1. *The extraordinary length and tapering spire-like shape of the flower-spikes.*
2. *The statuesque beauty of the plants as a whole.*

5. *Their unmistakable resemblance to hollyhocks.*

Black-eyed Susan. Huge, massive spikes of pale blue, set off with a very large black "bee."

Coquette. Tapering spiral spikes, 4 feet long; amethyst-violet flowers, delicately shaded blue, set off with golden brown center.

Happy Thought. Flowers enormous; outer petals blue on ground-work of pansy-violet, shaded rosy amethyst. Each perfect bloom is set off with a gold and brown "bee" in center. A superb late-flowering sort.

Ideal. Manganese-violet, shading to cornflower-blue, dark bronze bee-like center.

Jenny Jones. A statuesque beauty. Blooms of pansy-violet with vivid flashes of gentian-blue. Spikes of great height.

Purple Splendour. Lovely cornflower-blue, with crinkly inner petals, shaded amethyst.

Queen Mauve. Writing in *The Garden*, the Rev. Joseph Jacob says of Queen Mauve: "An exceptionally lovely eyeless mauve with a graceful spike 3 feet long, wide at base, and tapering to the top, with but few side-shoots." An exquisite shade of pale Hortense-violet, shaded salvia-blue. Late-flowering. In full bloom in August.

Sealandia. The broad spikes, tapering toward the top, are sheathed with Parma-violet flowers, tinted sky-blue; in center of each petal is a small dark eye. A valuable late-flowering variety.

Starlight. Pale blue, set off with a large black eye. Very long, rather close spike. Extremely late-flowering.

Wales. The spike is colossal in size, approaching 5 feet in length from the base to the tip, and tapering to a point from a width of nearly 9 inches. Each flower is placed in a perfect spiral, and the color, a royal purple self, with small white center, is in harmony with the general grandeur of the plant.

Calceolaria, Albert Kent HHP

This fine *Calceolaria* grows about 1½ feet high and bears immense trusses of bloom from the beginning of May through the entire summer. The individual flowers are about 1½ inches across, thus intermediate in size between the large-flowered greenhouse varieties and those used for outdoor bedding. They are graceful in shape, like a falling drop of water, and of a bright golden yellow color with a rich maroon-red blotch. 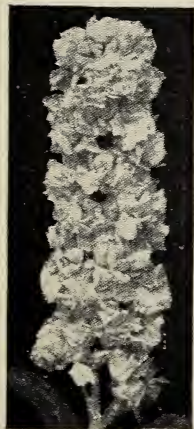

Beans, particularly the bush varieties, are one of the most satisfactory vegetables to grow. They adapt themselves to practically any condition of soil, succeeding particularly well in the virgin soil of newly made gardens. Successive sowings should be made throughout the season. The crop should always be picked promptly when matured, used immediately or canned for winter. Black Valentine, Masterpiece, and Golden Wax carry our highest recommendations. Sow about May 1, in drills 2 inches deep, and 1½ to 2 feet apart. Drop the Beans 3 inches apart, and cover not more than 2 inches. Sow every two weeks, up to the end of July, for a succession. Immediately the pods have attained a fair size they should be removed, for the over-development of a few Beans will soon cause the plants to cease bearing.

How to Make a Lawn

To produce a good lawn requires considerable work; do not make the mistake of trying to cheapen the preparation, for nowhere in the garden is the old axiom of "what is worth doing, is worth doing well," better illustrated than in lawn-making.

The soil must be deep; a good lawn cannot exist on poor soil. Plow the ground deeply—a foot is none too much. Apply to the soil before plowing, a heavy coating of well-rotted stable manure. Fresh manure carries too many weed-seeds; its use should be avoided. If rotted manure is not available, sheep manure or chemical fertilizers may be substituted.

Ground bone-meal, $1\frac{1}{2}$ tons to the acre, is a good lawn fertilizer, furnishing plant-food over a long period; 100 pounds of nitrate of soda and 100 pounds of dried blood to the acre should be applied at the same time; these furnish nitrogen for immediate use. Sheep manure at the rate of 1,000 pounds to the acre may be used instead of nitrate of soda and dried blood. When only a small lawn is being made, use 20 pounds of bone-meal to 250 square feet, $\frac{1}{2}$ pound each of nitrate of soda and dried blood, or 6 pounds of sheep manure. Harrow and cross-harrow until the ground is thoroughly pulverized; the better harrowed the ground is, the better the grass will grow and the more permanent the lawn.

An acre requires 125 pounds of seed or one pound to each 250 square feet. Harrow or rake the ground lightly, and roll with a heavy roller.

