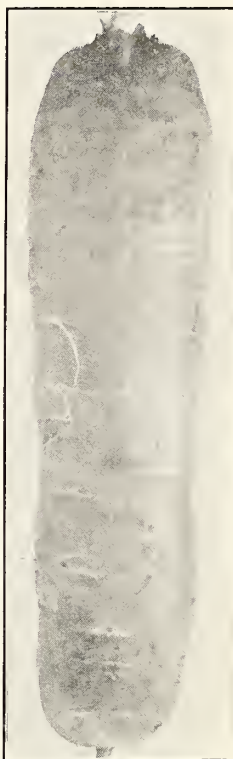

ARTICHOKE

One package will make 100 plants; one ounce will sow 100 feet; 5 pounds to the acre

A perennial producing flower buds which are used for food the second year after sowing the seed. Requires winter protection in the North. Sow seeds early in the spring. If sown in hotbeds in February can be grown to bud in the first year.

Large Green Globe, The standard variety. Large package, 10c, oz. 80c, ¼ lb. \$1.90.

ASPARAGUS

While nearly everyone is fond of asparagus and would like it fresh from their own garden many think it hard to grow and that it requires a lot of space and do not try it. This is not true for you can grow mighty good asparagus with but little trouble. If you sow the seed you can cut the third year, from roots the second year after planting. A bed of asparagus will yield for 20 years or more.

Seed Growing. Soak the seed in warm water for 24 hours, then sow an inch deep in rows a foot apart. The following spring set the best of the plants in the permanent bed.

Plant Growing. Dig a trench 18 in. deep and a foot wide and put in 4 inches of rotted manure packed down firmly. Put 5 in. of good rich soil on top of this and lay the plants in 2 ft. apart, spreading the roots and keeping the crown upright. Cover with soil to within 4 in. of the surface and as the plants grow cover gradually. The rows should be about 3 ft. apart.

Pedigreed Washington Asparagus. This new variety is the very finest for the home garden or to grow for market. It is the result of 15 years of breeding by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. At last we have not only a rust proof variety but an asparagus that is very fast growing, exceedingly tender, of excellent flavor and that produces heavy stalks 1" to 2" in diameter. It is the finest kind you can grow for your table, away ahead of all other varieties.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS

One package will make 200 plants; one ounce will sow 200 feet and produce 3,000 plants

The small heads, resembling cabbage, are formed along the stalk. Prepare like cabbage or in cream, like cauliflower. Sow seed in spring; transplant and cultivate same as cabbage, except leaves should be broken down in fall, giving heads more room to grow.

Paris Market. Half dwarf; very fine, good-sized heads. Package 10c, ounce 50c.

CHICORY

One ounce to 100 feet of drill

Witloof or French Endive. (See cut). Sow seed in spring in open ground, ½ in. deep, in rows 18 inches apart; thin to 6 inches apart. Allow plants to grow until November. Take up roots and trim off leaves to about 1½ inches from the neck. Plant roots in trench 1½ inches apart and cover with 8 inches of fine soil. Here they produce an abundance of blanched leaves which make a splendid winter salad or can be cooked as greens. Pkg. 10c, ½ oz. 25c, oz. 40c, ¼ lb. \$1.20.

Large-Rooted or Long Magdeburg. Extra large, long roots. The young leaves make an excellent salad, while the dried roots may be used as a substitute for coffee. Pkg. 10c, oz. 40c, ¼ lb. \$1.20.

CORN SALAD

One ounce will sow 50 feet

A small, quick-growing salad plant for late fall, winter and spring. A substitute for lettuce and spinach. Sow in early spring for fall; in August for spring use. Mulch during winter. Pkg. 10c, oz. 20c.

DANDELION

One package will sow 10 feet of row

Sow seed in good loam, drills 1 foot apart; thin or transplant to 12 inches apart in rows.

BORECOLE or KALE

Used principally for greens and for garnishing. Hardier than cabbage and is improved by frost. Sow seed from May to June, and cultivate same as cabbage. For early spring use sow in September and protect during winter.

Dwarf Green Curled. Leaves yellowish green, compact, and finely curled. Pkg. 10c, oz. 25c, ¼ lb. 85c.

CRESS

Fine Curled or Pepper Grass. Sow thickly every two weeks to have fresh plants, in rows 1 foot apart. Makes a very tasty salad. Pkg. 10c, oz. 25c, ¼ lb. 85c.

True Water Cress. This popular salad plant will grow on upland and reseed and multiply wherever the roots and stems are constantly under water. Sow seed broadcast. Pkg. 10c, ½ oz. 40c, oz. 75c.

