
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




Narcissi or Daffodils

King of the Blues. Dark blue; compact truss.

Schotel. Light blue; good forcer.

Single White

Correggio. Pure snow-white; large truss.
General Vetter. Creamy white; large spike.

L'Innocence. Pure white; the best white for all purposes.

La Grandesse. Pure white; fine bells; good exhibition variety.

Queen of the Whites. Snow-white; very heavy spike.

Single Red and Rose

Garibaldi. Glowing crimson-red; very early.
General de Wet. Light rose; fine broad spike.
Gertrude. Rosy pink; large, compact truss.
Lady Derby. Rose-pink; large spike; excellent for pots.