Hardy Annuals, HA. A rich, sandy loam, made very fine, is the most suitable soil for the smaller Hardy Annuals. There is nothing better than soil taken from old hotbeds, or sods from an old pasture that have been piled up and allowed to rot for two to three years, and then mixed with a little old stable manure and sand. The soil should be placed in shallow boxes or pots and set in a warm window, *hoped*, or, if possible, in a greenhouse. Use shallow boxes or seed-pans from 2 to 3 inches deep, and of convenient size.

Sow the seed in April or May, according to your latitude. Do not make the mistake of sowing the seed too deeply—covering only to the depth of the thickness of the seeds is generally sufficient, except in the case of Sweet Peas, which should be planted 2 inches deep, or in the case of medium-sized seeds, like Balsams and Zinnias, which should be planted at least a half inch or more. Fine seeds, such as Portulacas, need only to be pressed into the soil with a piece of board or the palm of the hand. The earth should always be pressed down firmly after sowing flower seeds, or there is danger of their drying up before the roots get firm hold of the soil.

After the seeds are up, plenty of air and moisture should be given them, but water should be judiciously applied or they will “damp off.” Transplanting to other boxes may be done when the young plants are well out of the seed-leaf. When pots are not available, boxes, and the like may be used.

Half-Hardy Annuals, HHA. Follow same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals. Seed may be sown any time after April 15, as the hotbed will be sufficient protection, but it is advisable to cover the glass with a mat or straw until danger of frost is past. Give plenty of ventilation during the day. After May 30 sow in the border, like Hardy Annuals.

Tender Annuals, TA. Use very light sandy compost and provide drainage in the pots by placing pieces of broken pots or bits of sod in the bottom. Cover the finer seeds no more than $\frac{1}{8}$ inch deep and press the soil firmly over them. In order to have early bloom and strong plants, sow the seed in boxes in March, placing them in a warm greenhouse or plunging in a moderate hotbed, being careful to protect them from the cold, shade them from the midday sun, and water with a fine rose.

Hardy Perennials, HP. Follow the same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals, using the same soil, but the Perennials may be sown in the open border from July to September. The seeds of many perennials are slow to germinate, some requiring several months and some as long as two years. It is a good idea to cover the plants lightly with straw, leaves, or any dry litter, as soon as the frosts commence, so that they may be protected from the extremely severe winter weather.

Half-Hardy Perennials, HHP. Use same soil and cultural directions as for Hardy Annuals. Nearly all kinds of Half-Hardy Perennials may be sown in the open border in a warm and sunny spot as soon as the soil has become dry and warm, so that those who do not have coldframes or greenhouses need not be deprived of this class of flowers, though they may have to wait a little later for their blooms.

Hardy Biennials, HB. These require the same soil and treatment as the Hardy Perennials, which see.

Half-Hardy Biennials, HHB. Use same cultural directions as given for Half-Hardy Perennials.

Hardy Climbers, HC. Follow same cultural directions as given for Hardy Annuals or Hardy Perennials, depending on which class they belong to.

Sweet Peas

Introductory Remarks Specially Compiled for the Amateur

The Sweet Pea, during recent years, has evolved into quite a different flower from what it formerly was. The newer form, being known as the Spencer or Orchid, has the advantage of being, above all, much larger, fully twice the size of the older form, and borne on stout stems 12 to 15 inches long, each stem producing four and often five flowers. In form it has been changed to a far more graceful and beautiful flower, each petal being elegantly waved and frilled, resembling somewhat the rarer orchids.

The Twentieth Century Method of Growing Sweet Peas

For Early Blooms. Place three seeds in a small pot of soil in the house about March 1. If all three seeds germinate, pull out the two weakest plants and retain the strongest. As soon as the second set of leaves has formed, plunge the young plants, with the pots, in a coldframe protected by sash, where they can be hardened off. Lift the sash during the sunny hours of the day and water carefully. Set the plants out in the open about April 15, and space them 6 inches apart in the row

General Culture

Four ounces of seed will be sufficient to plant a single row of 100 feet

The ground where Sweet Peas are to be grown should be well prepared—if possible, the fall previous. Deep spading or plowing is very essential, for the roots love to penetrate into the cooler part of the soil. Manure placed at a considerable depth will help to draw the roots downward. Sweet Peas love sun, therefore they should always be planted where they are exposed to the sun all day.

