We have always contended that the man who by intelligent advice enables his customers to make a proper selection of shrubbery will soon find that there is a certain bond between himself, his customers and his house that will tend to make boosters, not only for his stock but also for him.

Hardy Flowering Shrubs develop very quickly, and are therefore indispensable where it is desirable to make an immediate showing. Whether it is a seasonable or all-year-round effect that is desired, it can be obtained by a judicious planting of shrubs. A good shrub collection will present the greatest variety of color throughout the season, both in flower and foliage.

Shrubs are used for grouping around the foundations of the house in order to take off the sharpness from the corners and connect the landscape with the architecture. The home seems to nestle cosily in a nest of green instead of springing up suddenly from the lawn like a "Jack-in-the-Box."

For filling in the angles of a house and the corners between its steps and sidewalks, for extending architectural lines that end too abruptly, for helping to conceal faulty design, for softening hard, uncomprising masonry, such as high retaining wall and buttresses, for giving color to the winter landscape, for making entrances inviting, for taking the curse
off wire fences and red brick walls and for framing in the landscape by planting along the bordersthat is what shrubs are used for.

By having a ready reference to the list given in this book, salesmen are enabled to sell their customers "the right shrub for the right place" and in turn create greater satisfaction-that all important element-in working $u p$ and maintaining a permanent trade.

## Extra Heavy Clumps

This class of plants contains all the "old fashioned" flowers which for centuries have been the delight of our forefathers, and are with us today, probably the most popular group in the plant world.

As the name implies, Perennials die down to or near the ground in the autumn, only to come forth with renewed vigor the following Spring.

Of the many ways in which the cultivation of flowers is undertaken, none is so popular as the "mixed" or "Hardy" border. They may be planted in front of shrubbery belts, in the kitchen yard, alongside of walks and against walls and buildings.

Semi-formal and formal gardens are also using the perennials to produce harmony of color, charm of effect, and above all, seclusion and restful quiet; for the growing of flowers is indeed the simplest, yet most satisfying of pleasures.

Owing to the different time of flowering and great variety of color, they will by judicious selection, produce a beautiful effect from early spring until late fall. They are also of great value as cut flowers.

Perennials to produce the best effects require a fairly good loam soil which has previously had rotted manure worked into it to a depth of 15 inches. As is true of any class of plants, weeds should be kept out, and it is also desirable to place a straw mulch over them during the winter.

## Sizes for Evergreens and Shade Trees

The grades offered represent all trees measuring not less than the smallest number listed and over and up to but not including the largest number. For example, 18 to 24 inch Evergreens include all trees measuring. 18 inches and up to 24 inches, but a 2 ft . tree is included in the 24 to 30 inch grade. Other sizes likewise. 6 to 8 feet sizes in Shade Trees are the best to transplant.

To ascertain the number of plants required to the acre at any given distance, divide the number of square feet $(43,560)$ in an acre by the number of sauare feet you desire to devote to each plant. For instance, in strawberries planted $11 / 2$ by 4 feet, each hill will occupy 6 square feet, making 7,260 plants to the acre.
