All our spraying is executed with a power sprayer at the proper time of the year. With this method the spray is applied under a high pressure, penetrating cracks, crevices and other hiding and breeding places of insect pests. 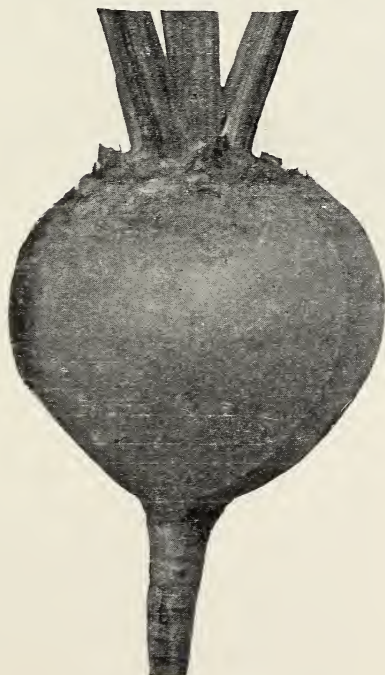

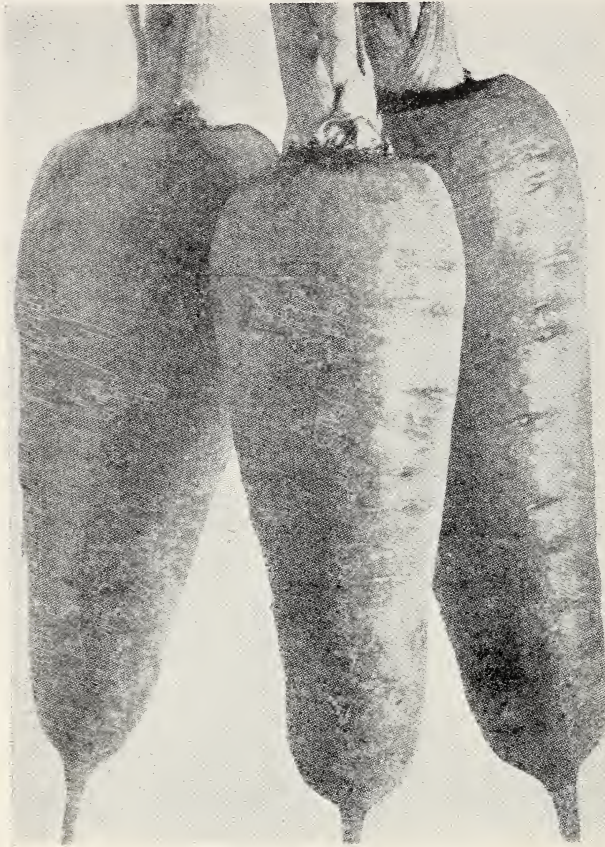

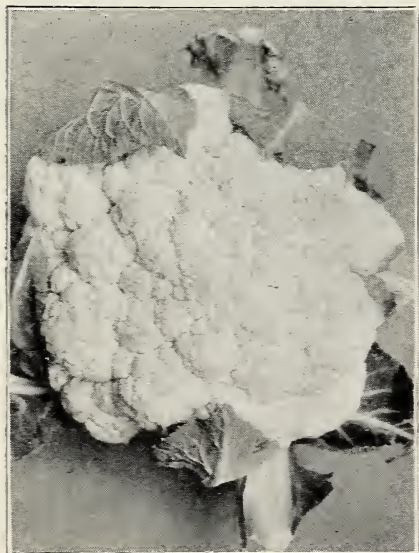