FLORENCE FENNEL

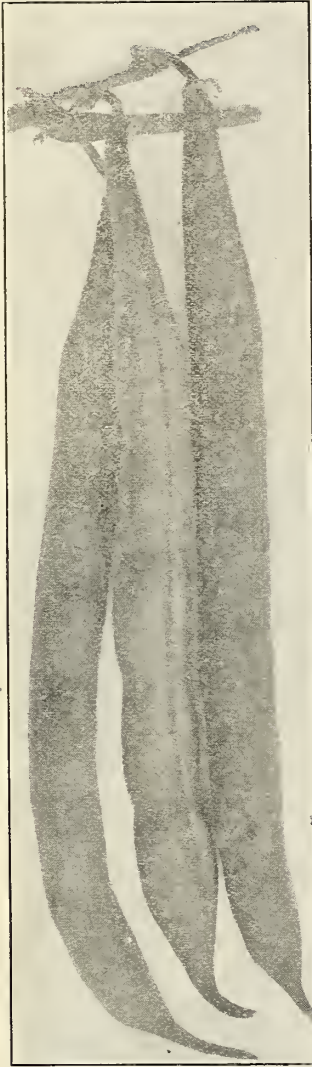
This variety of Fennel produces a bulb at the surface of the ground which makes an excellent vegetable used very largely in Italy and by the Italians here. Sow the seed in rows 20 in. apart and thin plants to stand 10 in. apart in the row. When plants are half grown, blanch by drawing the earth up around them. Pkg. 10c, oz. 20c, ¼ lb. 60c.

GARDEN BEANS

A very popular and worthy home-garden vegetable which gives quick results after planting—Beans on the table in six weeks. Sow in spring and early summer, in warm soil, in rows 2 feet apart, seed few inches apart in row, or in hills, 6 to 8 inches apart, 3 or 4 beans to a hill. Cultivate often. Inoculate your seed beans with Farmogerin. It will increase the yield and help make your bean crop a success. One package of Wax or Green Pod Beans will plant 15 ft. of row; one pound 150 ft.

Webber Wax. For a very early bean of good quality this is a very good kind to grow. The pods are long and flat and of a creamy yellow color that makes them very attractive. Market gardeners grow this bean to have them on the market early.

Stringless Refugee Wax. We believe this kind is equal to any other wax bush bean in quality. You can have long, thick, round, light yellow beans that are absolutely stringless, fresh from your garden, for a long season.

GARDEN BEETS

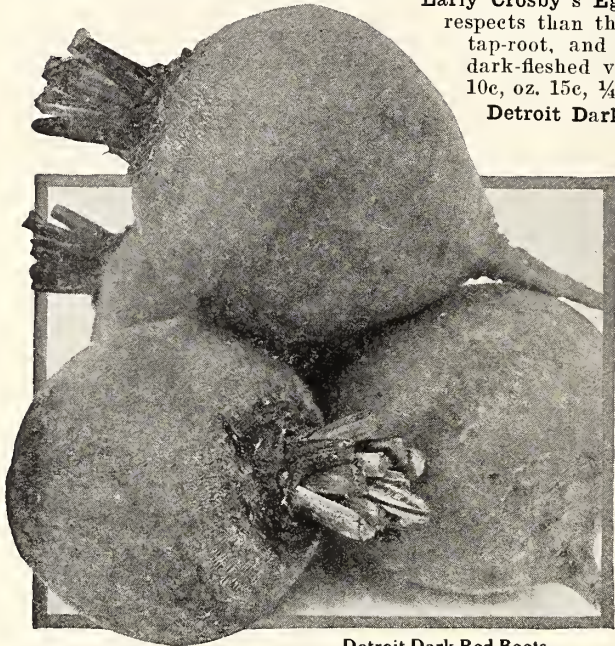
One package will sow 15 ft. of row, 1 oz. 50 ft., 5 to 6 lbs. to the acre

The best results are obtained on a deep, rich sandy loam. Sow seed 1 inch deep, in drills 16 inches apart, as early as possible. If wanted very early, sow Detroit Dark Red and Crosby's Egyptian in hotbeds and transplant to open ground. Thin to stand 3 or 4 inches apart. Cultivate cleanly and thoroughly. For succession, sow at intervals until middle of July.

Early Crosby's Egyptian. Our special strain of this popular variety is better in many respects than the old one. Globular in shape, perfectly smooth, has a short top, small tap-root, and both skin and flesh are dark in color. Much earlier than all other dark-fleshed varieties. The very best early Beet for home or market garden. Pkg. 10c, oz. 15c, ¼ lb. 40c, lb. \$1.40.

