# Burnett's "Special" Lawn Grass Mixture

The above mixture is made from our own formula, and composed of grasses specially adapted for the purposes of producing turf which retains its rich green color and velvety appearance throughout the entire Summer and Fall. In making up this high grade mixture we are careful to use only the very finest quality of all the most desirable dwarf evergreen, recleaned grasses, free from chaff and weeds, which thrive well on any soil, thus ensuring a beautiful and permanent lawn. To obtain best results Lawn Grass Seed should be sown as soon as the ground can be prepared in early Spring. It may also be sown in the Fall with good results.

Quantity Seed Required For making New Lawns, we recommend sowing at the rate of 125 lbs. to the acre (approximately 6 bushels). Where small quantity is required, sow 1 lb. to each 400 square feet ( $20' \times 20'$ ). For renovating old lawns, use half the quantity.

Remarks

A perfect and enduring lawn, one of velvety appearance with closely interwoven, firm, deep and elastic turf, is only created by sowing a composition of the various kinds of grass seeds suited to the conditions and the climate. Several varieties are needed, that the lawn may be evergreen during all seasons and the seeds must be produced quickly, but because the kinds of grasses suitable for perfect lawns are fine-leaved and should take entire possession of the ground promptly, thus checking the development of weeds, the seeds of which are in all soils. Good, rich deeply worked soil, either of a friable texture or thoroughly drained, is as necessary for the production of a perfect lawn as for garden crops. Early and frequent mowing and rolling, as well as the liberal application of water, which should be applied in the early morning, or late afternoon during dry seasons, is one of the secrets of maintaining beautiful green turf from early Spring to late Fall.

# Burnett's "Shady Place" Mixture

In such cases an application of lime or wood ashes raked in will sweeten the soil, but the moss should be first removed with a sharp steel-toothed rake.








