## CULTIVATION OF DAHLIAS

Dahlias are easily grown, requiring no special soil or treatment to bring them to perfection. They love an open, sunny situation, but also succeed in partial shade.

Prepare the soil thoroughly by digging 12 to 18 inches deep in the Fall, and then again in the Spring before planting.

If the soil is poor, work in some well-rotted manure in the Fall and apply artificial fertilizer in the Spring- 100 pounds to 1000 square feet.

Dig holes 3 or even 4 feet apart and about 6 inches deep; drive a stout stake in each hole and lay the tuber down flat with the crown toward the stake and cover with 2 or 3 inches of soil, leaving the balance of the hole to be filled up later, after the plant comes up.

Plant any time between April 15th and June 15th, the latter date being the best for exhibition flowers.

When the plants have made their third set of leaves, the top should be pinched out, to make them branch. Allow only one plant to each stake.

The most important thing from now on is hoeing and cultivating until the buds appear; this should be done at least every week and after every rain. After the buds appear the ground should be mulched with rotted manure if possible, and a thorough watering should be given whenever the plants require it.

Disbudding the side buds, leaving only the terminal bud to develop, will bring larger blossoms.

After the plants have been blackened with the first frost they should be carefully dug, allowed to dry for a few hours, and stored in a dry cellar or basement and covered with dry sand or soil to keep them from shriveling.

Divide the tubers in the Spring, after the eyes show plainly, being careful that each tuber has a piece of the crown attached with an eye, cover them again and keep dry and cool until planted.

A. O. KENNY. (Darling). Decorative. Large flowers of perfect form and great depth, carried on good stems. Color a rich bronze buff shade of one tone, but with the centre tinted with bronze. Never on any dahlia have we seen more gold dust on the petals than on this variety. Plants grow medium height and are very free flowering, in a class by itself. This dahlia was placed on the Honor Roll of The American Home Magazine December, 1928. Plants only, $\$ 7.50$ each.

RISING MARS. (Simmons). A hybrid Cactus that for five years has been winning awards at the New England Dahlia Society shows. It has won seven first prizes, two silver medals, and the Darling Cup. In December, 1928, it was placed on the honor roll of The American Home Magazine. An abundant bloomer, early and late. Natural flowers with a uniform size of nine inches. MRS. R. CROMPTON. (Crompton) Decorative, deep double petal type; the color is very difficult to explain-a real fascinating blend of cream and salmon; the tips of the petals are deeper, almost orange and the colors are even more beautiful as the flower ages. The flower is 8 inches and over; center never opens. This dahlia has extra good stems and is a prolific bloomer; it is fine, especially so, for vase or basket work. # Choice Named Varieties of GLADIOLI 

Our customers will note in this issue many new varieties that we have tried out in our gardens and found to be worthy acquisitions. It is our practice each year to obtain plantings of the newer creations in order that our many visitors may have the opportunity to view them while growing in our fields.

## CARE AND CULTURE OF GLADIOLI

Do not plant too early, as nothing is gained by planting before the ground is warm. If your soil is heavy plant four inches deep, if light and sandy, six inches is better. Place the bulbs four to six inches apart. Place the bulbs in a well worked trench in zigzag rows, and cover at first about three inches, when shoots begin to appear, work balance of dirt into the trench. At all times keep the soil loose. If exhibition blooms are wanted Sheep Manure or Fertilizer should be worked in around the plants when hoeing.

In the Fall dig the bulbs as soon as the leaves turn yellow. Cut stem off half an inch above bulb. Spread bulbs out in the sun and dry thoroughly before storing. Store in a cool, dry cellar.
