# General Information to Dahlia Growers 

This catalogue is issued with the intention of giving brief description of the latest dahlias in cultivation in this country at the present time.

It is alphabetically arranged so that the busy man or woman can find what is wanted quickly.

We are giving the originator's description where possible and are listing nothing in this catalogue but what we have seen grow and bloom.

Our terms are cash with the order. All retail orders will be shipped parcel post, prepaid. Dahlia tubers will be shipped unless otherwise specified soon after May 1st, unless earlier planting is wanted in the South, then shipment will be made at the option of the buyer.

Green plants will be shipped any time after danger of frost is over unless otherwise specified by the purchaser. Green plants can be planted with perfect safety up to June 15 th. The earlier the planting of green plants, the larger the crop of tubers will be.

We will make no substitution of any order unless directed to do so by the purchaser.

You will notice that we issue no cultural directions in this catalogue. Dahlias will grow in almost any soil or climate if they are grown from strong, healthy tubers. We find dahias at times subject to disease. We find this disease easily controlled by the use of strong nicotine powders blown on the plants with a duster, from planting time well on into the season.

All stock sent out by us is guaranteed true to name. We have carefully gone over our fields and rouged out all dahlias from our stock that did not show to be true.

AMBASSADOR, C. (Broomall). Soft yellow buff, shaded salmon pink. The flowers are of pleasing form and of enormous size. These splendid flowers are held erect on strong stems, are excellent keepers for exhibition purposes and invariably get the prize for the "Largest Dahlia." Can be grown eleven inches and more in diameter.
