

After the seed is examined the samples are then placed in the germinators on trays like the one below and after germinating, is inspected and the germination test recorded.



An easy rule for determining number of plants or trees, per acre or plot: Multiply the distance in feet between rows by the distance between plants, and divide the square feet in the plot by this result. Illus-tration: Rhubarb, 4 ft. x 2 ft.--8 ft.; 8 into 43560 (acre)--5445 plants.




ASPARAGUS

One of the earliest Spring vegetables. It can be produced very easily and cheaply and is a profitable market crop. A bed 15x50 feet, requiring about 100 plants, should give an abundant supply for the average family.

CULTURE—Soak seeds 24 hours in warm water, sow early in drills one foot apart. An ounce of seed will sow about 300 feet of drill. Keep soil mellow and free from weeds. After one year's growth transplant into permanent beds, carefully pre-pared by working to a depth of 24 inches, manuring deeply, using old manure and bone meal; 5 feet is a convenient width for a bed that will carry three rows, and can be reached without treading upon it. Set plants 18 inches apart in the rows and

spread roots out, firm-ing the soil down on them. At no time of its growth should the asparagus crop be allowed to lack for manuring. From one to two years' time can be saved by buying roots of us. See plant department, 7260 roots will plant an acre.

ARTICHOKES

LARGE GREEN GLOBE-The variety used as a table vegetable. The edible portion is the thick end of leaf of the flower head. Sow early in drills and when about ten inches high transplant into rows four feet apart each way. It will produce only a small crop the first year, but will continue in good bearing five years. Cut before the bud opens. The seedlings are variable and for market gardening they are generally propagated from cuttings. BEANS—DWARF or BUS

Owing to our mild Winters and cool Summers, locally grown acclimated seed from properly selected strains will be found to give best satisfaction in the Pacific Northwest. We are constantly testing and selecting the most dependable and profit-able sorts and increasing our facilities and connections for local production, and when we offer a variety as being suited to your requirements and location you can accept it without fear of disappointment.

accept it without fear of disappointment. CULTURE—The soil best adapted for growing beans is a light, rich, well-drained loam, which was well manured for the previous crop. If the ground is too freshly manured the plants are apt to run to vines and set few blossoms. Plant in drills about two inches deep and from eighteen inches to two feet apart, as soon as the ground is dry enough and warm—about May 1st, or later, and for succession up to July 15th. Beans are very sensitive to cold and wet before they bave sprouted, but are not so liable to be damaged after they are above ground. Plant about one pound of Dwarf or Bush Beans to 100 feet of drill, one bushel per acre. Pole Beans—one pound to 100 bills, requiring about one-half bushel per acre. When planted in hills, 2½ to 3 feet apart, small varieties such as "Navy" and "Lady Washington" will require from 16 to 25 pounds, Der acre, larger sorts running from 25 to 30 pounds. Owing to their short season of growth, from 60 to 80 days, beans generally make a profitable crop for trucking. After barvest-ing the beans always plow the vines under to fertilize the soil.

WAX PODDED VARIETIES

It is also necessary to add some commercial fertilizer, but any good soil will grow a fair crop.

Use 6 to 10 lbs. of seed per acre, depending on whether machine or hand planting, sowing liberally so that in thin-ning an even stand can be secured. Rows 18 to 30 inches apart. Level culture is best. If planted in dry weather, be sure seed is in from one to one and one-half inches as it re-quires lots of moisture to burst the hard shell.


A poor stand and weak germination is often due to im-proper planting and lack of moisture. Transplanting can be successfully done to fill vacancies. Do this before a shower, and early, breaking off tops of larger leaves.





To Succeed with Celery you must keep your plants growing constantly while young, if you allow them to "stand still" they will run up to seed later. Always cultivate as soon after water. ing as the ground is dry enough to work well. Fertilize heavily in the Spring-and use nitrate later if needed.

