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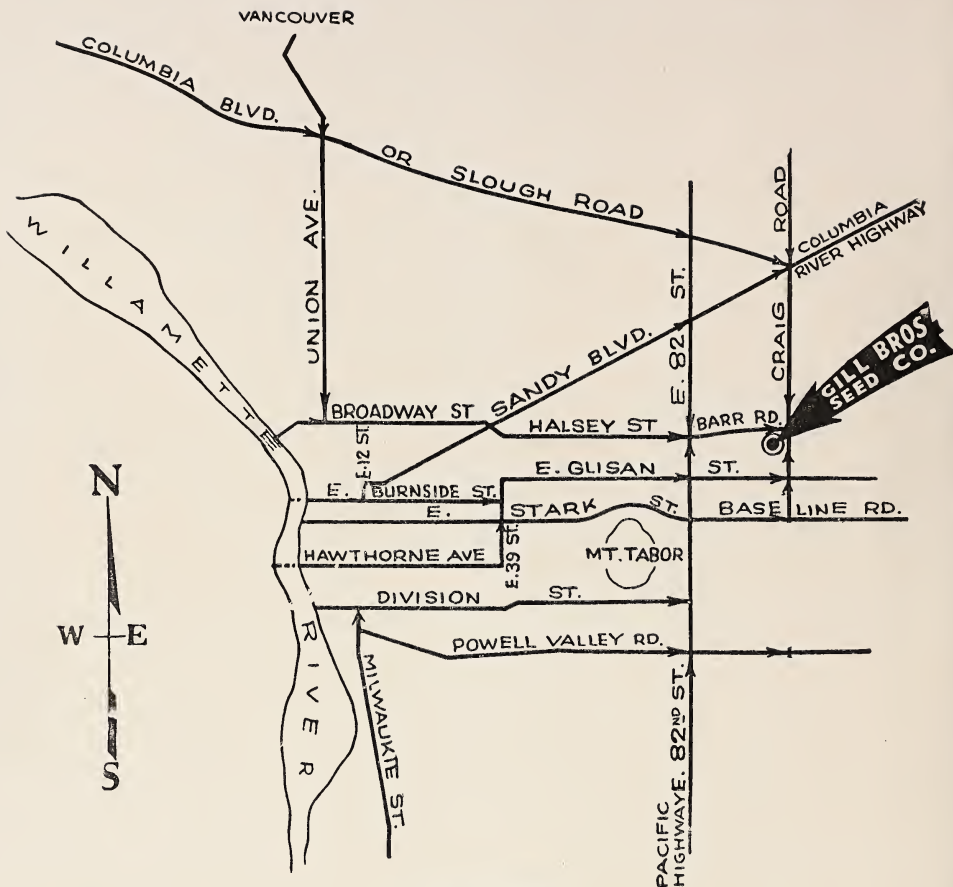

VEGETABLES

ARTICHOKE

LARGE GREEN GLOBE—The green buds are used. Start in hotbeds. Pkt. 20c; oz. \$1.00.

JERUSALEM—The tubers are used for stock feed. See section field seeds.

ASPARAGUS

CULTURE—Plant roots in well drained soil about 2 feet apart in the row and five to six feet between rows. The seed is of slow germination and should be planted early in the season.

GIANT WASHINGTON—The genuine rust resistant strain. The result of plant research and breeding by U. S. Department of Agriculture. This variety is a much stronger plant and more productive. Owing to its great vigor it can be cut sooner from time of planting. Color much like Palmetto but the stalks are larger and more uniform. Pkt. 10c; oz. 25c; ¼ lb. 75c; lb. \$2.00.

MARY WASHINGTON—A special selection from Giant Washington being earlier and larger but equally rust resistant. We carry a special, selected strain. Pkt. 10c; oz. 30c; ¼ lb. 90c; lb. \$2.50.

