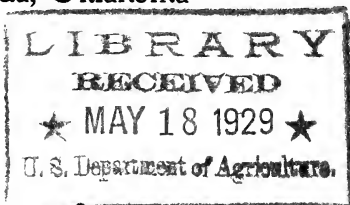

ACHYRANTHUS

Thrive in any soil; are not easily killed by frost. They make intensely bright beds, and show off splendidly in borders to taller growing plants. 2 in. pots, 10c each; \$1.00 per dozen.

ALTERNANTHERA

The well known foliage plant, red and yellow.

Fine dwarf growing foliage plant for bordering flower beds, yellow and red.

ASPARAGUS

Plumosus Nanus. The lace-like texture of its foliage outclasses Maiden Hair Fern for grace and daintiness; the long emerald sprays making a rich setting for cut flowers of all descriptions.

Few families of house plants are so entirely satisfactory in every way as the Begonias. They are rich in color and beautiful in design, and all classes are easily handled under any condition.

CANNAS

The President

By a sweeping majority, this Canna won the honor of being named "The President," for it is so surpassingly fine that no other red Canna could be a competitor. In color, it is a rich, glowing scarlet, and the immense, firm, rounded flowers 7 inches across when open, are produced on strong erect stalks well above the large, rich green foliage. The President is superior to any other red variety in the quantity and also quality of bloom and the firm flowers are able to resist drouth and heat to a remarkable degree. "This is one of the most marvelous Cannas ever produced."

King Humbert. (Both Bronze and Orchid Flowered). The grandest Canna ever offered. Large, heart-shaped leaves of purple madder brown or bronze, the dark ribs sharply defined, crowned with immense heads of Orchid-like flowers. Individual petals are of the largest size; velvety orange-scarlet flecked carmine; rose tinted at margin and base. 4 to 4½ feet.

Hungaria. A magnificent pink Canna widely used for large solid beds. The petals are large and waxy, made up into big round, full trusses. Its color forcibly suggests the well known Paul Neyron Rose, and is unquestionably one of the most popular pink Cannas ever produced. 3½ to 4 feet.

Wyoming. (Both Bronze and Orchid Flowered). A beautiful new variety, with rich purplish bronze foilage. Flowers are large as King Humbert, and of good sub-





stance; bright orange slightly rimmed and flaked with rose. 7 feet.

CARNATIONS

Carnation plants should be re-potted whenever there is indication of their becoming pot-bound. Trans-planted into the garden after all danger of frost is over, and given at least 12 inches of space, with good soil and cultivation, these plants should furnish abundant bloom from July until late Fall or may be kept "pinched back" to retard bloom, potted up at approach of frost and brought inside for winter blooming.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Mistletoe. White, one of the best white, late.

Mistletoe. Yellow, the same as white, late.

Golden Climax. Midseason, yellow, Pompom.

White Pompom. Midseason, white, free bloomer.

COLEUS

The well known foliage plant used extensively for summer bedding. These plants are inexpensive and are very decorative. I have five different colors.

Cecil Brown. (Trailing Queen). One of the most attractive for close bedding, boxes and hanging baskets ever introduced. Rather small scalloped leaves of dark green, evenly checked with curving maroon lines; the wedge-shaped center gay with magenta and cream.

CALADIUM ESCULENTUM

(Elephant's Ear)

For obtaining tropical effects in lawn and garden planting this beautiful plant takes a prominent place. Stands six to seven feet high, with bright green leaves three to four feet long and two and one-half feet wide. Should have plenty of water and good rich soil.

No foliage plant that grows presents so many varied charms, or is so practical for all general house, table, floral or window decorations as the Fern. Most varieties love the sun, and thrive to best advantage if located near the sunniest window, and occasionally turned. A dutiful attention to watering and general condition will be well repaid.

FICUS—The Rubber Plants

Elastica. (India Rubber Tree). This is the old reliable thick leaved, substantial house plant which has ever patiently served its purpose, under abuse and neglect; its dark green, shiny foliage always handsome. \$1.00 each.

