AFTER several years' observation and experiment, we believe it is entirely practicable to grow a fine crop of spring flowers from fall-planted bulbs, on the same ground used during the summer for Dahlias. We are therefore offering our friends a short list selected from the very finest tested varieties of late May-flowering Tulips, and a few of the best Narcissus available.



The May-flowering Tulips are by far the most satisfactory, as the flowers are larger and last longer than the earlier varieties. They should be planted in October or November, about six inches deep and the same distance apart. They may be lifted without injury about the middle of June, which is quite early enough to plant Dahlias in this climate. Or if preferred they may be left undisturbed for several years, until they become too crowded. At the low prices herein, not less than 100 of one variety can be sold.



Narcissus, like Tulips, may be planted after Dahlias are dug up, in October or November, and lifted without injury about the middle of June, in time to plant Dahlias for the next Fall. But even more than the late-flowering Tulips, they are the ideal spring bulb for America, for they thrive and multiply in almost any soil, where even late-flowering Tulips would deteriorate. As Narcissus may no longer be imported, the varieties offered are grown in this country, and while the prices are somewhat higher than formerly, the bulbs are all sound and healthy, and may be depended upon to produce satisfactory results.
