VEGETABLE SEEDS

Asparagus

1 ounce to 50 feet of drill.

Culture. Dig a trench $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet deep and 1 foot wide. Fill in about 4 inches of well rotted manure, tread down firmly, on this put about 5 inches of good rich soil, and then lay the roots in about 18 inches apart, taking care to spread well, having the crowns in an upright position. Cover to within 4 inches of the top of the trench and as the plants grow gradually fill the trench to the surface. Allow 18 inches between rows. For rust spray with Bordeaux Mixture or dust with powdered sulphur.

Lima Beans

1 pound to 100 feet of drill.

Culture. Do not sow Lima Beans until all danger of frost is over and the soil is thoroughly warm. Sow in rows 2 feet apart and 3 inches deep and 6 to 8 inches apart. It requires a nice rich loamy soil, for Limas to do their best.

Culture. Seed should be sown in the garden about the latter part of April in rows about 18 inches apart an inch deep. Cover the seed carefully and firm in the ground by walking over the drills. When seedlings appear thin out to 4 inches between the plants. Beets are best for pulling when about 2 inches in diameter. Successive sowings may be made up to the middle of July.

Culture. Sow in May in shallow drills 1 inch deep and 12 inches apart. Transplant in July. When the crown or top sprout is beginning to head, pinch it out so that the strength of the plant will be thrown into the side shoots. Sprouts will mature about the end of September.

Rows should be 3 feet apart and plants set 8 inches apart in the row. As the plants grow they should be boarded or earthed up to blanch them.

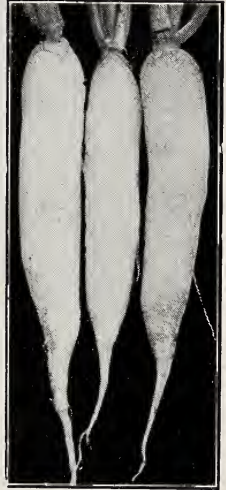
