants can be sent by parcel post to Canada. Any other plants must go by express. Every Canadian order must be accompanied with an additional remittance of 25 cents on each dollar's worth of bulbs and plants ordered, if ordered sent by parcel post.

MISTAKES—We use great care in filling and packing orders but nevertheless mistakes may occur. Should any happen with your order kindly advise us at once and it will be rectified.

TERMS STRICTLY CASH—Every article in our catalogue is priced, therefore purchasers must know their cost when making our their order. The prices are fixed on a cash basis and as our customers for the most part are unknown to us and as we do not have a system of bookkeeping, our terms are strictly cash with the order.

OUR GUARANTEE—We guarantee all seeds, bulbs and plants true to name to the extent that we will replace any which may through error prove otherwise. We likewise guarantee safe delivery of all seeds, bulbs and plants.

COMPLAINTS—If any, must be made upon receipt of the goods, otherwise they cannot be considered.

REMITTANCES—Send money by bank draft, postoffice or express money-order. Personal checks on local banks only accepted when 10 cents is added for exchange. Postage stamps will be accepted for small amounts.

SMALL ORDERS—No plant orders filled for less amount than 50 cents.

OUR NURSERIES—Are situated at Clarke's Station on the Mount Scott car line. Visitors welcome during business hours.

Early in our business career we learned that roses grown in and around Portland were a very superior article to any which could be shipped in from elsewhere. For that reason we offer with few exceptions only

OREGON GROWN ROSES

Our Two-Year-Old Roses. These roses have all been grown in the open ground and are what is known as nursery grown. To insure satisfactory growth these roses are budded low on one of three wild varieties which we propagate for the purpose. Many of the most beautiful varieties are weak growers naturally, but by budding on wild stock these same sorts become stronger and faster growers and are certain to be satisfactory. Our field-grown roses are large, well branched bushes, each having several stout canes from 18 to 36 inches in length, depending upon the variety. Equally as important is the fine root system of our roses. Grown on fine loamy soil without irrigation our roses have an abundance of fibrous roots which are lacking in the case of roses grown on unsuitable land. In fact we think our stock is the very best that can be produced. All our two-year-old roses will bloom profusely the first season after planting.

These roses are in a dormant state from November to April and should be planted before growth commences, hence it is imperative that orders be received as early as possible after receipt of this catalogue. These roses should be shipped by express, although since the new Parcel Post Law went into effect it is possible to send them by mail.

Our Young Rose Plants. Those offered this season are fine, healthy plants, propagated last summer and now in three-inch pots. They have been grown cool and will, upon being planted, immediately start into vigorous growth and blossom profusely with first season, except a few of the Climbing and Hybrid Perpetual varieties, which generally do not bloom much until the second season. Being greenhouse grown these roses cannot be planted out until spring has opened up, hence early ordering is not advisable. The young roses are offered to supply a demand from planters who do not care to purchase higher priced stock, such as we offer in our two-year-old roses. We send these roses by parcel post when requested to do so.

HOW TO GROW ROSES

Location of Beds. Roses should be planted where they will be open to sunlight for at least half of each day. In locating beds, avoid trees, shrubbery and shady sides of buildings and fences. This will lessen the danger from insects and diseases.

Soil. Any good garden soil, which will grow good vegetables, will grow, with proper fertilization, fine Roses. The ideal soil is a clay loam of sufficient porosity to permit of ready drainage.

Preparation of Beds. The beds should not be so large that the Roses cannot be reached without treading among them. Long, narrow beds, with one continuous row of plants, are preferable. Spade the soil to a good depth, mixing in well-rotted stable manure as you do so. Cow manure is considered the best, though well-rotted horse manure will do. Bone meal is also excellent.

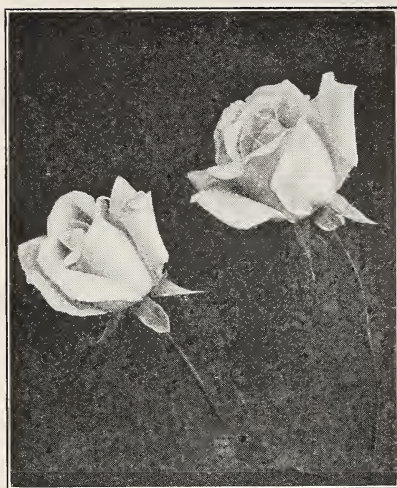
Planting. Most varieties should be planted about 2½ feet apart, when the soil is in a nice, mellow condition. Spread the roots out well and press the soil down firmly. Plant deeper than previously grown and give a good watering if soil is at all dry. If weather remains dry continue watering until bushes show signs of starting into new growth.

