## CARNATIONS

Carnation plants should be re-potted whenever there is indication of their becoming pot-bound. Trans-planted into the garden after all danger of frost is over, and given at least 12 inches of space, with good soil and cultivation, these plants should furnish abuudant bloom from July until late Fall or may be kept "pinched back" to retard bloom, potted up at approath of frost and brought inside for winter blooming.