Detroit Dark Red. The most popular and best canning Beet grown. As a second-early variety, we recommend it for the home and market garden. BROCCOLI

A vegetable very similar to Cauliflower but less delicate in flavor. Hardy, thrives best in cool weather and should be hoed and watered frequently. Broccoli is used in northern climates where Cauliflower does not do well. Sow the seed inside or in coldframes in January or February and set out plants when ground is warm. Cultivate the same as Cauliflower.

Then they sow the "early" kinds in mid and late summer. These mature quickly and supply the table with fresh vegetables in the early and late fall. It pays to keep your garden working all season.

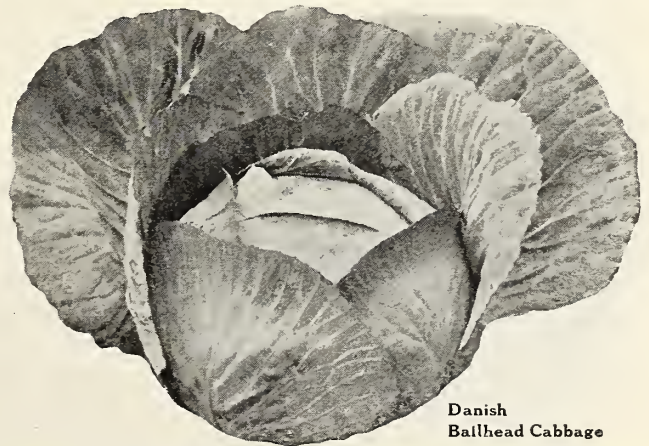

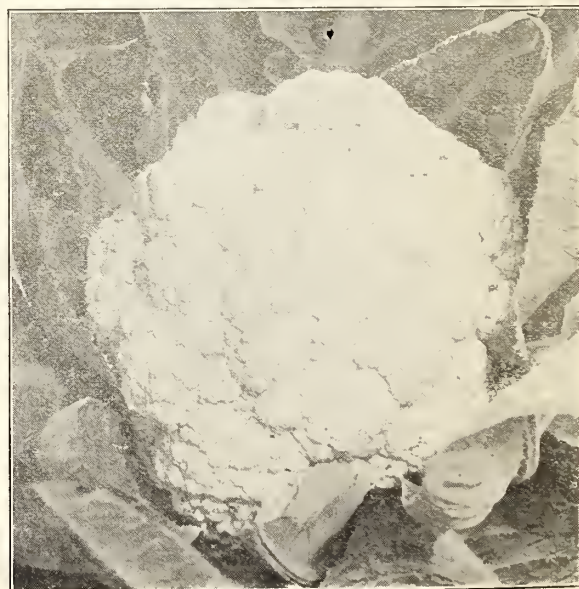

Celery seed is very slow in germinating and should be sown in March in flats under glass and kept moist. When plants are 2 inches high, thin out and transplant to stand 3 inches apart each way. When 5 inches high, set out, 6 inches apart, in trenches 6 inches deep. Cut off outer leaves and press soil firmly about roots. Cultivate thoroughly. When full grown, blanch by mounding gradually with earth or by pressing stems together by boards on both sides or row. For winter storage, take up the plants with roots and place upright on wet soil in a dark cellar or root-house, packing closely. 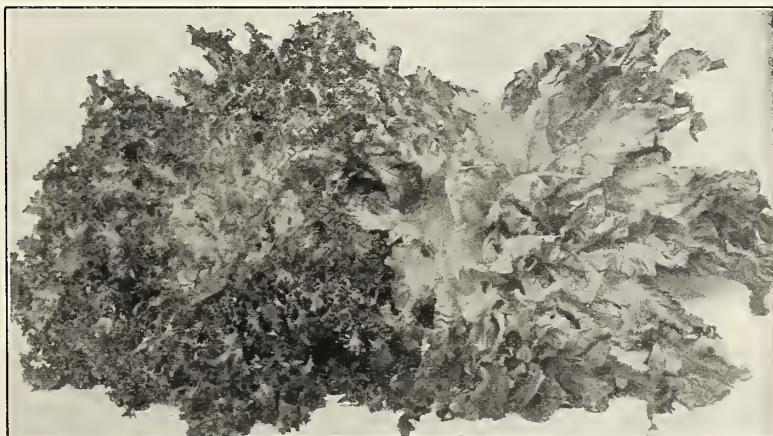

HART & VICK'S LETTUCE

For extra-early plants, sow seed in February or March in hot-beds; transplant to open ground in April. Lettuce, to be at its best, should grow rapidly. Soil should be made as rich as possible by fertilizing and thorough preparation. For main garden crop, sow seed outdoors in a warm spot in the garden, as early in spring as possible, in rows 18 inches apart. The way to raise good heads of lettuce is to thin them out when they are an inch high so they will stand 8 inches apart in the row. Fresh lettuce can be had all season by sowing at intervals of two weeks. One package will sow 35 feet, an ounce about 200 feet.

