

Tuckers' Quality Vegetable Seeds

TUCKERS' QUALITY means the best that can be produced in Vegetable Seeds. It means, trueness to ver-riety and high Germination, and these mean satisfaction to you in your Garden. We test each variety before sending it out to our customers, and the Germination must be strictly up to standard or we do not send it out. In our Vegetable Seed Department we list only such varieties as are of real merit, having excluded all sorts that are not of value, and have cut out a number of out-of date varieties. CULTURAL DIRECTIONS-Will be found at the heading of each class of vegetables, and also on most of our packets. These directions, while reliable, will not apply in every detail to the extreme sections of the United States, and therefore some allowance must be made for the difference of latitude.

ASPARAGUS

Can be grown in any good garden soil, but does best in sunny, moist soil. To grow plants from seed, sow in drills about one inch deep in rows, one foot apart. Keep the soil mellow and free from weeds; during the Summer thin out and the following spring plants may be set in the permanent bed. Set the plants one foot apart each way, spreading the roots well apart. Cover with about three inches of soil.



New Washington

Columbian Mammoth White

The immense shoots are clear white, and in favorable weather remain so until three or four inches above the surface. The crown or bud of the young stalk is considerably smaller than the part below it. Postpaid, pkt. 10c; oz. 15c; ¼ lb. 40c; lb. \$1.10. New Washington

The rust-resistant variety. This variety originated with the Department of Agri-culture, Washington, D. C., after years of careful hybridizing and selection. Only vig-orous-growing plants, free from rust, were used. Should be used on account of its dis-ease-resistant quality. It should prove a boon to market-gardeners. Pkt. 10c; oz. 20c; 1/4 lb, 60c: lb. \$2.25.

Asparagus Roots

Dig or plow a trench 15 to 18 inches deep, put in plenty of well-rotted manure, cov-ering it with a few inches of soil, then set the roots 1½ to 2 feet apart and cover with 4 inches of soil. In the fall, cut off and burn the top growth, and give a good applica-tion of stable manure. Early in the spring fork this in, and as the asparagus begins to grow, earth up to blanch the stalks as they grow.

FOR FIELD CULTURE—The rows may be from 4 to 6 feet apart and the roots set farther apart in the rows. A subsoil plow should be used to break the soil as deeply

There apart in the rows. A subsolit plow should be used to break the solit as deeply as possible.

Brussels Sprouts

A species of the Cabbage family, which produces miniature heads from the sides of the stalk. These heads are a great deli-cacy, boiled in the same way as Cauliflower. The seed should be sown about the middle of May, in a seed bed, and the plants after-wards set in rows, 2 feet or more apart, and cultivated like Cabbage.

IMPROVED DWARF-Produces compact sprouts of the finest quality; a good keeper. Postpaid, pkt. 10c; oz. 20c; 1/4 lb. 60c; lb. \$2.00.

Borecole or Kale

Kale, or German Greens, do not form heads, but furnish an abundance of pretty curled leaves that are highly prized as food. Sow from the middle of April to the beginning of May; transplant and cultivate like Cabbage. Will endure considerable frost without injury.

DWARF GREEN CURLED—Is very dwarf and spreading. The leaves are beautifully curled and of a bright green color; quite hardy. Postpaid, pkt. 10c; oz. 20c; ¼ lb. 60c; lb. \$2.00.

FIELD BEANS (Bush)

White Navy or Prolific Tree

Navy Beans should be planted from the middle of June to the middle of July, on ground not too rich, to in sure them bushing or not growing to vines. Every farmer should grow his own Navy Beans for his year's use. Our stock is the Genuine Michigan Type. Plant 20 to 25 pounds to the acre. Postpaid, pkt. 10c; lb. 25c; 2 lbs. 45c; 5 lbs. \$1.00. Not Prepaid, 15 lbs. \$2.25. Larger quantities, 13c per pound.

Pinto

This is the Genuine Mexican Pinto Bean. A great many people prefer this variety to the Navy or Prolific tree. The Bean is larger, rather cream colored, and marked with finer, darker lines. Plant 25 to 30 pounds to the acre. Postpaid, pkt. 10c; lb. 25c; 2 lbs. 45c; 5 lbs. \$1.00. Not Prepaid, 15 lbs. \$2.25. Larger quantities, 121/2c per pound.

Not Prepaid means that the customer pays the cost of transportation. By referring to the Parcel Post table on page two, it is very easy to figure the cost of sending packages. For quantities up to 50 pounds in the first, second and third zones, Parcel Post rates are as cheap or cheaper than express or freight, and are much safer.

GARDEN BEANS

BEANS succeed best in warm, sandy loam, enriched with well rotted stable or poultry manure. Must not be sown until the ground is warm and dry. Sow in drills 18 to 30 inches apart, 1 to 2 inches deep, placing the beans 2 to 3 inches apart in the drills; for a succession sow every 2 weeks until September. A packet will sow about 25 feet of row; use 1 pound to 100 feet. Bush Beans are ready for use in 35 to 50 days. Cultivate frequently but shallow and never when the foliage is wet.

OUALITY TOBACCO SEED

A very clean piece of land is best for the tobacco plant beds, hence it is customary to burn a piece of land or pile of brush in the woods for same. This destroys grass, weeds and insects, adds fertility through the action of the wood ashes, and leaves the ground in good order. The seeds are sown about February. Parsnips are usually grown on deep, rich, sandy soil, but will make good roots on any soil which is deep, mellow and moderately rich. As the seed is sometimes slow and uneven in growth, it should be sown as early as possible in drills 2½ feet apart; cover half inch deep and press the soil firmly over the seed. Give frequent cultivation and thin the plants to 6 inches apart in the row.

To grow flowers well, the soil must be carefully prepared as for vegetables. Spade the beds to a good depth and make them rich with well rotted manure, thoroughly mixed in. A small quantity of sand will great-ly improve stiff, heavy clay. Don't bury your seeds. Hyacinths

Indoor Culture—Bulbs intended for blooming during the win-ter can be planted in pots or pans and then placed in a cool cellar or room, at a temperature of 50°. They will need mod-erate watering. The whole success of pot culture depends upon getting the roots well established in the pots, at a low tem-perature of say 40 or 50 degrees, before you begin to force the tops at 60 degrees or over. After this the bloom is easily developed by giving light and water; and one can have a supply of flowers from Christmas until after Easter by regu-lating the time of bringing them to the light. Outdoor Culture—Apply well rotted cow or sheep manure or bone meal: fresh manure is injurious to bulbs. The soil should be well drained. In planting, the bulbs should be placed from an inch to four inches below the surface, accord-ing to the size of the bulb. Cover the bulbs with soil one and one-half times their own depth. When the ground freezes the bed should be covered with three or four inches of leaves or litter, to be removed in early Spring. Too early and heavy covering starts the tops prematurely.