GERANIUMS

Beauty Poitevine. Rosy salmon, nicely shaded and tinted from deep orange to pure salmon.

La Favorite. Very large trusses; snow white.

Mad. Barney. A splendid bedding variety; extremely large, double flowers of brilliant rose, unsurpassed for solid beds of deep, showy pink.

Mad. Landry. Semi-double; rich salmon shaded orange, edge of petals a brighter shade.

S. A. Nutt. "Old as the hills," but the one variety always dependable for a constant blaze of crimson from May until snowfall.

Mrs. E. G. Hill. Large single flowers, bright salmon, with a light shading at center.

Alphonso Ricard. A beautiful shade of bright vermilion, large flowers; enormous trusses borne in the greatest profusion on long, rigid stems held well above the exquisite deep green slightly zoned foliage.

Pamelia. A very distinct and pleasing combination of color; white ground with charming gradation of shades, from white throat through a beautiful shade of violet crimson to an intense scarlet margin.

GLADIOLI

This class of summer-flowering bulbs is doubly valuable for the brave field show of bloom, and for its generous supply of cut flowers. Gladiolus flowers last longer when cut than most any other flowers, and develop in water to a greater perfection than if left on the plant.

HARDY PHLOX

Perennial Phloxes can be used to advantage in the hardy border, in large groups on the lawn, or planted in front of belts of shrubbery, where, by judicious pinching back and removing faded flowers, a constant succession of bloom may be had until frost. Except the dwarf species, all Hardy Phloxes are admirably adapted to cutting.

B. Comte. Brilliant, rich and highly pleasing to the eye; French purple.

Bridesmaid. Beautiful trusses; white, crimson eye.

Mrs. Wm. Jenkins. An early and free bloomer, one of the best tall varieties; very large, pure white.

ICE PLANT

This is a very attractive plant for porch boxes or baskets. Small pink flowers.

LANTANAS

Showy bedding and basket plants that are used more extensively than ever before. They are in bright, catchy bloom continuously from spring until frost cuts them down in the fall; at all times emitting a pleasant, pungent fragrance. The flowers are small, bright eyed cups, set quite closely together in rounded umbels two to four inches across. Their colors run to brilliancy, and unite two or more contrastive but harmonious shades.

Aurora. Large flowered; dark and light shades of pink with yellow center.

Jacob Schultz. Rich, velvety crimson-wine; with a varying center of blood-orange. This is the darkest and showiest sort, and is a strong grower.

Weeping Lantana. A fine plant for winter flowering in pots or small hanging baskets. Flowers delicate lavender in compact umbels, borne freely all over the plant from the base of each leaf stalk.

Moon Flowers. One of the most popular summer vines. The foliage is graceful and serviceable, and the vine a rapid climber, attaining a length of 40 feet in a season. The flowers are borne abundantly throughout a long season, opening at sundown, emitting a rich Jasmine odor at night, and closing about noon the next day.

(Black-eyed Susan)

Beautiful, rapid growing annual climbers preferring a warm, sunny situation; used extensively in hanging baskets, vases, low fences, etc., very pretty flowers in buff, white, orange, etc., with dark eyes.

VIOLETS

Of all delightful perfumes, that of the Sweet Violet is the most delicate and pleasing. If grown in the house for winter flowers, they should be kept at a low temperature; they will not bloom freely where it is too warm. If left in the open ground during the winter protect with a covering of leaves.

Large flower with long stems, sweet scented.

VERBENA

These are compact, showy flowering plants of considerable value for outlining beds, or as entire 15 to 18 inch high beds of solid or mixed colors. Beautiful, highly colored umbels borne very freely throughout the summer bedding season. Assorted colors in purple, scarlet, pink and white.

Major Variegata. More of this used for baskets and vases than there is of any other two basket plants. Beautiful variegated green and white foliage; strong trailing habit of growth.

The flowers are small, cream-colored, in short clusters above these whorls. An excellent plant for growing in water or damp soil; but if grown in pots a plentiful supply of water must not be neglected.
