VARIETIES

A word to our customers and friends:-

In presenting this list we wish to call our customers attention to the fewer number of varieties we offer than heretofore. This means no reduction in our growing but a more careful selection of varieties best suited for commercial and exhibition purposes. Our plantings of these kinds has increased and it is with a feeling of pride that we can recommend to you, without restraint, any and all of the varieties

herein listed.

Many cut flower growers who have relied solely upon the old stand-bys cannot realize the vast difference to be found in the newer kinds of proven merit in respect to productiveness, length of stem, size of flower, brilliancy of coloring, and substance. Many do not know that such varieties as Tycko Zang and Katherine Hess will produce larger and finer blooms from bulblets than lots of old kinds do from sizeable bulbs. Number four bulbs of the better kinds give finer and larger bloom in the fall, when gladiolus are in demand, than do number one bulbs of the old commercial varieties. The grower who is not improving the quality of his stock is slipping behind. Try such varieties as Jacoba Van Beijeren, Miss Spokane, Mrs. F. C. Peters, Mrs. Leon Douglas, Mrs. Newell Vanderbilt and let us prove our point.

For a commercial gladiolus of first water we cannot say too much about Jewell, a huge wide open prim. which often belies the fact that it belongs to the primulinus tribe. Souvenir needs no mention. It is the deepest yellow in glads. Unfortunately our stock of this variety is small this season.

Shell pink, one of the best things in glads. The originator calls it a prim but he will have to prove it. Its size, in comparison with any glad, is simply immense.

There may be a lot of argument about the best white, but not with us. Albania is pure white and remains so under most trying conditions. It is the most vigorous grower we have knowledge of. For Exhibition purposes try Mr. Hyde.

Among commercial yellows we must exclude all others except Pollyanna, Golden Swallow and Gold. Pollyanna has been our favorite and the favorite of the Seattle flower market for this season. It is yellow and has many blooms open at one time.

As for the more expensive novelties and new varieties, our stock is too limited and too much in demand to warrant more than a listing of what we have to offer. Let us have your order of these kinds as soon as possible.

Delkin's Puget Sound Bulbs WHAT ARE THEY?

Delkin's Puget Sound Bulbs are bulbs grown under the personal supervision of Mr. Fred L. Delkin, in the world famous Puget Sound basin of Western Washington. It is in this region, now recognized as having no equal as a bulb raising section, that the United States Department of Agriculture has long maintained its bulb experiment station. It is here that Mr. Delkin, for many years instructor in science, is devoting his entire time to the scientific production of a superior quality of bulbs.

The Delkin Bulb Farms are located on the paved boulevard on the east shore of Lake Washington, opposite the city of Seattle. They comprise a sloping hillside of virgin sandy loam rescued from the mighty forests of Douglas fir that still surround them on the north and east. Here in a moisture laden atmosphere rarely reaching a temperature of 85° on the hottest summer day, or falling below freezing for any period of time during the coldest part of winter, flowers and bulbs are developed to an ideal state of perfection.

On the Delkin Farms a complete system of overhead irrigation supplements any deficiency in the summer rains and gladiolus are kept in a continual healthy growth until late in the fall. This long period of growth produces bulbs of unusual vitality and is one of the reasons why Delkin's Puget Sound bulbs have won prizes for our customers in flower shows throughout the country and have prompted unsolicited praise from friends everywhere.

Our bulb warehouse is of unique architectural structure and is well designed for the use to which it is put. Due to the mildness of climate, cellar construction is unnecessary and the bulbs are stored in a long room insulated from the outside air by double floor and triple wall construction. Bulbs are stored in wire bottom trays set in racks on either side of the room, reaching from floor to ceiling. Ventilation is maintained through two windows located at opposite ends of the room so that a strong circulation of air passes through the center of the room. The capacity of the storage room is 5,000,000 gladiolus bulbs. In the front of the building is the drying room and the office and salesroom. The drying room is provided with heat. Here the bulbs are received from the field, are dried, cleaned, graded and sent to the storage room to await the demands of our customers.