DWARF BEANS

CULTURE—Plant about May 1st for early beans, as soon as the ground becomes warm, in light loamy soil. Large seeded beans require warmer weather to inches deep, according to weather conditions. Never germinate than small beans. Cover from 1½ to 2 feet. Cultivate or hoe beans when the foliage is damp from dew or rains, as it will produce rust.

***SURE CROP WAX**—Very productive, stringless sort with pods six inches long, nearly round and of fine quality. The pods are long and straight making a fine bean for market gardeners.

***GIANT STRINGLESS**—Long, stringless green pods. A few days later than Burpee's Stringless but more productive and with longer, straighter pods. The pods are large and nearly round.

***PENCIL POD BLACK WAX**—Hardy and prolific and of the finest quality. The pods are bright waxy yellow, long and round and entirely free from strings. Desirable for home or market and very valuable for canning.

***BURPEE'S STRINGLESS GREEN POD**—The best early bush bean we have ever tried. The pods are green, of good length, entirely stringless, tender and brittle and remain so until ripe. This brown-seeded bean is both early and hardy and one of the richest flavored beans of all. A popular market or garden bean and desirable for canning or drying.

***GILL'S RELIABLE**—The pioneer bean and is found under various names throughout the Northwest. We have grown it in our family for forty years. It is very popular as a home garden bean. It is remarkably prolific and hardy, having few superiors, either as a string or dry bean. The pods are green and the seed pure white. Unless picked very young, the pods need stringing. Fine for canning and a good all around bean.

***WEBBER WAX**—Long, handsome, bright yellow pods of fine quality. It is hardy, a heavy cropper and extra early. Pods round flat and seed yellow. A splendid stringless bean.

***BLACK VALENTINE**—Very hardy; extremely early, withstanding cold damp weather better than most sorts. Pods dark green, long, straight and nearly round. Not recommended for home gardens.

***DWARF HORTICULTURAL or CRANBERRY**—A rich flavored early bush bean generally used as a green shell bean; vigorous and prolific. Seed and pod striped and blotched red.

POLE BEANS

*KENTUCKY WONDER WAX — This is a wax podded Kentucky Wonder and many think it is of better flavor. It is a more vigorous grower and will yield fully as heavy as the Kentucky Wonder. The pods are a light yellow, extra large, broad and long and cook very tender. Matures quite early.

WHITE SEEDED KENTUCKY WONDER or BURGER'S STRINGLESS POLE—Similar to Kentucky Wonder with white seed. Many market gardeners prefer this to Kentucky Wonder. It produces heavier and is freer from strings. Being white seeded it is valuable for winter use.

OREGON GIANT—Crop failed.

DELICIOUS GIANT—Crop failed.

*KENTUCKY WONDER — A standard variety often called Asparagus Bean. It produces exceptional yields of long, green pods of fine quality. We carry a true strain.

LONDON HORTICULTURAL (Cranberry) — Pods green streaked with red. Excellent used green, shelled or dry.

SHELL BEANS

*OREGON LIMA—A large, pole lima, extra early and suited for Northwest culture. It is acclimated and matures ripe pods 75 days from planting. Excellent used as a butter bean or stored dry for winter use. Large, pure white seed of Oregon growth. Pkt. 10c; ½ lb. 25c; lb. 40c; E. or F., lb. 35c; 10 lbs. @ 30c lb.

*BOSTON PEA BEAN—Various sorts sold as White Wonder. Mexican Tree Beans, etc., are apparently the same. The plants do not run to vine and ripen early, producing a heavy yield of pure white beans slightly smaller than Lady Washington, but much earlier.