Sow Seeds Early. Sweet Peas produce their strongest roots during the cool, moist months of spring, so planting should take place as soon as the land can be worked. A little frost will do no harm to Sweet Peas. After the soil has been carefully smoothed and raked, draw a line for a straight row and sow three seeds every 6 inches in the row. Do not cover the seed with more than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of soil, and if more than one plant should appear in each spot, carefully destroy all but one specimen so that one plant shows every 6 inches in the row

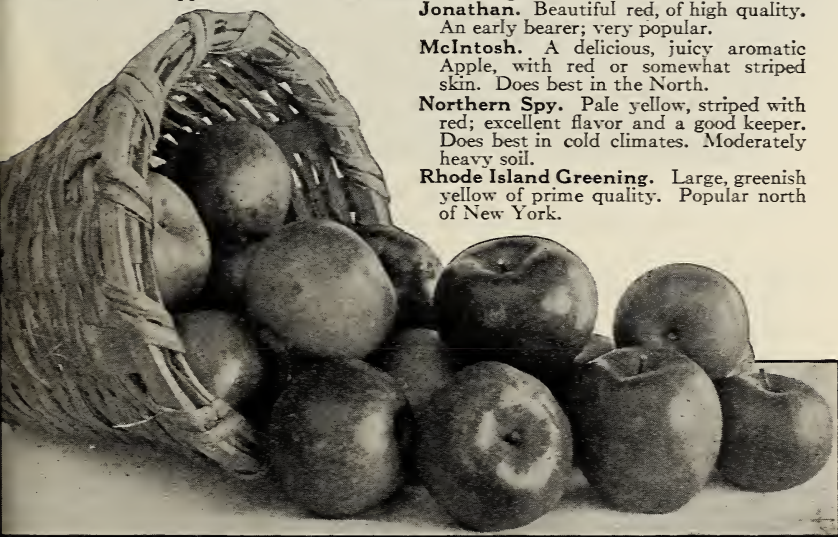

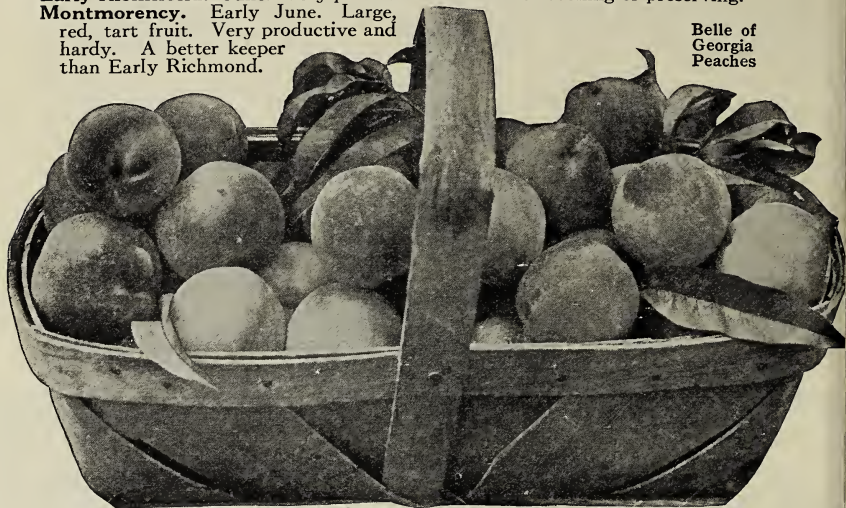

Dahlias

CULTURE.—Dahlias prefer an open, sunny situation, light and rather poor soil, and at least 3 feet of space between the plants. No manure or fertilizer should be embodied with the soil at or previous to time of planting. Tubers should not be planted before April 15. Immediately on receipt of the plants they should be set out and carefully watered, and for the first day or two they should be shaded from the bright sun. Cultivation around them every day gives better results than all the artificial watering in the world. Each plant should have a support, to which the main stem is carefully tied. While we do not recommend adding manure or fertilizer to the soil, we strongly urge feeding Dahlia plants *from the surface* by spreading manure or fertilizers on the surface after the plants have attained a height of 15 inches or more, and either moisten it or fork it lightly into the soil.

To make Dahlia blooms last after cutting, follow this suggestion: Cut flowers late in the evening, and plunge the freshly cut stems into hot water for a few minutes, afterward into cool water, and put them away in a cool cellar for the night. In the morning bring them to the room where they are wanted, and flowers then will easily last for three to four days.

Dahlia tubers can be delivered from April onward. Young plants can be delivered during May, June, and July. Please state, when ordering, the exact date on which they are wanted.