Watering. Most people water their Roses too much. Once a week is often enough, and that early in the morning. Keep the soil mulched or cultivated around the bushes to prevent baking.

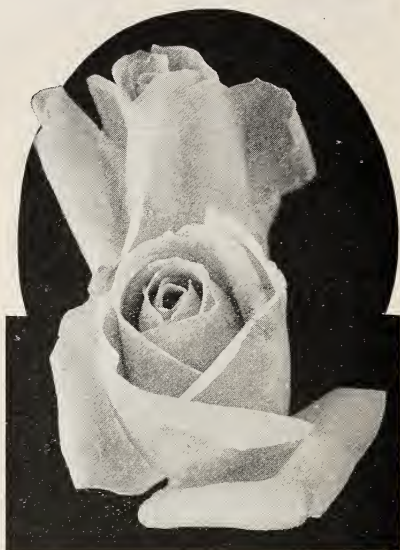
Mulching and Protection. Only the tenderest varieties need any protection in this country. This can best be supplied by mulching the soil around the plants with a heavy application of manure, which should be spaded in the following Spring.

Pruning. Field-grown dormant Roses should be cut back severely when first set out. Subsequent prunings should be attended to in late Winter and early Spring, when all dead and weak growth should be removed entirely and the strong, live canes shortened back to one or two feet in length, according to the growth of the previous season. It may be accepted as a general rule that weak growth should be pruned severely and strong growth sparingly. Climbing Roses should not be cut back any more than is necessary to keep the plant in a shapely appearance.

Best Time for Planting. No question is asked more frequently than, "When is the best time to plant Roses?" Our dormant field-grown Roses can be planted any time that the soil can be worked, between October and April. Probably the best month is March. Most people plant in that month, and with best results. Our small greenhouse-grown Roses should not be planted until a month later, when the soil has warmed up with the increasing strength of the sun's rays.

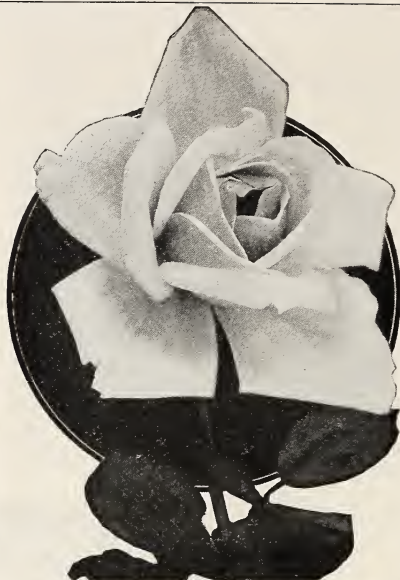

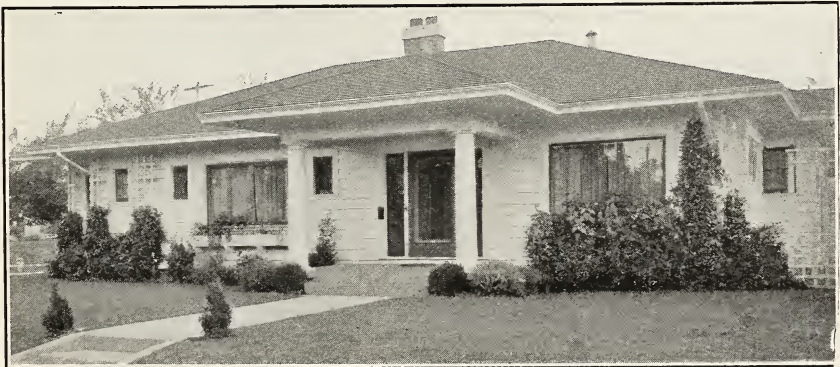

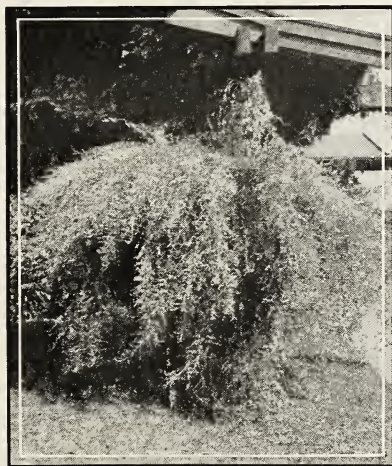