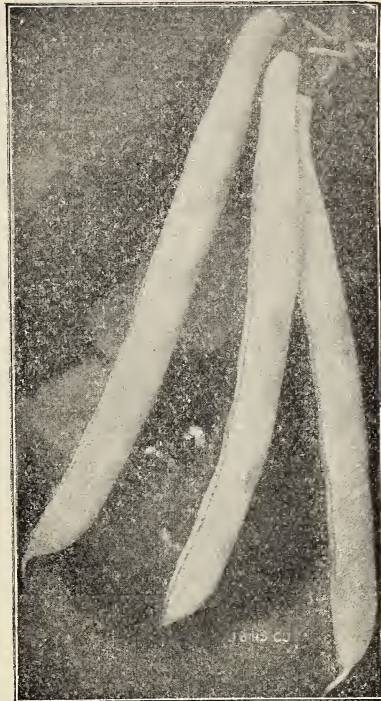
WONG BOK, PAOTING—A delicious salad vegetable from China excellent for salads and cold slaw, and is sometimes used like Swiss Chard. The stems can be used like celery. This vegetable is making good, both for market and home gardens. For best results, plant seed in August and transplant in September. It can also be planted in early spring. Those who appreciate a delightful and refreshing salad should grow some of this in their garden. Use plenty of our Garden Grow fertilizer to secure a quick, strong growth. CHICKORY

SWISS CHARD

LUCULLUS—Grows about two and a half feet high. The heavy stalks are over an inch thick and bear for more than a foot of their length. Should be served as you would asparagus. The leaves make the finest of "greens." Swiss Chard is hardy, easily grown, and should be in every garden. Pkt. 10c; oz. 20c; ¼ lb. 45c; lb. \$1.25.

TABLE BEETS

CULTURE—Plant in rows 3 feet wide, with drill, April 1st to July 1st. Thin to 3 to 4 inches apart for table beets and 8 to 12 inches for mangels. For winter beets the latest sowing is best.

***EARLY MODEL**—The best all around table beet for home or market. It is extremely early, of smooth, uniform shape. The flesh is dark red, entirely free from strings or core and unusually sweet. By years of careful selection we have perfected this strain until it has no equal.

***EARLY WONDER**—A deep blood red beet, nearly globe shaped, with small clean tap roots and small erect tops. One of the earliest and most uniform bunching beets that can be grown and also very fine for late planting. They mature very even and will stand closer planting than most sorts.

***EXTRA EARLY EGYPTAIN SPECIAL** — This strain has had our personal selection and produces extra early beets with small leaves and small tap roots. The roots are of rather flattened shape and the flesh is dark blood red and of finest quality.

***DETROIT DARK RED**—Splendid for market or home garden and popular with canneries. Roots nearly round, very uniform and of medium size; flesh tender and blood red.

***CROSBY'S EGYPTIAN** — Extremely early with roots more globe shaped than the old Egyptian. Flesh tender and sweet and rich vermilion red.

MANGEL BEET

GIANT HALF SUGAR—Cross between a mangel and sugar beet. Flesh white and exceedingly rich.

GIANT INTERMEDIATE or **GATE POST**—Heavy cropper, roots yellow, flesh white. Grows nearly one-half out of the ground.

***DANISH SLUDSTRUP** — Long, reddish-yellow, grows well above the ground and is easy to pull. Awarded first-class certificate by Denmark.

GIANT YELLOW ECKENDORF—Giant, smooth, long roots of cylindrical shape, weighing up to 20 pounds each and growing two-thirds above ground. Solid white flesh with high food value.

ENDIVE

Culture similar to lettuce. The outer leaves should be tied over the head to bleach.

LARGE GREEN CURLED—One of the best sorts. Pkt. 10c; oz. 20c; ¼ lb. 50c.

EGG PLANT

Start in hot beds like tomatoes. Set 2½ feet in the rows and 3 feet between.

CELERY

GOLDEN SELF BLANCHING

We offer two strains of French grown seed secured direct from the originator. Both of these strains are quite free from green plants.

OLD STRAIN—This has been popular for years and produces heavy rounded stalks that are very firm and especially adapted for shipment. The plants are medium short and very compact and bleach golden yellow. Our strain of this seed is giving growers fine satisfaction. Pkt. 10c; ¼ oz. \$1.00; ¼ lb. \$3.50; lb. \$10.00.

