

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FOREWORD

Classification of Dahlias

- **DECORATIVE DAHLIAS** are double flowers, and full to the center, with broad and loosely formed petals having round, or pointed tips, sometimes rolled, or curved back.
- **CACTUS DAHLIA.** The English cactus have long, narrow, pointed petals like a chrysanthemum. Petals usually incurved, or twisted. American cactus is a new type. The petals are coarser than the English cactus, but not enough to form a hybrid.
- **HYBRID CACTUS.** Flowers fully double; floral rays short as compared with previous type, broad, flat, recurved or twisted, not sharply pointed except when tips are divided (serrated). Margins only slightly revolute, and tubes of outer florets, if any, less than half the length of the ray.
- **PEONY DAHLIA.** A semi-double flower with from two to five rows of broad petals, sometimes twisted and curled. Always shows a yellow center, which, in some varieties, is surrounded by small, curled and twisted florets.
- **SHOW DAHLIAS.** Double flowers, globular or ball-shaped rather than broad or flat, and full to the center. Floral rays more or less quilled and with rounded tips.

The **Hybrid Shows** are much larger than the previous type. They are not so tightly quilled, having looser petals and are not so set in form as the Show type.

POM PON DAHLIAS are diminutive Show dahlias. They are very small compact flowers made up of tiny quilled petals. They do not require disbudding, and are very floriferous. Usually not over two inches in diameter. Splendid for interior decorations.

The initials following the title of each Dahlia denotes the classification in which it belongs:

D.—Decorative; S.—Show; H. S.—Hybrid Show; C.—Cactus; E. C.—English Cactus; A. C.—American Cactus; H. C.—Hybrid Cactus; P.—Peony.

* Dahlias marked with a star are of California origin.

All who visit our garden do not know the class that all Dahlias come under, so we have prepared an alphabetical list for their convenience. In this manner anybody can find the name of any Dahlia as they inspect them while growing, and at the same time by use of the initials following the name, will learn the class, with the one effort. We trust this will prove a convenience to all.

Location of Garden

Our garden is located 16 miles east of Santa Maria, Calif. Motorists will turn east one mile south of the center of town—from the flag pole—two service stations are on that corner. Turn left and drive east, following the road through Garey and Sisquoc. At Sisquoc make a direct turn left (east) and follow the auto signs up the valley until you come to our Dahlia Garden sign—just three miles east of the Sisquoc Postoffice and General Store.

Motorists from the south may turn off to the right two miles south of Los Alamos, and be guided by the auto signs. When you come into the Sisquoc, or upper Santa Maria Valley, turn west and proceed about one mile to the Garden. By paying attention to the auto signs it is impossible to go wrong. From this turn-off, two miles south of Los Alamos, the distance is 14 miles to the Garden, a great saving of mileage and time. There is an auto sign at this turn off, directing just where you should leave the State Highway to make this Sisquoc short cut. The drive to our Garden can be made going either north or south, without having to return to the point where you leave the Highway.

TERMS: Cash with Order. We select field grown tubers with eye sufficiently developed to insure growing. No mother tubers sent out. We guarantee all tubers true to name. We never substitute, and will return your money if we cannot fill your order as requested. All retail orders sent post paid. Cultural instructions enclosed with each order.

By ordering early you have the advantage of our full stock from which to make your selections. Orders are filled in rotation in the order received.

We begin shipping about April 1st, unless requested to ship earlier. Planting should begin about the first of May, after the danger of frost is past, and the ground is warm enough for the tubers to immediately start throwing out a root system, which they will not do when the ground is cold. At least, this is our custom along the Coast. In the interior—should there be no danger of frost—Dahlias could be planted earlier than the first of May. We consider it safe to plant Dahlias when the farmers plant their beans.

We grow many varieties in not sufficient quantities to catalog. Write us, should you desire a variety we do not list.
