Once More We Greet You—

NOTHING ever impresses us more as to the rapidity of time's flight than the succession of the seasons of the "glad" year. It seems only yesterday that we put out our 1927 "Unusual Glads." Since that time we have experienced a splendid round of seasons and are now again offering our "wares" to you.

This little chat before we enter into the task of persuading you that our bulbs are the best in the world—is always a pleasure. We can tell you of our aims, our hopes and our ambitions here. For we all do build our "Castles in Spain," and who does not enjoy telling of them? If you enjoy reading it half as much as we enjoy writing, then we shall all be satisfied.

The plan we followed last season of dividing our varieties into groups—based on price—seemed to meet the approval of many, so we are again following it this season—a little different groupings, to be sure, but on the same plan.

There is considerable discussion regarding the advisability of listing those varieties named for persons, with last names first,—as we find them in the telephone directory. The champions of this plan claiming that it is a great assistance in finding varieties if they are listed as we usually see them. We believe however, that unless a cross index is used that this is rather confusing. Besides, a variety which the originator named "Mrs. Leon Douglass" is not "Douglass, Mrs. Leon" and we do not like to list it thus. Perhaps some day we shall be persuaded that this method is preferable, but until that time, we shall remain as at present—old fashioned though it may be.

One of the greatest problems which a glad grower has to contend with, is that of prices. It is a problem similar to the weather—"Much has been said about it, but little ever done." We have a code which we try to follow regarding prices, and it is one which has been tested as long as time—"Treat the other fellow as you would have him treat you." We do not believe in selling a number six or even larger bulb, for less than the price a bulblet was sold for the year before. We believe that such tactics which are being carried out all too frequently, cannot help anyone. On the other hand, we do not believe it right to hold the price of a new variety at introductory price for several years—except in rare instances when a variety propagates slowly or is started at a price lower than the quality warrants.

We are building our reputation of quality of stock and fair dealing. If it doesn't satisfy you, just let us know, for we guarantee satisfaction. We strive to keep up to date in the new varieties that are introduced, and make our catalog worth reading. If you enjoy it, tell others. If you do not—then don't hesitate to tell us where we have fallen down.

The Better Commercial Varieties

We have discontinued a number of the older varieties, in favor of newer, and almost as cheaply priced sorts, which are better. In this list, we give the varieties which we think are fine values as cut flowers. Each is a fine thing, and we know you will not be disappointed in them. If you grow for a crowded market, or have a retail trade, or for roadside sale, grow some of these more attractive kinds. When your neighbor shows Halley and America, display some fine Jennie Lind, Giant Nymph, Carmen Sylva, etc. It will put your glads on the map as nothing else will do.

How We Liked Them

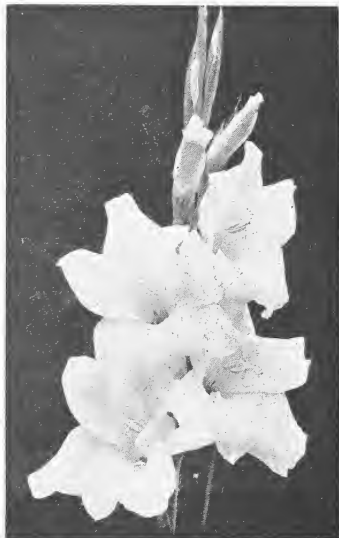
Having tried out a great many—not to say most—of the new varieties produced here and abroad the past season, we are glad for this opportunity to mention some of the outstanding ones—comparing them with others in the same color.

Pink is the most popular color in the gladiolus—at least it is the most widely grown—the most useful and my own personal favorite. It is difficult to say just which was the finest. A number of older varieties were so fine that I think none of the new ones—glorious though they may be, were better. Mrs. Sisson, A. E. Kunderd, Rita Beck, Catherine Coleman, Juniata, and numerous others were gloriously beautiful. Gloriana still stands as the best and most beautifully colored of all.

But the new ones were in many cases, superb. A new creation, Mrs. Leo E. Miller which is not yet on the market, was very fine. Betty Lucile, another seedling which is not seen yet commercially, was also extremely good. Mrs. Calvin Coolidge was admired by all who saw it. Krimhilde and Rozan were similar and are fine. Oszlin, Amoret and I think Catalina, were very similar. They are all partly primulinus, and are all splendid. Goodrich's Lorena and Murrel Liter are outstanding. Star of the Sea was unusual in color and Pride of Portland a bright begonia rose of moderate substance was very fine. Angel's Dream, also from Oregon was very dainty color. These were all outstanding. Mrs. R. Rattray was superb in her very long spike. Elegance was again splendid. Mrs. Galbraith from Scotland was a splendid exhibition spike, and Charm was extremely dainty. Trudal Grotz stood out as a fine bloom. Rose O' California was fine again this season. Pearl of California is a glorious spike, and one of the very best. Helen Phipps was a fine thing being an improvement in a number of respects, on W. H.

Phipps which was as glorious as usual. Emma was a fine blotched flower from Europe. Carolus Clusius was the most outstanding variety of Velthuys. It will make a great commercial flower. Sorry Coryphee didn't bloom. Annie Laurie are splendid commercial varieties and are always greatly admired. Phaenomen is a dainty color too. Bleeding Heart of Fischers was outstanding in height. Diener's Nixe is the best thing he has put out in a long time. It is a fine pink. Veiled Brilliance is glorious. While slightly smoky, it's fine.