NEW STRAIN—The plants grow very tall and weigh very heavy. The stalks are wide and rather flat while the quality is extra fine being more free of strings than the old strain. They are valuable for local markets and also in dry climates where the old strain grows too small. This strain is very early and is largely planted for early crops.

There is a big demand for this strain and the seed is scarce. Pkt. 15c; ¼ oz. 60c; oz. \$1.50; ¼ lb. \$5.00; lb. \$16.00.

UTAH WINTER—This remarkable late celery is the finest quality of any we ever tried. It has been largely grown around Salt Lake and wherever shipped it commanded high prices on account of its splendid quality. They resemble the dwarf type Golden Self Blanching but are more solid and very free of strings. CABBAGE

CULTURE—Early varieties should be started in cold frame in January and February, or sowed the fall previous. They can be grown in a hotbed, but this is not so good, as the plants become tender. The earliest cabbage can be grown by sowing seed in August or early September, then transplant to the field in October. For late, plant seed in open ground May 1st, transplant June 15 for fall and July 1st to 20th for winter cabbage, in rows 3½ feet apart, from 25 to 42 inches in the row, according to the richness of the soil and size of variety. Do not crowd them. They do best in a rich, loamy soil, fertilized with barnyard manure of any kind and applying our Garden Grow fertilizer as directed. Early Jersey Wakefield, Large Wakefield, Early Express, Danish Roundhead, All Head Early and Oregon Ballhead can be sowed in the Fall for Spring and Summer cutting. They seldom run to seed.

***GILL'S OREGON BALL HEAD**—The acknowledged leader among Northwest growers for a main crop winter cabbage. We have developed this strain until it excels all others for solidity, resistance to aphid or freeze injury. It is unquestionable the best cabbage for crating or general market purposes. The outer leaves are deep green and will hold their color weeks after cutting. It is the best keeper of all, and every plant will head solid if given half a show. It will stand later planting than any winter sort and still produce solid heads. More of our seed, of this variety, is planted in the Northwest, than any other kind for winter cabbage. GOLDEN ACRE—It is claimed to be the earliest round headed cabbage and that it matures before Early Jersey Wakefield. The heads are firm with few outer leaves and average about four pounds. Pkt. 15c; oz. 65c; ¼ lb. \$2.00; lb. \$7.00.

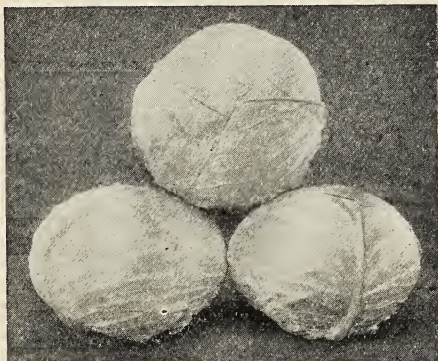
DANISH ROUNDHEAD—About two weeks earlier than Oregon Ball Head. The heads are larger and in demand for kraut purposes. It does not withstand aphid or freezing like Oregon Ball Head. Seed from carefully selected heads.

GLORY OF ENKHUISEN—The best variety for summer or early fall crops, for its tendency is to produce large heads even in dry weather. It can also be used for early spring crops. It is not satisfactory as a winter cabbage. Very brittle and sweet.

EXTRA EARLY COPENHAGEN MARKET—A strain of Copenhagen Market selected for extreme earliness and maturing a week to ten days ahead of the regular strain. Pkt. 10c; oz. 40c; ¼ lb. \$1.25; lb. \$4.00.

COPENHAGEN MARKET—Good sized, round heads, maturing with Large Wakefield, usually weighing 5 to 8 pounds.

EXTRA EARLY EXPRESS—Five to seven days earlier than Early Jersey Wakefield, producing pointed, firm heads of fair size.

LARGE WAKEFIELD, or CHARLESTON—Similar to Jersey Wakefield, but half again as large and 10 days later.

ALL HEAD EARLY—A second early, flat headed sort, very sure heading and little subject to bursting. Extra fine for kraut. Very desirable for Fall.

