Directions---for growing strawberries.

Plow ground deep and prepare level. Set plants in rows $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 ft. apart by 18 in. to 2 ft. apart in the row, do not set in furrows as they might get covered up after heavy rains, cultivate as soon as weed growth starts and continue at intervals of 2 weeks during the whole growing season or till about Sept. 1st. Keep entirely free from weeds and grass by hoeing and hand weeding. Keep blossoms picked off to induce them to make runners and set new plants. The blossoms may be allowed to remain on ever bearers after the middle of July and they will fruit in the fall.