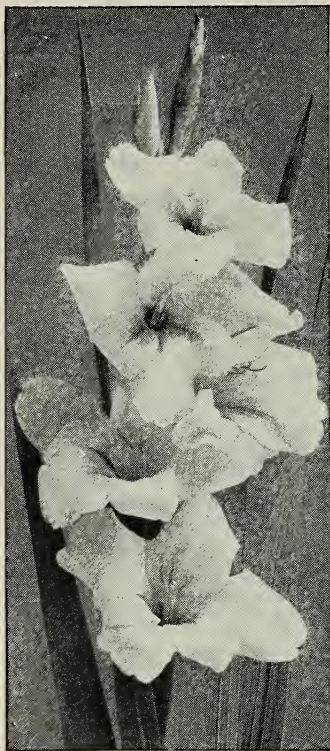

Gladiolus

Valuable Cultural Hints for the Amateur



Gladiolus, Peace

Our selection has been painstakingly studied, with the sole object of offering the most beautiful sorts in the world, and from these only such as have distinctive merits.

Culture. Gladiolus will succeed in all kinds of soil, provided the location is a sunny one. Before spading or plowing, manure the ground thoroughly, as the Gladiolus likes a rich ground.

Time of Planting. The bulbs can be planted just as soon as the frost is out of the ground and the beds are properly prepared. In the vicinity of New York this may be early in April. If the flowers are wanted in successive crops, it is best to make weekly plantings, and, if planted as late as June 30, the flowers will appear before frost time. Many of the more delicately colored Gladiolus will produce better and clearer colored blooms late than if they appear during the hot summer months.

Staking. As soon as the sword-like foliage has developed to a certain height, each plant should be supported with a light stake, provided the Gladiolus are wanted for garden effect. The best-looking support is the thin Japanese bamboo dyed a grass-green; it is straight, wiry, inconspicuous, and extremely inexpensive.

Feeding. Gladiolus are gross feeders, and we find pulverized sheep manure is the most result-producing food. Apply it between the rows after the foliage has made a good start, and repeat the application every two weeks until the buds show. From that time on liquid sheep manure, applied every other day, produces splendid results.

Watering. Continued moisture is just as essential for the successful growing of these flowers as food, and we wish to impress our readers with the fact that drought is most detrimental to their health.

Cultivation. It is a well-established fact that every plant benefits by constant cultivation, and if we were asked what part of the culture is the most important we should always say cultivation. The soil around the plants should always be open.

Depth and Distance to Plant. Our recommendation is to plant 4 inches deep and 4 inches apart.

Hardy Garden Lilies

Hardy Lilies are among the most gorgeous and easily grown subjects for the herbaceous border, and, without crowding other plants, throw up their sturdy stems each year with an eager desire to unfold their wonderful blooms over the heads of near-by companions, and hold the admiring gaze of those who pass by. Lilies thrive in partial shade, that is, the lower stem and bulb are better shaded by the foliage of other plants. Their stem roots, which feed almost on the surface of the soil, need plenty of food and moisture. They revel in the "peaty" soil of a rhododendron bed, but thrive equally well in a rich sandy loam. The most beautiful forms are *Lilium auratum*, *L. speciosum*, vars. *Melpomene* and *rubrum*, *L. regale*, *L. tigrinum*, and *L. Henryi*. Plant 4 to 6 inches deep.

Growing Good Roses

The same soil and care which produce good cabbage or potatoes will produce good Roses; but usually Hybrid Tea Roses are expected to be ornaments in the garden as well as to produce cut-flowers. Therefore they cannot always be grown as potatoes are grown but must be planted in regular beds and given special care.

The beds ought not to be more than 4 feet wide, and the soil should be rich. Avoid making the ground loose or spongy. The stiffer and harder the soil in the lower layers of the bed the better Roses grow. Old sods, greasy decayed cow-manure, bone-meal, and commercial dried sheep-manure are good fertilizers. Keep the surface of the Rose-beds well cultivated.

Plant Hybrid Tea Roses $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart. More vigorous types need more space. Set the "bud" or "graft" at least 1 inch beneath the surface. Spread out the fine roots carefully and tamp the soil firmly about them. It is sometimes well to tread the soil hard about the roots. Loose planting is fatal.

Roses must be pruned when planted, and every spring afterward. Remove weak and dead wood, and shorten the new growths to 6 inches or less, remembering that dwarf, slender-growing Roses must be cut back harder than strong ones. Climbing Roses ought not be cut in the spring except to take out dead wood, but in July, when they have finished flowering, remove the old canes and train up new vigorous shoots from the roots for next year's bloom.

The green plant-lice which attack the tips and buds of Roses in spring and fall may be destroyed by a nicotine spray such as Black-Leaf 40. Hand picking is best for rose-bugs, although some people report that Melrosine is effective. Black-spot and mildew may be prevented by bordeaux mixture or the sulphur-arsenate dust recommended by the American Rose Society. This dust is composed of nine parts *dusting* sulphur and one part powdered arsenate of lead. It is applied by beating a thin bag of it among the bushes, or with a dust-gun. Dust when the air is still, so it will float underneath the leaves as well as on top.