STONEHEAD RED—Deep red, solid heads resembling Oregon Ballhead in shape. Exceptionally solid and of good size. Pkt. 10c; oz. 50c; ¼ lb. \$1.50; lb. \$5.00.

AMERICAN SAVOY—The best main crop Savoy cabbage; quite firm, large heads with curly foliage.

CAULIFLOWER

CULTURE—For early Cauliflower, the same culture as for early cabbage may be used. For late cauliflower, in the description of the varieties offered, the time of planting seed and plants is given. Cauliflower does best in a rich, loamy soil, not a cold, wet location. Plant 2½ to 3½ feet in rows, and 3½ feet between rows. As soon as the heads are large enough to soon be exposed to the light, tie or break the leaves carefully over the head to keep the light away from them. Great care should be used in growing plants of any of the early sorts, that they receive no severe check in their growth, as this will cause them to produce premature heads. Success can be had with early varieties by planting seed in the field where they are to grow, even as late as July 10. However, the soil should be thoroughly prepared and several seeds put in a hill, thinning down to one plant when they have reached transplanting size.

Portland is now a large cauliflower shipping district and we supply large quantities of the seed sold here are Oregon and Washington Agents for C. P. Strandholm, Copenhagen, Denmark, and can supply his varieties at the prices he lists.

GIANT EASY BLANCHING—This is now recognized by market gardeners as the leading cauliflower and over four hundred acres of this variety were planted in the Northwest last year from our seed. The large, solid, pure white heads are produced near the ground on short stems but the leaves are extra long, while the inner leaves fold closely about the head making them almost self protecting. This self protecting habit insures a greater number of first grade heads and the long leaves protect the heads in hauling or crating. The plants have strong vitality and are unusually free from disease. Practically every plant

makes a fine head. For fall cutting sow the same as Gilt Edge. Tests for three years prove this sort especially valuable for early spring cutting. Pkt. 20c; ¼ oz. \$1.00; oz. \$3.00; ¼ lb. \$9.00; lb. \$32.00.

ICEBERG SNOWBALL—Our tests for two seasons proved this to be the finest Snowball strain we have yet seen. It is exceptionally white, producing smooth, round flat heads of even maturity. CAULIFLOWER Continued

GILT EDGE or **MT HOOD SNOWBALL**—Similar to Burpee's Best Early, but larger and produces heavier heads. The flower is quite smooth and regular and pure white when bleached. For fall use (October cutting) plant the seed June 1st to 10th and transplant July 15th to 25th. This variety is popular with many large growers. 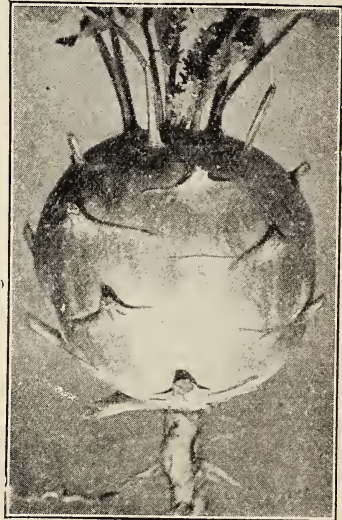

