This calls for the cultivation of the unusual as well as of that which is familiar to appreciative gardeners and the training in methods of propagation creates, as a by-product, surplus stock which, in past years, has added to the beauty of many a garden designed by our graduates. Present conditions permit us to offer an equal opportunity to a wider circle of those who also enjoy the allure of the unfamiliar.