Many were the fine lavenders which we viewed during the year. In the quest for a blue glad, every originator is getting some good lavenders. Consequently the improvement in this color, is rapid. It is hard to beat Minuet. Dr. Moody is stronger and a better propagator and earlier, and while the color is about the same, Dr. Moody has flaked lines of a little lighter shade at the edges of the petals. Both are surely splendid. Among the early lavenders, Orchid Lady was easily the outstanding variety. Its extreme height, coupled with the great size, will make it a leading variety, in spite of the moderate substance. The Decorah gardens have given us several fine lavenders. We were sorry not to have Miss Des Moines—also Mary Frey and Jubilee. Dr. Mayo was the largest and tallest, but Regalis and Jane Adams were fine. The color was somewhat similar. All have beautiful throats. However, Berty Snow, from Scotland is better than any of these. It is a huge flower, fine substance, on a splendid spike, and has more open florets than our American lavenders. It does not compete with Minuet because the color is lighter—very similar to Dr. Mayo. From first year bulbs, it was superb, and it's early too. Mrs. Robt. Cunningham is a huge spike and fine flower.

Among the blues, we had a number of beauties. I still think Heavenly Blue is the finest color—it is so pure and refined. While the growth and reproduction is not up to Konynenburg, yet for a pure color—a show bloom—it is surely fine. Mrs. Pfitzer is much like Badenia in color, but is a good strong grower and blooms from bulblets. I think it is larger than Badenia. It is fine. Mrs. Konynenburg is the best commercial blue on the market from our experience. It is a splendid grower, and a fine propagator. Othello is a deeper color, and is fine too. Geraldine Farrar still is much admired. Grace Kimball is fine—a stronger grower than most blues. A new variety from Australia,—Daintiness is somewhat like Mr. Mark in coloring, but much larger, more intense and a stronger grower. It attracted a lot of attention the past season.

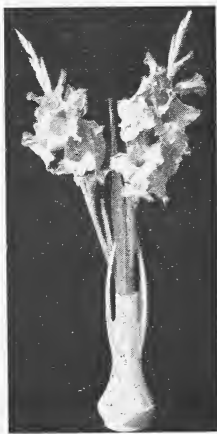
I still think Paul Pfitzer is the best purple on the market. Its glorious color coupled with splendid growth and reproduction puts it in a class where it will be a fine commercial variety. Aida is almost as dark as Baron Hulot but much larger bloom and twice as beautiful. Sovereign still attracts much attention on account of the splendid color. It is a great propagator. Charles Dickens is lighter, and is splendid. Tehama does not attract a great deal of attention, although the color is quite near a blue. Purple Queen is splendid—among the best ruffled purples. Purpuria is a good early purple.

The finest pure yellow we had was Golden Dream. Gold Eagle, much earlier, more slender spike, and more graceful, will be a greater commercial variety, but Golden Dream is a great tall deep exhibition variety of the pure rich color of Souvenir. It is rather late, but certainly is well worth waiting for. K's Yellow Wonder, the Holland variety of the same name, and Fortuna are all more or less

similar in color, varying only in intensity. They are all good. I think Fortuna the best of the three. Cloth of Gold and Golden Ensign, both from Canada are somewhat similar. Both are light. Cloth of Gold from Australia has not bloomed. Golden Frills is almost the best color out—it surely is pure and the cerise feather rather adds than detracts from the beauty. Wetzel's Golden Elsie is a glorious deep yellow prim, deeper even than Souvenir.

The good whites were quite plentiful. Albatross from Europe was the finest we ever grew. It is tall and pure and large. Helen Wills is a very graceful variety, and has many florets open. It is more of a cream white. Le Cygne a prim grandiflora opens six to eight perfectly placed blooms at once. It is exquisite and a fine commercial flower. Olive Goodrich is a beautiful thing with a pink edge. Mrs. Hornberger and Mrs. Prestgard were again fine, as was Purest of All. Ruffolace is one of the most dainty flowers I have ever seen. The frilled and lacinated edges give it a refinement that few varieties possess. Tiffany is a fine commercial white variety.

It is difficult to tell just which color class Helen Howard belongs in but the general impression when one views the flower that it is orange salmon. It is glorious beyond compare, and one of the finest things put out the past season. Little Buddy Worden is a most dainty prim of light orange. The best deep live color is Marnia which was glorious. Normany was the first to bloom and is very good color, although the throat mars the beauty. Sunnymede is fine but is smaller. The orange prims, Alan V, Bunch, Ethelyn, and Orange Queen are all very good. They are in big demand. Queen Mary and Nancy Hanks of Salbach's carry a recollection of an orange shade. They are a little similar. I believe the newer variety is larger and stronger.

not as large as Stanford—or Queen of the Night they are more dependable. Nimrod is the earliest of the dark varieties, and is a fine thing although not quite as dark as the others.

We had a number of fine new smoky varieties. Marmora was the finest of them all. It surely is a glorious thing, and was admired by everyone. Duchess of York from Scotland was one of the very finest. Mr. Diener has given us a number of beautiful smoky ones, witness London Smoke, Carmilita, Mrs. Cotheran, and others. These are all fine. Lavender Bride is a great improvement on Rose Ash. John T. Pirie, although not new, still is greatly admired. These odd colored varieties are all very unusual, and are coming more and more into a big demand.