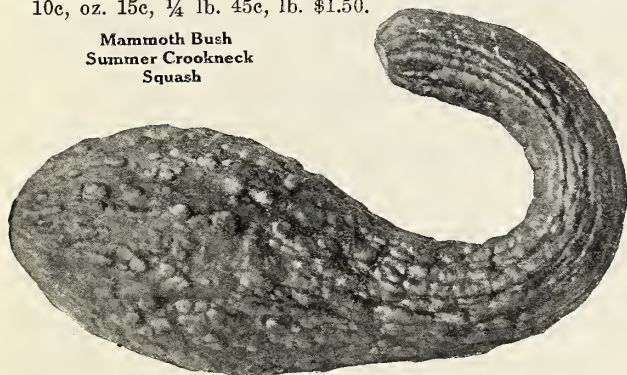

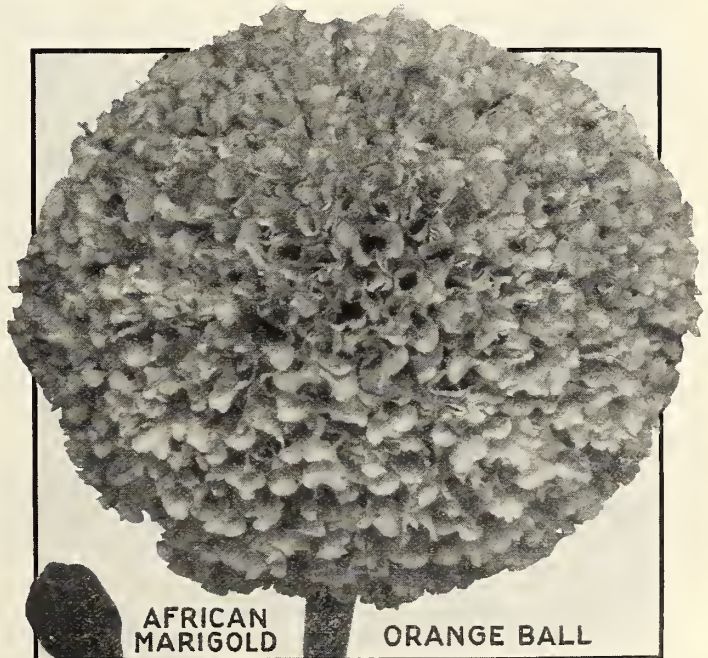

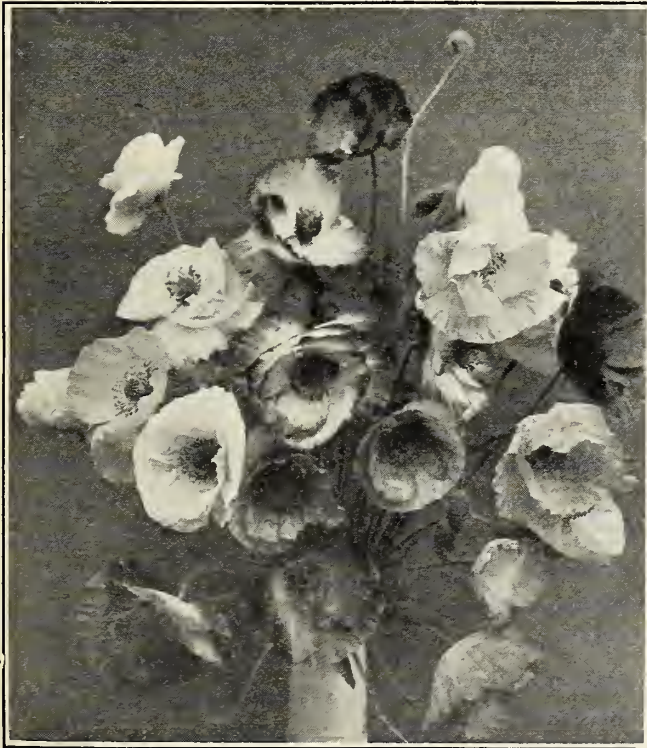