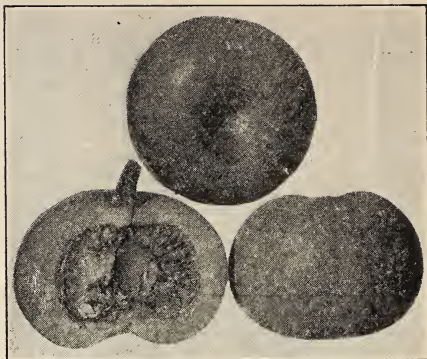

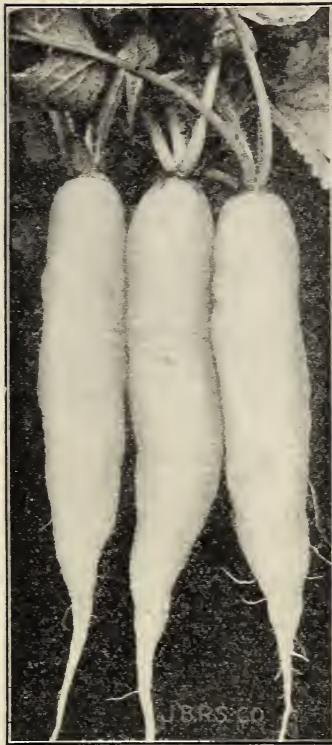

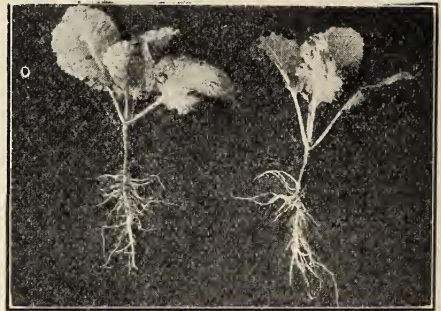

Fertilizers are divided into two distinct classes, organic and mineral. The organic is represented by those fertilizers composed of blood, meat, bone, animal manures and leaf mold, straw, etc. They are not soluble in water and should be covered up in the soil so that decay will start. In the mineral class are Nitrate of Soda, Sulphate of Ammonia, Superphosphate, Potash, etc. These are soluble in water. Organic fertilizers are by far the best to use as they contain much humus and feed the plants in a natural way while most of the mineral fertilizers contain chemicals which are to certain degrees injurious to plant growth and they should be used judiciously and price and analysis being equal, should not be used at all.

Four plant foods are now considered necessary for properly balanced growth, these being nitrogen, phosphoric acid, potash and sulphur. The sulphur should be in the form of sulphate of sulphur and for commercial use this is best secured by the use of land plaster.

Nitrogen is especially necessary in leaf growth, phosphoric acid in seed, stalk and root, while potash lends color and flavor, also keeping qualities. Nitrogen is usually listed as ammonia.

To those who use fertilizer in quantity we recommend the purchase of straight ingredients, mixing them yourselves. Let us assist you with our suggestions. We believe we can save you money on your fertilizer purchases. It pays to buy fertilizer of high analysis as this gives a decided reduction in freight.

The analysis given will not vary much with mixed brands but in the others the analysis varies in different lots and we will advise regarding these when quoting.

ANALYSIS EXPLAINED. The figures in analysis are as follows: First given, ammonia; second, phosphoric acid; third, potash. In comparing prices be sure to consider the analysis as it shows the real value of the product.

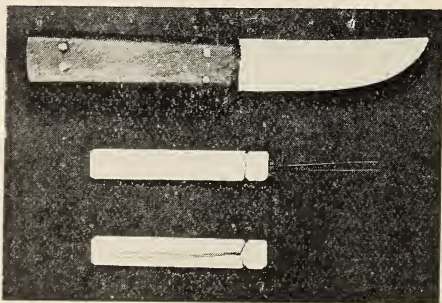

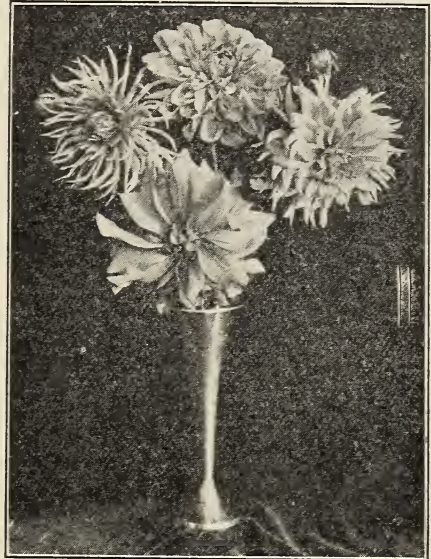