NOTE-In this locality we recommend planting about the middle of April and shipment of bulbs will be made the latter part of March, that we may be better able to ship only bulbs with good eves. Do not delay your order for some of those listed of bulbs are in short supply. Dahlias will grow to perfection in any good gar-

Dahlias will grow to perfection in any good gar-den soil, preferably one that contains a little sand. Plant as soon as frost is gone and ground warm, cutting tuber to a single strong eye, placing it on its side at a depth of ahout 6 inches, in ground that has been well cultivated. An excellent way to start for the solution of a single strong eye, placing it on its side at a depth of about 6 inches, in ground that has been well cultivated. An excellent way to start Dahlias is to sprout tubers in greenhouse and set out the rooted plants. Rows should be 4 feet apart, plants 18 inches to 3 feet apart in the row, depend-ing on whether for a hedge or specimen plants. Cultivate thoroughly until ready to bloom, then deep tillage must cease and only the surface be lightly stirred, as deep cultivation at this time is fatal to blooming. Tall varieties should be staked. If you use commercial fertilizer, do not apply until plant starts growth, then work into top soll, 5 or 6 inches from plant. Bone meal is an excellent fer-tilizer for Dahlias but must be applied early, as it is slow in action. When the plant is well up, say 6 to 10 inches, pinch off top, leaving 2 or 3 joints. This will cause it to branch out into a more sturdy, bushy growth. Water freely.



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Our roses are all large, sturdy, two-year-old bushes, Oregon field-grown, budded on disbudded Manetta stock, and will give you splendid flowers the first season. They are true to name and include the best of the wellknown popular varieties.

The Time to Plant-Roses may be planted either in the Fall or Spring. It should be done early, and we earnestly request our friends to place their Spring orders in mid-Winter so that ship-ment can be made at the most favorable time. Planting-Deep preparation of soil is urged. Stir ground thor-oughly to a depth of at least 18 inches and two feet or more if soil is inclined to be wet or soggy, filling in extra 6 inches with stones, to insure drainage. Bone meal worked into ground at time of planting is a big help, using a large trowelful to a plant. Sheep manure in a little larger proportion is also good. We have prepared especially for roses and the lawn a mixed fertilizer with a high percentage of nitrogen and phosphorus. For 2-year-old bushes apply about a half pint (cupful), for larger bushes, use a pint to a bush; cultivate into the soil around the bush early in the Spring. When buds are formed use about a gallon of liquid manure to a bush once a week. Make it by mixing Lawn and

Rose Fertilizer and water until it's the color of weak tea. If planting in the Fall, prune tops slightly but be sure to trim all root ends back unless this has been done at the nursery. In the Spring, trim back all branches to not more than 4 eyes. Plant at least 2 inches deeper than the crown from which sprouts arise. Cultivation and Protection—Keep soil well stirred, but do not cultivate deeper than 2 inches. Soak ground when you do water and then do not water again until the surface is quite dry. Pro-tect roses from insects and disease by spraying. Shipping—We always send all our two-year-old rose bushes charges collect by express or freight, packing so they will carry safely even though they should be on the road for two weeks or more. If necessary, we can send small two-year-old bushes by mail, but in such cases we always prune the tops and roots ready for planting. Add 5c postage for each bush when ordering by parcel post.

USE MORE FERTILIZER ON SHADY SPOTS

The roots of trees draw moisture from a good deal of space surrounding the tree, and thus take much of the moisture and fertility under the tree which works more injury to lawns than the shade. For this reason it is advisable to use a fertilizer top dressing more frequently on shady lawns. A good method for assuring even distribution of fertilizer is to mix it thoroughly with three or four times the amount of sifted top soil, making it easier to distribute uniformly.

Bone meal is also good to work in the bed. Cover the crown not over 3 inches deep and plant, if possible, in partial shade. When cutting Peonies allow at least two leaves to remain on each stem; the roots need these lungs for full growth. Do not remove foliage until it is thoroughly dead.





The growing of the Iris is greatly increasing each year on account of their rare beauty as well as ease of growing. They are hardy, drouth resisting; they come at a time when the garden needs their color, they bloom the first season after planting and soon form wonderful big clumps which are easily divided and transplanted.

Cultivation is easy; sunny situation needed; soil dry and well drained (Iris cannot stand water around the roots). Plant with bulb just below the surface, spread the roots out and pack the soil. No fertilizer should touch rhizomes. Fall planting is preferable. Water about once in two weeks until well established. Bone meal and finely ground limestone are good fertilizers. (In list below, S indicates standard or part of flower remaining upright, and F indicates falls or drooping part of flower.)




